Vienna, Jan. 24. The Letters from Nisa of the 4th Instant give the following account of the late Action between the Imperial Forces and the Tartars. The Duke of Holsein being informed that the Tartars were fallen into the Country between Kazaneck and Pristina, and had made a great ravage, he sent out Colonel Strasser with a Detachement of Horse and Dragoons to give a stop to them; who meeting with a Body of 3 or 4000 of the Insidels, put them to slight, and returned with several Prisoners to Pristina. Soon after news was brought thither, that the Enemy did attack the Castle of Kazanecke, in which there was an Imperial Garison of about 80 Men; whereupon the Duke of Holsein, who had been himself indisposed for some time, commanded the Baron Strasser to march with the Regiments of Horse of Holsein and Hanouer, the Dragoons of Hanouer and Strivam, a Detachement of 200 Foot out of the Regiment of Aspremont, and 4 Pieces of Cannon, to observe the Enemy, but not to attempt any thing till the Regiment of Piccolomini had likewise joined him. The Baron de Strasser marched towards Kazanecke, and coming near that place in sight of the Enemy, he drew up his Troops very advantageously, having a Morais on the back of them, but sinding the Tartars durst not attack him there, and not giving credit to the reports he had from the Country Peopie of their number, he advanced into an open Ground to charge them. The Fight was very desperate.

rate, but our Troops being suirounded by the Enemy (who of Turks, Turture, and Arnotes were near 40000 strong) were at last broke and overpowered by their numbers. The Prince of Hanoner was thin at the head of his Regiment of Horse, with his Major Count Ibirnie, all the Captains and Licutenants, and about 600 Men. Of the Regiment of Holsen the Major, all the Captains and Cornets, 8 Licutenants, and 450 Men, were killed or taken, and about 300 came off. Vienna, Jan. 26. The Turkish Envoys parted from hence yesterday under a good Convoy for Comorra, from whence they will pass down the Damibr to Belgrade. They had some days before a Conference with the Imperial Munisters, wherein they again declared, that they were not empowered by their last Instructions to agree to any thing more than the Cession of the Conquered places, pretending not only to keep Great Waradin, Tendswaer, Oc. but that Transilvanua, and Valachia should return under the protection of the Port. An Order has been published here requiring the Officers whose Troops are as present quartered in Valachia, and on the Frontiers of Hungary, to repair forthwith to their respective Commands.

Francfort, Febr. 3. We have an account from Ausbourg, by Letters of the 30th pass, that the King of the Romans was Crowned on the 26th with the usual Solemnities; that on the 28th the Electors of Bavarra and Cologne went for Manicke; That the rest of the Electors were on their departure; and that it was believed the whole Imperial Court would remove from thence is this day.
