

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 4th day of March, 1884.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),— in the borough of Burnley, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the west by the Leeds and Liverpool Canal from Phensantford Viaduct to Yorkshire-street Viaduct, on the north-west, north, and north-east to Brunshaw by the Municipal boundary, and the remainder by Brunshaw-road and Yorkshire-street to the Canal Viaduct,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the twenty-seventh day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Place (namely),— a field known as Lime Kiln Field, in the parish of Balsham, in the county of Cambridge, the property of Mr. William Purkis, together with two adjacent fields known respectively as The New Allotment and The Forty Acres,— which was declared by Order of Council dated the nineteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, to be a Place infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the sixth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The

Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The England and Wales Markets and Fairs Temporary Order of 1883 (in this Order referred to as the Markets Order) is hereby amended as follows:

Exclusion of certain Districts from Markets Order.

The provisions of the Markets Order shall not apply to the following Districts (namely),—

County of Norfolk,
Borough of King's Lynn,
Borough of Norwich,
Borough of Thetford,
Borough of Yarmouth,
County of Suffolk,
Borough of Beccles,
Borough of Bury St. Edmunds,
Borough of Eye,
Borough of Ipswich,
Borough of Southwold,
Borough of Sudbury,

and the Markets Order shall be read and have effect as if those Districts were included in the Schedule to that Order.

2. This Order may be cited as The England and Wales Markets and Fairs Temporary Order of 1883, Amendment No. 13.

1. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the seventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

SCHEDULE.

An Area in the counties of Westmorland and Cumberland, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the bridge over the river Eamont and the east side of the road to the Crown Hotel at Eamont Bridge, from there to a point opposite Southwaite Green Mill, following the south side of the road leading from Eamont to Yanwath to a field called Sutton Field adjoining the said road and now in the occupation of Mr. John Hodgson, thence along the outside north-west boundary of the lands occupied by the said John Hodgson and Lord Brougham and Vaux, thence in a direct line to Hughs Crag Bridge, thence along the north side of the London and North-Western Railway and of the Eden Valley Railway to the Bridge over the Railway at Weatheriggs Tillery, from the said Bridge on the north-west corner of the Plantation of Lord Hothfield called Leicet Wood, thence along the wall of the field of Mr. Richard Richardson to Whinfell Great Wood, thence following the stone wall dividing the farms of Mr. Richard Richardson and Mr. Thomas Mitchell to a point where Mr. Hutchinson's farm comes in, thence by a fence which divides the farms of Mr. Mitchell and Mr.
