Warsaw, January 20.

THE 16th Instant the General Dyct of this Kingdom was opened here with the usual Ceremony; and having chosen their Marshal or Speaker they entered upon the Debate of some Preliminary Points which hath taken up their time till now. To morrow they are according to Custom to Kiss the Kings Hand; and then we shall know what Matters will by his Command be proposed to their Consideration. In the mean time here are no less than 3 Persons with Publick Characters from France, to wit, the Marquiss de Beburnes, the Sieur de Gravelle, and the Sieur le Tellier, the first of these having taken upon him the Quality of Ambassador some few days only before the Meeting of the Dyct. We have advice from Melitrovia, that Mustapha Bassa had made a great Provision at Jassi for the Relief of Gaminiec, and that he expected Sultan Nouradin with 6000 Tartars to conduct this Convoy thither; which the Troops of this Kingdom are not at present in a condition to oppose. The Cossacks are resolved to join in a great Body with the Moseovites against the next Campaigne.

Genova, Febr. 4. By a Bark which arrived here on Sunday last from *Argiers*, we are informed, that the Algerines will not release any of the French Slaves, which are said to be there to the number of near 3000, till their Ships, taken by those of France, be restored. The Duke of *Tusis* is gone from hence to confer with the Governor of *Milan* upon some Instructions he has received from the Court of *Spain*. The Cardinal *Bonzi* is arrived here from *Leghorne* with two Gallies belonging to the Great Duke of *Tuscany*.

Venice, Febr. 10. We have an account by a Vessel arrived here this week from the *Levant*, That *Napoli di Malvasia* is still very closely block'd up, and that the Venetians have built several Forts, by means whereof the Blockade may be continued for the future with a much smaller number of Men than has been hitherto employed therein. That the Captain General *Cornaro* was at *Napoli di Romania*, where he had taken a review of the Troops quartered thereabouts; and expected the Succors that have been promised him from hence, with a resolution to take the Field so soon as they arrived. And that he had caused several new Works to be raised to secure the Passage or Isthmus between the Gulfe of *Le-panto* and that of *Engia*. We hear from *Malta*, that the Gallies of that Order would part from thence very speedily with a good Body of Land Forces for the Assistance of this Republick. By a Vessel from *Durazzo*, we are informed, that the Turks are drawing together what Troops they can in *Albania*, which are ordered to march towards *Bulgaria*. The Electoral Prince of *Saxony* is come hither, and intends to pass the Carneval in this City.

Vienna, Febr. 12. Their Imperial Majesties are arrived at *Munichen*; where they will pass several Days, and on the 25th of this Month the whole

Court is expected here again. We have no fresh News from *Bulgaria*. It's thought that the Ottoman Envoys will not be suffered to depart out of the Imperial Territories, till Satisfaction be given by the Turks for their late violating the Capitulation with the Garison of *Kazanock*. They write from *Copper-Hungary*, that the Turks having prepared a Convoy of Provisions for the Relief of *Great Waradin*, and being advanced with it as far as *Buzines*, the Count de *Corbelli* who commands at the Blockade of that place, marched upon advice thereof with a Detachment of Horse and Dragoons, but the Enemy having got notice of it, retired with precipitation, except some Troops that were left at *Beignes* to maintain that Post; but the Marquis de *Covellesi* ordered his Heydukes to advance and to attack the Palanque of *Beignes*, which they made themselves Masters of with little loss. We hear that the Enemy have got some Provisions into *Canisa*, which has very much encouraged that Garison.

Frankfort, Febr. 18. The Elector of *Mentz* arrived yesterday at *Lohr* on the *Main* in his return from *Ausbourg*, and is expected here to morrow, intending to pass some time in this City. The Burghers have Orders to be in Arms to receive him.

Cologne, Febr. 21. The Confederate Troops at *Bon* are now preparing to march from thence, in whose place the four Bavarian Regiments, at present quartered in that Neighbourhood, are to enter into Garison there. There is a report, that the Tartars have made a great Incurfion into *Valachia*.

Hague, Febr. 24. The Count d'*Oxenstern*, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Sueden*, had this day a Conference with the Deputies of the States-General concerning two Suedish Ships that have been brought in by the Dutch Privateers. All the Officers that are here are commanded to repair forthwith to their respective Commands.

Edinburgh, Febr. 19. The Parliament is Adjourned from the first to the 18th of the next Month. On the 14th Instant marched from hence Baron *Ferrells* Regiment of Danish Horse; That of *Donop*, which was quartered at *Dalkeith* and *Musseburg*, is likewise on its march, together with the Foot from *Leith*, in order to their passing over to *Ireland*.

Plimouth, Febr. 18. This morning several Dutch Merchant Men, together with the Danes, Suedes, and Hamburgers that are outward bound, set sail, the Wind at E. N. E. but before they were a League from this Port the Wind came Southerly, and forced them all back again. And this Evening arrived here two Ships of *London* from *Falmouth* that came lately from the *Streights*.

Clester, Febr. 19. A Vessel is arrived here with Letters and Passengers from *Bejest*, which informs us, that his Grace the Duke of *Schomberg* had upon the

the news, that the Irish were drawing together about Dundalke, commanded some Troops to advance that way, but a Party going as far as Carlingford without hearing any thing of the Enemy, and returning with a good Booty, the Troops that were in motion were remanded to their Quarter, except a Detachment of 300 Horse and 300 Foot which were ordered to advance towards Dundalke; and were not yet return'd. But there was a strong report, that our Troops had had a considerable Advantage over the Rebels, of which we must expect a farther account. We hear likewise that the Charles Galley had taken 5 Gabarts, and sunk 3 which were going with Forage and Provisions from Dublin to Dundalke.

Portsmouth, Febr. 20. This morning failed from St. Helens their Majesties Ship the Duke having on board the Queen of Spain, with the rest of the Fleet under the Command of Admiral Russel, and all the English and Dutch Merchant Ships outward bound, making together about 200 Sail.

Deale, Febr. 22. The Ships bound for Virginia failed yesterday under the Convoy of two Men of War, the Samuel and Henry, and the Scepter. There are now in the Downes their Majesties Ships the Crown and the Bonaventure.

Whitehall, Febr. 20. This day the Sieur Denmark, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, had his publick Audience of Their Majesties, to Congratulate Their Happy Accession to the Crown, being Conducted in the usual manner by Sir Charles Cotterell Master of the Ceremonies.
