Newcastle, April 14.

Esterday sailed hence the remainder of our laden Fleet, being neer eighty fail, whereof 12 bound to the Eastwards.

Hull, April 15. On Monday last went out f om Humber three ships for Rotterdam, one for Amsterdam, two for Dantzick, all of then belonging to this place and laden with the Commodities of these Countreys, and with them two Danes, and two other veffels of this Town for Norway; having for some time been detai-

ned in the River by contrary winds.

Venice, April 7. Our Convoys under the command of Seignior Catarin Cornaro may in few days put to lea for Candia, being already well flored and furnished with those necesfaries, and conveniencies which may be of use for the defence of that place; The Marquis de St. André Ambrun with about 40 Officers which have followed him hither from France, being ready to embark on the same Convoy. The young Baron Sparr, on within the Senate has conferred the charge of Gen.r.l of the f reign forces employed in Candia with a pension of 4000 Ducats, will also in few drys take the way of Zante in a lusty suip firted up for this service, intending to put himself into Candia as soon as the winds will permit him.

We are confirmed in the report that the Turks begin to renew the Siege with much eigerness, and although the General Morofini with a squadron of 17 Gillies and 2 G liasses continues still with much diligence cruising in the Archipelago, y.t such care is riken by the Turks in sending recruits from all convenient p r s of their dominions, that by this means some of them have already reached them. The Tucks from the r new raised Mount still continue firing up-the Port, but 'tis hoped by the prudence and volum of the besieged they may in little time be obliged to quit the Battery and leave the Port again open for the free passage of our

ships .

From the Levant we are told that the Grand Visier has by his Letters to far prevailed upon the Sultan, that he feems now more then ever inclin'd to profecute that Siege both by Sea and Land, to Which end he has giv n ftrict or ers to his Baffa G neral at Sea, to fit up all his Gallies, and to impress what numbers of other thips he thall think convenient for the Convoys of men and other necessaries to Canea. That Commissions were dispatche to the Bassa's and Comamanders of all the Provinces, to make leavies, a d prepare ftores, which might be in readiness on all occasions for Transportation. That all their Faudataries should according to their duty be in readiness to serve in the war, and that already divers Companies of Janiaries, with other Soldiers were teady upon feve alco its to embarly with great numbers of Pioneers and Liborers to be e ploy'd in the works and Mines; and for the greater encour sement of his reo-ple, who seem not over forwards and active for this employsnent, the Grand Seignfor was resolved in person to pass into Acgrepont, to give such further orders as might be needful for the carrying on of that work

In the mean time the Senate as they omit no hing that can be done to prevent the loss of a place of so much concernment not only to this Republick but to the whole Christian world, so are they also endeavou ing to experiment what can be done by the way of Treaty. To which purpose they have ordered Seignior Andre Va ter, General of the three Islands n wat Zant, to hasten sot wards on his employment to the Ottoman Court, under the character of Envoyes and to suspadiffic Grand Seignlow Orders at Suda, and have during his ab-fence, committed the care of his charge in the three Illands to Seignior Pietre Valier, his kinfman.

Count Wrangles. Nephow to the Field Heer of that name being sometime since retu ned hither from the Levant, where he has served in the Fleet as a Volunteer, is now endeavor-

ing to obtain some command against the Turks.

Vienna, April 8. fenriwich the Praze to Mile.

They farther i fo m us that on the h past; seven of Venerian Gallies cruifing in the Arcl ipelago, were in Nightsfiercely fer upon thy twelve Beiler Gallies sent from Canes; who after a sharp encounter had posselved themselves of three of the Venetian Gallies, but that 3.3 others belonging asso to the Venetians, coming timely i to their refcue, not onely recovered those three, but made themselves also Masters of five of the Turkish Gallies, and sunk two others, with a great slughter of the Turk. They bring not any other particuas of this Engagement, but that amongst the slain Turks were Mazzamima, Malapano, Dacan Bei, and Casin Bei, persons of great Eminency, that above 500 Turks were taken prioners, and above 1000 Christian Slav.s sestored to liberty, and that the Gallies which were taken were sent into Candia.

Yesterday a Barque arriving in 20 dayes from Alexendria, informs us that several ships were depa ted thence

for Candia.

A Barque from Corfica, tells us that the St. Sebastian a great Ragusean ship, with 400 Butts of Oil from Puglia, intended for Ostend was unfortunately driven upon the Rocks at Corfica and lost, with seven of her men.

The Sampson, Levant Merchant, and Prudence, for Scanderson, and the Lantum for Puglia, may depart this Evening, and the next Week the Mary and Murths for

Hague, April 14. The Lunenburgers are not yet much advanced on their way to the Rendezvous of our Army intended at Hardenburg, the Bishop of Munster having result them pussage, by reason of his League with the Princes his Neighbors, and t's said has secured the passages leading into his Country. placing considerable Guards upon them.

The Field-Marshall Warts arrived the 21. instant at Swoll, where he had a conference with the States Commissioners; the Forces are by the Rivers of Rhine and Isself hastening to their Rendezvous at Hardenburg, where its believed they may meet on Saturday next, and in a day or two be ready to march.

The Sieur De Peluits, Envoye from his Electrial Highness of Brandenburgh, to his Most Christian Maresty, is returned hither from Park, intending for Berlin, there to give an account to the Duke his Master of his Negotiation in that Court.

From Anterdam we're informed of the safe arrivall at the Téxell of our Fleet from Cadiq, with their Convoy, commanded by Viceadmirall Sweers, the whole Fleet confifting of 4. Men of War, and 20 Merchant ships, whereof two laden with Salt miscarryed about the Cape St Vincent, the Tackle and Puniture of one of them happly saved, but the other wholly lost, with her Men, and ha other Marine s which were sent by the Viceadmiral to their assistance.

Paris, April 25. On Friday last arrived here a Courier from Brussels with an account that the Marquis de Castel Rodrigo had received new powers from the Queen Regent of Spain, by vertue w'ereof he was ready to sign the peace between both Crowns. His Majesty has also sent this Ordes to Monssenr Colbert at Aix la Chapelle for the signing of it there, so that the full conclusion of that weighty affair will attend only for the Ratification by the Queen Regent, which 'tis hoped may be obteined before the end of May next ensuring.

In the mean time His Majety orders his forces to keep diligently upon their Quarters, and has commanded all his Officers to repair to the Frontiers, to be pre ent in their Commands and Employments upon pain of imprisonment.

His Majesty is now gone to Versilles, where he may continue till Saturday, having before his dep rture given Orters for the razing and demolishing of all the Fortifications and places of strength in the Franche Comte.

From Lille we are informed of the arrival there of Monsieur de Louvoy the 17 instant to take a view of that Garrison, who intended in sew days to pass thence to visit the other places and Forts lately conquer'd by His Majesties Army.

The Count de Coning mark with his Regiment being in it ile time expected upon the Frontiers to affait His Majesty in his wars, Two Commissioners from the Council of war are ordered to attend him, and to guide him in the way denned for his March.

The Plague being broken out at Soi Jour, great care is taken by the Parliament to prevent the farther spreading thereof, and the chief Presidents son ordered to be present in those parts, and to see so go dwarch set in all places, that no persons be permitted to pass without a Certificate of health; and that the sick may not want the conveniencies of Chirugions to take care of them, they have ordered that all young Chirurgions who shall repair thicher to take care of the sick, shall at the end of the Contagion be made free of their Prosession.

Bruzes, April 26. We daily expect news of the arrival of Don Juan upon our Coaste. Yesterday Sir Mark d'Ognati went from hence to Osend by the directions of Marquis Salazar, to put all things in readiness for his reception; the Marquis himself with divers of the Nobility and States of Flanders continuing here, till they shall have certain intelli-

gence of h s landing.

From Aix is Chapelle we are informed that Monsieur Colbert made his publick Entry there the 23 instant with extraordinary State, several other of the Plenipotentiaries may in sew days, do the like, in the mean while frequent visits pass between them, all of them conceiving great his pesson happy and speedy issue of the Tr sty; especially since Monsieur Colbert has received Orders from the Kidhis Master for the signing it according to the preparatory project agre I upon Paris.

Plymouth, April 15. A small Vessel of Topfam stely arriving from the Streights infi ims us that the 5th instant about 40 leagues off the Cape Fir isstree, she met with the Squad on of Monsieur de Hearfort, which was cruising there, carrying out English colours; but upon her nearer approach changing them; by whom the Mester of this Vessel

was called aboard, and in little thine cilmiffed.

Portsmouth, April 16. We are still hastning out our shi s to sea, the Mountague, Tyger, Monk and Bristol are neer ready, and may this week go out to Spit head, the rest are fitting up with all possible diligence to sollow them.
