Ausberg, Jan. 20.

Applications having been made to the Emperor, in the Name of the Pope, on behalf of the Canons of the Cathedral Church of *Cologne*, who were deprived for their Rebelious Adherence to the Cardinal of *Furstemberg*; His Imperial Majesty has written to the Cardinal of *Medich*, now at *Rome*, to represent to the Pope, That his Imperial Majesty can hardly believe he will concern himself in Favour of such as are not only guilty of Disobedience to the See of *Rome*, but of Rebellion and Treason against their Country; it being notorious, that after they found their Poitulation defective, and not confirmed by the Pope, they, together with the Cardinal of *Furstemberg*, forgetting their Duty to the Empire, entred into a Conspiracy with the Enemies of their Country, call'd them into the Archbishoprick of *Cologne*, and delivered up to them the Towns and Fortresses of the same, and thereby became the Authors of all the Miseries and Calamities that have since befallen the Inhabitants of that Diocese; for which their Treasons, and their Contumacy afterwards, they have not only been deprived of their Benefices, but declared Traytors to the H. Roman Empire; that the restoring of such perfidious Men, would not only blemish the Imperial Dignity, and the Respect due to the Archbishop of *Cologne*, and subject that Diocese to new Mischiefs by their future Conspiracies, but would be an insupportable Injury to those, who have, with the unanimous Applause of the Clergy and People, been chosen into their Places, viz. the Great Master of the *Teutonick* Order, the Duke de *Croy*, the Count de *Corninsec*, &c. That his Imperial Majesty therefore hopes the Pope, in regard to his own Honour, and that of the See of *Rome*, as well as the Dignity and Peace of the Empire, will not insist upon the Re-establishment of those that have acted so contrary to the Duty and Obligation they lay under to both, but that he will rather declare them incapable of all Ecclesiastical Dignities and Privileges, which they have rendred themselves unworthy of, that so, in case they shall be found within the Empire, the respect and Character of the Holy Order may not suffer any Diminution by their Punishment: But if it

pleases the Pope to deal more gently with them, he may easily bestow upon them other Benefices out of the Empire; and that besides, 'tis not to be doubted, but the French King, whom they have served so faithfully, will take Care of them. To conclude, his Imperial Majesty desires, that for preserving the Peace of the Archbishoprick of *Cologne*, the Pope will think fit, by his Authority, to remove the Cardinal of *Furstemberg* from the Deaconship of *Cologne*, which, of Right, is become vacant by his having accepted the Dignity of a Cardinal without a special Dispensation, or, in case the Pope likes it better, that he will dispose him to a voluntary Resignation thereof, seeing he still continues his Machinations against the Quiet of that Archbishoprick, and the whole Roman Empire.

The Elector of *Cologne* has written on the same Subject, and much to the same effect, to the Pope himself, and to his Nuncio at *Cologne*.

Paris, Febr. 11. 'Tis said, That the French King will take a Journey to *Compeigne*, the beginning of the next Month. There appears as yet no great prospect of an Accommodation of our Affairs with the Court of *Rome*, the present Pope shewing himself very stiff upon the main Points that occasioned the differences with his Predecessor. And it's said, That the Jubile lately granted by the Pope, will not be received here; for that the Absolution of those that were Excommunicated by his Predecessor, is reserved to the See of *Rome*. We had here the last Week, such extraordinary Floods, that People could not pass in several places of this City but in Boats; which have occasioned a great deal of Damage. They write from *Venice*, That a Vessel was arrived there from *Constantinople*, with Letters of the 10th of *December*, which confirm the Advancement of *Bassa Kuperli* to the place of Grand Vizir; but as for his Predecessor, they say, he was not Strangled, but Banished to *Megara*, with a small allowance for his subsistence. The Prince of *Harcourt* has quitted the Service of the *Venetians*.

Newcastle, Jan. 30. The *Nonsuch* Frigate is arrived here, with Eight of the East-Country Ships under her Convoy, the rest of their Company having been separated from them in bad Weather. The English Ships from *Holland* are come in here; and their Convoy is gone with the Scotch Ships to *Scotland*. There lies a Fleet of Colliers in *Tinmouth*, with their Convoy, ready to sail with the first fair Wind.

Falmouth, Jan. 30. The 27th instant arrived here the *Hopewell* of this Place, *Charles Carter* Master, in 16 days from the *Canaries*. The *Fleet* of outward-bound Ships is still in Port.

Plymouth, Jan. 31. Yesterday came into this Port a *Suedes Man* of War of 40 Guns, bound for the *Streights*. Here are likewise arrived, since my last, the *Elizabeth* of *Topsham*, bound for the *Canaries*; the *St. Ann* of *Amsterdam*, and *St. John Baptist* of *Hamburg*, for *Cadiz*. The *Higue* of *Amsterdam*, the *St. Peter* of *Hamburg*; and the *Alcovea* of *Lisbon*, for *Portugal*. The *St. Albans* is gone out to cruise.

Plymouth, Febr. 2. This day arrived here a Vessel from *St. Malo*, with several English Masters of Ships and others, that were Prisoners in *France*, and have been exchanged. They say the French King cannot get Stamen to man his Ships; That there has been a Sickness among them, of which a great many have died; And that the Privateers of *St. Malo* have of late met with very little purchase. Several outward bound Merchant Ships are come in here since my last. The *Canary Fleet* now in this Port was going to sail this morning the Wind being then at East, but before noon it came up South, and is now S. S. W.

Lime, Febr. 3. Yesterday a Fleet of about 40 Sail passed by to the Westward, with'n two Leagues of the Shoar, which we judged to be most English Merchant Ships with their Convoy outward bound.

Bristol, Febr. 1. We have an account, by several Persons come lately from the Southern Parts of *Ireland*, That the Irish Army is extremely weakened; the Regiments, that were 13 Companies of 60 Men each, are now hardly 150 in the whole, the rest being dead or run away: That both Horse and Foot are very ill armed, the later having, for the most part, only Scythes, or Half-pikes call'd Rapories. That they are in great want of Ammunition. That Corn, and all sorts of Provisions, begin to grow very scarce and dear. That there is not, in *Munster*, Hay to be got for their Horses, so that they are forced to put them to Grass, where many of them die, and the rest will not, in several months, be fit for Service. That there is scarce any Silver to be seen, and that they give 7 and 8 Shillings in the Pound, and in some places 10, to exchange Brass Money for that of Silver. That they fortifie *Limerick* for a place of Retreat. That Lieutenant-General *Macarty*, and the rest who made lately their Escape from *Iniskilling*, were come to *Carke*. As for the Condition of the Protestants, it is most miserable; but this is too large a Subject for a Letter.

Chester, Febr. 2. The Letters from *Lisburne* advise, that our Parties make frequent Incursions into the Irish Quarters, and bring from thence considerable Booties of Cows and Garrones; to hinder which the Rebels have broke down the Cows and Passes about *Clewish* and *Monaghan*; and that our Troops which lie at *Rivercor* have lost about 40 men, they passed over

the River called *Narrow Water*, and brought back about 500 Cows and Garrones.

Portsmouth, Febr. 2. Yesterday sailed from *Spithead* Their Majesties Ships the *Greyhound*, and the *Soldados*, with the *Isabella* Yacht, for the *Downes*, having about 20 Sail of small Vessels under their Convoy. The same day sailed out of this Harbour, to *Spithead*, Their Majesties Ship the *Expeditio*, and a Dutch Man of War resisted here.

Portsmouth, Febr. 4. Yesterday sailed Their Majesties Ships the *Oxford* at *Saphire* to look after the Merchant Ships that are in the Ports to the Westward. The Fleet continues at *Spithead*.
