A DESPATCH, from which the following is an extract, has been received from Rear-Admiral Sir N. W. Hewett, K.C.B., K.C.S.I., V.C., Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's ships and vessels on the East Indian Station, enclosing a report, a copy of which is appended, from Major-General Sir Gerald Graham, K.C.B., V.C., on the services rendered by the Naval Brigade during the operations connected with the action of Tamai on 13th March, 1884:—

Extract from Despatch, dated 2nd April, 1884, from Rear-Admiral Sir William Hewett, K.C.B., K.C.S.I., V.C.

"ON the 11th March, at the request of the General Officer Commanding, I landed a Naval Brigade, similar in strength to that which had been attached to the force for the relief of Tokar. I beg to enclose, for the information of their Lordships, a copy of General Graham's report on the services which Commander Ernest Rolfe, the officers, and men of this Brigade rendered."

From Major-General Sir Gerald Graham, K.C.B., V.C., Commanding Expeditionary Force, to Rear-Admiral Sir William Hewett, K.C.B., K.C.S.I., V.C., Commander-in-Chief, East India Station.

Sir, Suakin, March 30, 1884.

ON the 3rd March I had the honour of reporting to you on the conduct of the Naval Brigade under Commander Rolfe, R.N., during the operations connected with the relief of Tokar; I now beg to forward a report from Commander Rolfe, dated 16th March, 1884, on the proceedings of the Naval Brigade, during the operations connected with the action of Tamai on the 13th March.

Here, as at El-Teb, the Naval Brigade displayed the utmost gallantry, and I deeply regret their heavy loss during the temporary check to the advance of the 2nd Brigade. It is a significant proof of the coolness and gallantry of the officers and men of the Naval Brigade, that during all the heat and excitement of the enemy's desperate charge, when three officers and seven men were

killed beside their guns, not one of these guns was allowed to fall into the enemy's hands before it had been secured by the safety key from being turned against us. The machine guns did excellent service both before and after this temporary reverse. As in the previous operations, I cannot too highly praise the endurance and discipline shown by the men when toiling with their guns under a burning sun over heavy ground, or when under fire, in bivouac, or in action.

I must again bring to your notice the coolness in action, readiness, and power of command shown by Commander Rolfe, R.N., and he specially mentions Lieutenant Graham, R.N., Mr. Edward Tyndale Biscoe, and Mr. Edward Hyde Hewett, Midshipmen of the "Euryalus," also the Reverend Mr. Todd and Doctor Gimlette.

As the military operations are now concluded, I must beg to express my thanks and those of the force under my command, to you, Sir, for your unvarying courtesy and readiness to meet all our requirements, and to express my opinion that the success of the expedition has been very materially furthered by your personal influence. I have also to express my thanks for the untiring zeal and devotion with which the naval officers and men have worked day and night when required at embarking and disembarking troops and stores. I may also be allowed to express my admiration at the skill and ability displayed by those in authority in organizing the transport arrangements, and in the difficult tasks of embarking and disembarking numbers of riding horses and transport animals, besides troops and stores. In all this trying work the naval and military officers employed have, I am happy to say, worked together in perfect harmony, having one object in common, the furtherance of the expedition. The duties of embarking and disembarking were most efficiently carried out by Captain Andoe, of Her Majesty's ship "Orontes," in conjunction with Lieutenant-Colonel Gordon, Deputy-Assistant Quartermaster-General, and with the following officers under him:—

For a short time before the arrival of Captain Andoe from Trinkitat, the disembarkation at Suakin was in charge of Commander Rolfe, who was as efficient and thorough in discharge of those duties as when commanding the Naval Brigade.

The arrangements for condensing and storage of water were under charge of Mr. Crook, Chief Engineer of Her Majesty's ship "Euryalus," and to the skill and care shown by that officer I attribute the fact that the supply at the base was always ample for all requirements.

Mr. Crook was associated with a military officer, generally Major Wood, R.E., and was assisted by a naval officer, at Trinkitat, by Lieutenant Broadley, Her Majesty's ship "Junna," and at Suakin, by Lieutenant and Commander Bigge, Her Majesty's ship "Decoy."

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 30th day of April, 1884.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue of and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—so much of the county of Westmorland as is comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the lowest point of Brougham Castle farm on the right bank of the river Eamont, along the fence dividing this farm from Mr. Mitchell's Whinfall Park farm to the Lightwater Stream, then by the left bank of this stream to the south side of Temple Sowerby-road, then along the wall to the corner of the wall bounding Mrs. Croome's Great Pasture, following this wall southwards to the Fremington-road, there crossing to the south side of the road and by the east fence of Fremington to the Pembroke House farm east fence, thence by the fence bounding Lord Brougham's Narrow Plantation to a straight fence running northwards to Pembroke House, passing twenty yards from the farm buildings and crossing the road at the west corner of the stackyard to the Brougham Park wall, then following the said wall to the river Lowther and along the right bank of the river to a point opposite the centre of Pembroke House Holme, then crossing the river and by a straight line of fence to the nearest point on the river Eamont, thence along the right bank of this river to the point first-mentioned,—which was declared by Order of Council to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

"April 30.—In mail steamers and war ships with medical service, twenty-four hours quarantine after a passage of ten days or over. Other steamers twenty-four hours quarantine after a passage of thirteen days and over. If the passage is under thirteen days the period of quarantine is by scale to bring it to fourteen days."

following translation of a Quarantine Notice issued by the Italian Government, viz. :—

“ORDINANCE OF MARITIME HEALTH. No. 6.

“The Ministry of the Interior :

“With reference to the Law of March 20th, 1865, cap. C, on Public Health, and the Ministerial Instructions of December 26th, 1871 :

“Having received official information that cholera, which is rife in various spots in Hindostan, has assumed the form of an epidemic in Calcutta :

“DECREES :

“ART. I. The quarantine of observation prescribed by Ordinance No. 5 of the 28th of March last, will, from to-day's date be raised to five days for all vessels arriving from the Coasts of Hindostan and the Burman Empire, included between the Mouths of the Indus and the Ava, or Irawaddy, provided that these vessels arrive without a case of illness during the passage and without having undergone a corresponding period of quarantine in some intermediate roadstead, on which there is no quarantine.

“ART. II. For vessels arriving without a case of illness during the passage from all other harbours and roadsteads, not Egyptian, situated beyond the Suez Canal, the quarantine of observation of three days, prescribed by Ordinance No. 5 of the 28th of March last, remains fixed, provided that they cannot prove on their arrival that they have already undergone a corresponding period of observation in some intermediate roadstead against which there is no quarantine.

“ART. III. For vessels arriving from the above places, which have had during the passage, or have at their arrival the slightest suspicion of choleraic affection among the persons on board, or if they are found to be in an unsatisfactory sanitary condition, the strict quarantine of twenty days prescribed by Ordinance No. 9 of July 3rd, 1883, remains fixed.

“ART. IV. The prohibition of the importation of rags, scraps, and unwashed old clothes from Egypt, Syria, and all the ports situated beyond the Suez Canal is still maintained.

“The Prefects of the Maritime Provinces are charged with the execution of this Ordinance.

To all to whom these presents shall come the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and the Right Reverend Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the Diocese of Rochester, send greeting:

WHEREAS a church has lately been built within the limits of the parish of Sutton, in the county of Surrey, and in the said diocese of Rochester, by and at the expense of certain well disposed persons, who have, with the approbation of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, and of the said Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, secured to the said new church an endowment and a repair fund, in accordance with the provisions of the several Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts," or of some of them, and particularly of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her present Majesty, chapter ninety-seven.

And whereas under the powers or authorities contained in the said Acts or in some of them, and in the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, with the consent of the said Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, by an instrument bearing date on or about the twenty-fourth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, declared that the perpetual right of patronage of, and of nominating a minister to serve, the said new church from time to time and at all times whenever it should be requisite to nominate a minister to serve the same should, from and after the consecration of such church, be vested in, and be exercised by, and belong to the said Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, and by his successors Bishops of that diocese for ever.

And whereas the said church has since been consecrated, and is called "The Church of Saint Barnabas, Sutton New Town."

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commis-

sioners for England deem it expedient that a particular district, to comprise a portion of the said parish of Sutton and a portion of the new parish of Benhilton, in the said county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Rochester aforesaid, and also a portion of the parish of Carshalton, in the same county and diocese, should be assigned to the said church of Saint Barnabas, Sutton New Town, and also that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church.

Now know ye, that the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in exercise and execution of the powers or authorities for this purpose contained in the several Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts" as aforesaid, or in some of them, and particularly in the Act of the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter thirty-eight, in the said Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and also in the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling them in this behalf, do hereby, with the consent of the said Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (testified by his being a party to and executing these presents), assign to the said church of Saint Barnabas, Sutton New Town, as a particular district, all those portions of the said parish of Sutton, of the said new parish of Benhilton, and of the said parish of Carshalton, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended, and do direct that the same district shall be called "The Particular District of Saint Barnabas, Sutton New Town."

And the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the like consent of the said Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (testified as aforesaid), in further exercise and execution of the powers or authorities contained in the said Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts," or in some of them, and particularly in the said Act of the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter thirty-eight, in the Act of the third and fourth years of Her present Majesty, chapter sixty, in the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-six (such two lastly-mentioned Acts being also two of "The Church Building Acts" before named), in the said Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and in the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling them in this behalf, do hereby determine and declare that banns of matrimony shall be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be solemnized or performed at the church of the said particular district of Saint Barnabas, Sutton New Town, and do hereby order and direct that all the fees, dues, offerings, or other emoluments to be received in respect of such publication of banns of matrimony, and of such solemnization or performance of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials at the same church shall, from and after the next avoidance of the three cures aforesaid, namely, the parish of Sutton, the new parish of Benhilton, and the parish of Carshalton, as such avoidances shall respectively occur, belong to the Incumbent for the time being of the said particular district of Saint Barnabas, Sutton New Town: Provided always, that

nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

In witness whereof, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have hereunto affixed their common seal, and the said Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, has hereunto set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal, this third day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

WHEREAS by section 15 of "The Annual Turnpike Acts Continuance Act, 1873," it is enacted that if any Highway Board or other Local Authority shall be desirous of taking upon themselves the maintenance and repair of the roads of any turnpike Trusts within or passing through their Districts, such Highway Board or other Local Authority may, if not less than one-half in length of such road is within the District, apply to the Local Government Board to determine the value of the existing debt and other liabilities of such Turnpike Trust, and the Local Government Board may, by Order made after such inquiry and the publication of such notice as they may think sufficient, determine the value of such debt and liabilities ; and the Trustees and other persons interested in such debt and liabilities shall accept a sum equivalent to the value so determined as a full and complete discharge of such debt and liabilities ; and from and after a day to be fixed by the said Local Government Board no tolls shall be levied on the roads theretofore included within the District of such Turnpike Trust ; and in case the said Turnpike Trust shall extend beyond the District of the Highway Board or Local Authority making the application as aforesaid, it shall be lawful for the said Local Government Board to apportion the value of the debts and liabilities of such Turnpike Trust so determined as aforesaid between the several Local Authorities through whose Districts the Roads of such Turnpike Trust extend, and each such Local Authority shall raise and pay to the Trustees the amount apportioned to such Authority ;

Provided that an Order made under this Section shall not take effect until the expiration of one calendar month after the same has been published in the London Gazette and some local newspaper, circulating in the locality of the Turnpike Trust affected thereby ; and if two-thirds in number and value of the creditors of the Trust shall give notice in writing to the Local Government Board, before such Order takes effect, that they object to the same, the Order shall be provisional only, and shall not come into operation until it has been confirmed by Parliament ;

And whereas by Section 11 of "The Annual Turnpike Acts Continuance Act, 1874," it is enacted that where the Local Government Board in exercise of the discretionary power conferred upon them by Section 15 of "The Annual Turnpike Acts Continuance Act, 1873," make an Order determining the value of the existing debt and liabilities of a Turnpike Trust, the Board may by the same Order declare to whom and in respect of

what claim or claims the whole or any part of the value of such debt and liabilities is to be paid ;

And whereas the said Trustees of the Ford and Lowick Turnpike Roads were appointed for the execution of the provisions of "The Ford and Lowick Turnpike Trust Act, 1867 ;"

And whereas it is enacted by "The Annual Turnpike Acts Continuance Act, 1883," that the said Ford and Lowick Turnpike Trust Act, 1867, shall be subject to certain modifications specified therein and shall, as so modified, continue in force until the 1st day of November, 1886 : Provided that if the tolls should cease to be levied upon the roads to which the said Act of 1867 is applicable before the 1st day of November, 1886, in pursuance of an Order made by the Local Government Board under Section 15 of the Turnpike Acts Continuance Act, 1873, the said Act of 1867 shall in that case expire on the date when the tolls shall so cease to be levied ;

And whereas the Highway Board for the said Glendale Highway District, within which District not less than one-half of the roads of the said Turnpike Trust is situate, have applied to the Local Government Board under Section 15 of the Act first above-cited to determine the value of the existing debt and liabilities of the said Turnpike Trust ;

And whereas the Local Government Board directed local inquiry to be held after due notice into the subject-matter of the said application, and such inquiry has been held and report has been made to them thereon :

Now therefore, we, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby determine that the value of the existing debt and liabilities of the said Ford and Lowick Turnpike Trust is the sum of one thousand two hundred and forty-six pounds nineteen shillings and twopence (£1,246 19s. 2d.).

And we hereby Order as follows :—

ARTICLE I.—The said sum of £1,246 19s. 2d. shall be apportioned between the said Highway Boards for the Districts of Glendale, and Norham and Islandshires (such Highway Boards being the Local Authorities through whose Districts the roads of the said Turnpike Trust extend), as follows, namely—

and the said Highway Boards shall, as soon as this Order shall have taken effect, raise the sums so apportioned to them respectively and pay the same to the Trustees of the said Turnpike Roads.

ARTICLE II.—The day from and after which no tolls shall be levied on the roads included within the district of the said Turnpike Trust shall, unless this Order shall become Provisional, be the ninth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four. If this Order shall become Provisional and shall be confirmed by Parliament, the day from and after which no tolls shall be levied on the said roads shall be such as we shall by Order hereafter determine.

ARTICLE III.—The said sum of £1,246 19s. 2d. shall be applied by the Trustees of the said Turnpike Roads rateably in discharge of such of the liabilities specified in Schedules 1 and 2 to the said Ford and Lowick Turnpike Trust Act, 1867, as have not already been discharged.

ARTICLE IV.—This Order shall, on or before the sixth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, be published by the Trustees of the said Turnpike Roads in the London Gazette

and some local newspaper circulating in the locality of the said Turnpike Trust.

BYE-LAWS and Regulations made by the Promoters of the Worcester Tramways, under the powers conferred on them by the Tramways Act, 1870.

1. The Bye-laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Promoters, and to all places with respect to which they have power to make bye-laws or regulations.

2. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindermost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise.

3. No passenger shall smoke inside any carriage.

4. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any carriage, play or perform upon any musical instrument.

5. A person in a state of intoxication shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

6. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

7. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or on the carriage, or break or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these bye-laws and regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

8. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in the interior of any carriage, and may be prevented from entering the interior of any carriage, and shall not enter the interior of any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and, if found in the interior of any carriage, shall, on request of the conductor, leave the interior of the carriage upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor or other duly authorized officer of the Promoters the fare legally demandable for the journey.

10. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do to the conductor or any duly authorized servant of the Promoters, and shall also when required so to do either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

11. A passenger not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Promoters, shall not use or attempt to use any ticket intended only for such artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

12. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage.

13. No passenger or other person not being a servant of the Promoters shall be permitted to travel on the steps or platforms of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage, and shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

14. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage, or travel therein otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

15. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is licensed to contain, no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage when warned by the conductor not to do so.

16. The conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the licensed number to enter or mount or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

17. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave, any carriage whilst in motion.

18. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage, except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to passengers. No person shall take a dog or other animal into any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor. Any dog or other animal taken into or

on any carriage in breach of this regulation shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the carriage immediately upon request by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

19. No person shall travel in or on any carriage of the Promoters with loaded fire-arms, or gun-powder or other explosive materials.

20. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Promoters in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Promoters.

21. The conductor of each carriage shall enforce or prevent the breach of these bye-laws and regulations to the best of his ability.

22. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these bye-laws or regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

23. The expression "conductor" shall include any officer or servant in the employment of the Promoters, and having charge of a carriage.

24. There shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each carriage in use a printed copy of these bye-laws and regulations.

25. These bye-laws shall come into force on the 1st day of July, 1884.
