A PROCLAMATION

For Dissolving this present Parliament, and Declaring the speedy Calling another.

WILLIAM R.

W Hereas We have thought fit, for divers Important and Weighty Considerations, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Dissolve Our present Parliament, which now stands Prorogued to the Second Day of April next; We do for that End Publish this Our Royal Proclamation, And do hereby Dissolve the same accordingly: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses of the said Parliament, are Discharged from their Meeting upon the said Second of April. And to the Intent Our good Subjects may perceive the Confidence We have in their good Affections, and how Desirous We are to Meet Our People, and Have their Advice in Parliament, We do hereby make Known to Our said Subjects, that We have given Directions to Our Lords Commissioners of Our Great Seal, for the Issuing out of Writs in due Form of Law for the Calling of a New Parliament, which shall begin and be holden at Westminster on Thursday the Twentieth Day of March next.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Sixth Day of February 1689. In the First Year of Our Reign.

Vienna, Jan. 24. The Letters from Nissa of the 4th Instant give the following account of the late Action between the Imperial Forces and the Tartars. The Duke of Holstein being informed that the Tartars were fallen into the Country between Kazanek and Pristina, and had made a great ravage, he sent out Colonel Strasser with a Detachment of Horse and Dragoons to give a stop to them; who meeting with a Body of 3 or 4000 of the Infidels, put them to flight, and returned with several Prisoners to Pristina. Soon after news was brought thither, that the Enemy did attack the Castle of Kazanek, in which there was an Imperial Garrison of about 80 Men; whereupon the Duke of Holstein, who had been himself indisposed for some time, commanded the Baron Strasser to march with the Regiments of Horie of Holstein and Hanouer, the Dragoons of Hanouer and Scirum, a Detachment of 200 Foot out of the Regiment of Aspremont, and 4 Pieces of Cannon, to observe the Enemy, but not to attempt any thing till the Regiment of Piccolomini had likewise joined him. The Baron de Strasser marched towards Kazanek, and coming near that place in sight of the Enemy, he drew up his Troops very advantageously, having a Morass on the back of them, but finding the Tartars durst not attack him there, and not giving credit to the reports he had from the Country People of their number, he advanced into an open Ground to charge them. The Fight was very desperate;
