2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Places (namely):—(1.) the first two grazing fields and two other contiguous grazing fields on the west side, and the Wash Dyke field and two other contiguous fields on the east side, of the Drove leading to the Shepherd's house from the Wash Dyke-road, on the farm occupied by Mr. William Barnett, in Sutton St. Edmund, in the petty sessional division of Elloe, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, together with the Drove (or Chase) lying between the said fields for the length between the said Shepherd's house and the junction of such Drove (or Chase), by a gateway, at and with the Wash Dyke-road, and (2.) the cow-sheds of Mr. William Henry Brown, at Dowsdale Bar, in the parish of Crowland, in the petty sessional division of Elloe, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, together with Dowsdale Bank for one mile in length from Dowsdale Bar in a westwardly direction,—which were declared by Orders of Council dated respectively the sixth and thirteenth days of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, to be Places infected with foot-and-mouth disease, are hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and those Places shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be Places infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and

of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The provisions of Article 44 (*Slaughter in Swine-Fever*) of The Animals Order are hereby suspended in favour of any swine liable to be slaughtered under that Article that may be in the possession or charge of Dr. Edward Emanuel Klein, or of any person or persons certified under his hand to be in his employment, at certain premises known as The Brown Institution, situate in the Wandsworth-road, in the parish of Lambeth, in the Metropolis, and such swine shall be and are hereby reserved for observation and treatment.

2. Notwithstanding anything in Articles 9 and 10 of The Swine-Fever Order of 1882, no pig shall; during the continuance of this Order, be moved alive out of The Brown Institution aforesaid.

3. If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, the person for the time being in the possession or charge of the pig, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

4. In this Order words have the same meaning as in The Animals Order.

5. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the twenty-sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three; and shall cease to have effect from and immediately after the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, without prejudice to the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of an offence committed on or before that day.
