Rome, January 14.

THE Pope is very well again ; And we hear now no more of the Promotion of Cardinals, which was much talk'd of the last week. On Wednesday last was held a Consistory ; wherein the Cardinal *Ottoboni* was declared Legat of *Avignon*. The Pope has granted the Cardinal of *Bouillon* his bulls for the Rich Abby of *Clugny*. The Gallies are fitting out at *Civita Vecchia* with great diligence, on which 1000 Land Soldiers are ordered to embark for the assistance of the *Venetians* ; and the Pope has himself call'd upon the Ambassador of *Malta* to hasten the Succors which that Order is to send that Republick. The French Ambassador and the Cardinals of his Faction have frequent Conferences in order to find out some Temperament for the accommodating Matters between this Court and *France*, but hitherto with little success. *Don Marco Ottoboni* has taken possession of the Command of Captain of the Popes Guards, and received the usual Compliments thereupon.

Leghorn, Jan. 16. By a Bark come in eight days from *Argiers*, we have advice, that a French Man of War was arrived there with some Turkish Slaves, but that the Algerines would deliver none of the French Slaves, till they had first received all theirs from *France*. And that the Algerines have now 14 Men of War abroad. The Cardinal *d'Estree* arrived here the 14th Instant, and parted again the 14th on a French Galley for *Provence*. We hear from *Milan*, that great Preparations are making there for the next Campagne ; and that their Governor was going to visit the Frontier Garisons. The Fortifications of *Guaſſalla* are now quite demolished, and 3 Spanish Regiments that were posted there to cover the Workmen, are gone to take their Winter-Quarters at *Cremona, Pavia and Mortara*.

Warsaw, Jan. 3. The time of the Meeting of the Dyet approaching, many of the Nobility are come hither, and the Court is expected the next week. An Ambassador is on his way from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and several other Foreign Ministers will be here against that time. The last Letters from *Lemberg* said, that a

Party of *Tartars* was marching with a Convoy of Provisions to *Caminiec* ; That for the rest things were very quiet on those Frontiers. And that it was generally reported, that the Chan of *Tartary* was returned to the *Crimee* to provide for the Defence of his Country against the *Moscovites*, who make great preparations to invade it this Summer. It is confirmed, that the Czar of *Moscovy* is sending Ambassadors to the Princes Confederated against the *Turks*, to acquaint them with his Resolutions to prosecute the War with his whole Force, and to desire they will not treat of a Peace, without giving him timely communication thereof, that he may likewise send Ambassadors to the place of Conference.

Vienna, Jan. 19. On Monday last it was by the Emperors command signified to the Turkish Envoys here, That seeing they were not empowered to make any new Proposals of Peace, there would, so soon as the *Danube* was open, be Boats provided to carry them to *Belgrade*, in order to their return to *Turkey*. We have yet no particular account of the Action which is said to have lately happened between the Imperial Forces commanded by the Duke of *Holstein* and the *Turks* and *Tartars*, who were advanced towards *Pristina*. An Ambassador is coming hither from *Poland*, with Instructions, (as we are told) to concert Matters with the Imperial Court in relation to the War, as well as to finish the Treaty of Marriage between the Prince of *Poland*, and the Princess of *Neubourg*. The States of *Austria* now assembled here, have under Consideration the Proposition that was made to them in the Emperors Name at their first Meeting, and particularly that part of it which concerns a Supply for the War. We have an account from *Inspruck*, that the damage occasioned there by the Earthquake is very considerable ; and that the People continue still under a great consternation by reason of the repeated Shocks they have felt lately.

Francfort, Jan. 29. The Imperial Hussars that are quartered near the *Rhine*, have so watchful an Eye upon the French, that none of their Parties have appeared of late. They write from *Basle*, that the whole Body of the Swiss Cantons hath strictly forbid the raising of any Men within their Territories for the French Service. The French fortify *Ebernburg*.

Hamburg, Jan. 27. The Levies for the Duke of *Holstein* are almost compleated ; And the Troops of *Sueden* and *Lunenburg* now in his Service

vice are thereupon recalled. The Letters from *Stockholme* of the 14th Instant say, the King intended to remove from thence with the whole Court on the 27th Instant to *Comingsfor*; And that the Preparations that are making in that Kingdom for the assistance of the Allies, are carried on with extraordinary diligence. We are told, that a Conference is going to be held at *Ratisbonne* for the adjusting the Differences about the Succession to the Dutchy of *Saxe-Lawembourg*.

Brussels, Jan. 29. Our Governor General is now at *Ghent*; from whence he is not expected back here till the end of this week. A Placet has been published, prohibiting the carrying out of Horses, or the selling the same to any of the Subjects of *France* upon pain of Death. His Excellency has ordered 700 Horses to be provided for the Service of the Artillery, and other preparations are likewise making for an early Campaign. The French are cutting up some new Fortifications between *Pont a Chin* and *Pont a Tressin*. The Great Council of this City hath consented to the Extraordinary Subsidies lately granted by the States of *Brabant*.

Hague, Febr. 3. The Heer Van *Spaen*, Lieutenant General of the *Brandenburg* forces, who came hither the last week, is returned to *Cleves*, after having had several Conferences with the Ministers here. The Count de *Berka* is expected in few days, to assist on the part of the Emperor at the Meeting of the Allies. And we hear that the Baron *Gors* comes with the like Commission from the Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel*. The Deputies of the Admiralties are gone home, but with intention to return hither again against the meeting of the States of *Holland*, who are adjourned to the 7th of this Month. The Letters by an Express from *Ausburg*, give an account of the Election of the King of the *Romans* on the 24th past, who was to be Crowned the 26th; and on the 4th Instant the Imperial Court would part from thence for *Vienna*.

Edinburgh, Jan. 25. The Council hath published an Order for Sequestring the Rents of *John Earl of Melfort*, *Sir Archibald Kennedy of Culcass*, Colonel *Canon*, *John* late Viscount *Dunder*, the Earl of *Dumferlin*, the Earl of *Buchan*, the Viscount *Frendraught*, Lord *Dunkel*, Mr. *Colin Mackenzie*, *Sir John Drummond of Machany*, *Sir William Wallace of Craigie*, *Sir James Hamilton of Eliston*, and such others as are in Rebellion against Their Majesties. On Thursday last a Vessel arrived at *Leith* with 200 Danish Soldiers.

Newcastle, Jan. 24. Yesterday marched from hence 500 Danish Horse towards *Scotland*. The same day came into *Sheeles* two Ships from *Denmark*, having on Board 300 Foot Soldiers; They came out with 3 other Vessels which they lost Company with. This Evening the rest of the Danish Horse are expected here in their march towards *Scotland*; From whence they are to pass for *Ireland*.

Falmouth, January 27. The *Anne of London*, Captain *Eagle* Commander, is arrived in this Port in 13 weeks from *Jamaica*. The

Outward bound Ships with their Convoy are still here.

Chester, Jan. 29. Yesterday arrived here the *James Yacht* from *Belfast*; The Letters she brought give an account, that our Forces are in very good health in their several Quarters, and plentifully furnished with Provisions and all other Necessaries. There are now at *Higblake* above 80 Sail of Ships in their Majesties Service.

Portsmouth, Jan. 30. The Queen of Spain continues at *Spithead*. The Duke of *Nois* who came hither to Compliment Her from the Majesties, returned yesterday to *London*.
