A PROCLAMATION

For Dissolving this present Parliament, and Declaring the speedy Calling another.

WILLIAM R.

W Hereas We have thought fit, for divers Important and Weighty Considerations, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Dissolve Our present Parliament, which now stands Prorogued to the Second Day of April next; We do for that End Publish this Our Royal Proclamation, And do hereby Dissolve the same accordingly: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses of the said Parliament, are Discharged from their Meeting upon the said Second of April. And to the Intent Our good Subjects may perceive the Confidence We have in their good Affections, and how Desirous We are to Meet Our People, and Have their Advice in Parliament, We do hereby make Known to Our said Subjects, that We have given Directions to Our Lords Commissioners of Our Great Seal, for the Issuing out of Writs in due Form of Law for the Calling of a New Parliament, which shall begin and be holden at Westminster on Thursday the Twentieth Day of March next.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Sixth Day of February 1689. In the First Year of Our Reign.

Vienna, Jan. 24. The Letters from Nissa of the 4th Instant give the following account of the late Action between the Imperial Forces and the Tartars. The Duke of Holstein being informed that the Tartars were fallen into the Country between Kazanek and Pristina, and had made a great ravage, he sent out Colonel Strasser with a Detachment of Horse and Dragoons to give a stop to them; who meeting with a Body of 3 or 4000 of the Infidels, put them to flight, and returned with several Prisoners to Pristina. Soon after news was brought thither, that the Enemy did attack the Castle of Kazanek, in which there was an Imperial Garrison of about 80 Men; whereupon the Duke of Holstein, who had been himself indisposed for some time, commanded the Baron Strasser to march with the Regiments of Horie of Holstein and Hanouer, the Dragoons of Hanouer and Scirum, a Detachment of 200 Foot out of the Regiment of Aspremont, and 4 Pieces of Cannon, to observe the Enemy, but not to attempt any thing till the Regiment of Piccolomini had likewise joined him. The Baron de Strasser marched towards Kazanek, and coming near that place in sight of the Enemy, he drew up his Troops very advantageously, having a Morass on the back of them, but finding the Tartars durst not attack him there, and not giving credit to the reports he had from the Country People of their number, he advanced into an open Ground to charge them. The Fight was very desperate;

rate, but our Troops being surrounded by the Enemy (who of Turks, Tartars, and Arnoves were near 4000 strong) were at last broke and overpowered by their numbers. The Prince of Hanover was slain at the head of his Regiment of Horse, with his Major Count *Ibama*, all the Captains and Lieutenants, and about 600 Men. Of the Regiment of *Holftein* the Major, all the Captains and Cornets, 8 Lieutenants, and 450 Men, were killed or taken, and about 300 came off. Of the Dragoons of *Hanover* six Captains, eight Lieutenants, and six Cornets, and 500 Men: Of *Saxum*, the Lieutenant-Colonel *Mausperger*, 4 Captains, and all the Lieutenants and Cornets, and 500 Men: Of the Foot Colonel *Straffer*, Major *Auspurg*, four Captains, and 100 Men; In all about 2200 were killed, or taken. The Regiment of *Piceolomini* that had Orders to join with Colonel *Straffer* met the Enemy unexpectedly after the Fight, but posting themselves advantageously near a Morass, they maintained their ground till night, and then made good their Retreat, with the loss only of a Captain, and some few Men. Upon the news of this Misfortune, the Duke of *Holfstein* retired with all the Foot that was quartered at *Pristina*, an open place, to *Nifis*, (where General *Veteran* arrived about the same time from *Hungary*) and sent out Detachments to reinforce the Garrisons of *Evrot*, *Muffa Palanque*, and *Precopia*.

Vicna, Jan. 26. The Turkish Envoys parted from hence yesterday under a good Convoy for *Conorra*, from whence they will pass down the *Dambre* to *Belgrade*. They had some days before a Conference with the Imperial Ministers, wherein they again declared, that they were not empowered by their last Instructions to agree to any thing more than the Cession of the Conquered places, pretending not only to keep *Great Waradin*, *Terneswar*, &c. but that *Transylvania*, and *Valachia* should return under the protection of the Port. An Order has been published here requiring the Officers whose Troops are at present quartered in *Valachia*, and on the Frontiers of *Hungary*, to repair forthwith to their respective Commands.

Frankfort, Febr. 3. We have an account from *Ausboing*, by Letters of the 30th past, that the King of the *Romans* was Crowned on the 26th with the usual Solemnities; that on the 28th the Electors of *Bavaria* and *Cologne* went for *Muncke*; That the rest of the Electors were on their departure; and that it was believed the whole Imperial Court would remove from thence at this day.

Cologne, Febr. 7. There have been public Rejoycings here, at *Muncke*, *Frankfort*, &c. for the Election and Coronation of the King of the *Romans*. The Letters from *Vicna* confirm the unhappy Rencontre with the *Tartars*, in which our Imperial Regiments were almost all cut off.

Hague, Febr. 10. The Count *de Comminge*, the Emperors Envoy, embarked two days ago for *England*. Some of the Plenipotentiaries that are to assist at the Conference of the Allies arrive here daily. We are told, that the Ratifications of the Alliance lately concluded between the Emperor and this State were exchanged here this week.

Newcastle, Febr. 4. On Saturday last came in here four Troops of Danish Horse, and yesterday they marched again to the Northwards. The Foot that are quartered hereabouts will, 'tis said, march this week.

Chilster, Febr. 5. Several Persons are arrived here this week from *Belfast*; by whom we are told, that Colonel *Wells*, with some of the *Disturbing* Forces, had possessed himself of *Belturbat*, a Considerable Post. And that the Lady *Newcomen* having got 200 of her Tenants and Neighbours into her House in the County of *Longford*, 20 Miles from any of the English Garrisons, did so annoy the Irish, that they came to attack the House, and lay before it some time, but could not take it, till they brought some Field Pieces; and then they surrendered on good Terms, the Lady *Newcomen* being to remain in her House, and the Men to march away, 44 Whereof came to *Lisburne* on the 28th past, and Lifted themselves in the Earl of *Montes* Regiment, and the rest took Service in Sir *John Hammers*.

Falmouth, Febr. 3. On the first Instant the *Tunifine* of *London*, carrying 26 Guns, *Walter Baxter* Commander, bound home from *Madag*, met off of the *Lexard* with a French Privateer of 30 Guns and 9 *Paterero's*; with whom they very bravely maintained a Fight from morning till about two in the Afternoon, when the French left them; and the said Ship is lately arrived in this Port, having had two Men killed and one wounded, and the Captain himself having received a slight wound. Yesterday arrived here the *Queen Ketch* from *Virginia*, whence she came on the 22th of *December* last. The *St. Albans* is come in to Convoy the homeward bound Ships now in this Port.

Amsterdam, Febr. 4. Yesterday morning sailed from hence the *Berkley Castle*, the *Holland*, and the *Samson*, with about 60 Sail or Merchant Ships under their Convoy bound for the *Carriees* and the *West-Indies*. Two Dutch Men of War are come in here, which are to go with their Merchant Ships bound for the *Stragora*.

Portsmouth, Febr. 6. Yesterday came to *Spirhead* about 40 Sail of Merchant Ships outward bound under the Convoy of Their Majesties Ships the *Faulcon* and *Bonadventure*. The Queen of *Spain* continues at *Spirhead*.
