all their Ammunition which was lodged in the Town; so some as my Menhave restreshed themselves I will have another bout with them for the Fort, which I believe they will quit of themselves, sor they have no Provisions or Cover for their Men now the Town is destroyed. We have lost about 20 Men; my Major Traherne, and Captain Armstrong, and Captain Mayo, with Captain La Maugere, a French Resorm'd Officer, were killed, and captain Blood an Ingenier shot in the side; Of the Enemy 300 were killed; and four Captains, sive Lieutenants, two Enigns, and a Quartermalter, with about 200 Men taken Prisoners. Our Men shewed in this (as in former Occasions) a very great forwardness to engage the Enemy notwithstanding the inequality of their number, and gave new proofs of their Courage and Bravery, and particularly Major General Kirke's Men. The eight French Officers your Grace sent hither likewise behaved themselves very well.

This day came in an other Express from Colonel Welfeley with the following account, written at Belsurbas the 14th of whis Month.

*Since I writ my last a Gentleman is come hither from the County of W.stmeath, who tells me he saw after the Fight at Cavan great numbers of Soldiers all without Arms, having thrown them away in their Flight; so that the Road and Ditches were filled with them; That he saw likewise a great many wounded Men; among whom were several Officers; That Brigadier Nug.nt was mortally wounded; and that the Irish swn the Loss of 300 Men and of 14 Commission Officers killed upon the place; He says there is a great quantity of Hay laid up at Finagle, and that all the Horses in the County were present to carry the same to Cavan, but that the noise of this Deseat had put a stop to in. We have taken from the Enemy 4000 pound in Brass Money.

Just now Sir John Lanier sends us word, that he matched salf Friday night from Nury towards Dundathe, that passing by Bedlee Castle, in which there was a mangen with 34 Men. Colonel Levesons Dragoons immediately Stormed it, killed 10 of the Rebels, and took the rest Prisoners, and burnt the Castle in which there was a great deal of Provisions; Then they advanced to the back of the Town of Dundathe, Brigadier Steward marching at the same time with the Foot to the other side of the Town, and burnt about 20 Houses; the Garison keeping close within their Intrenchment; After which they returned to Neury with a Booty of 1000 Cowes and 200 Garones, having had a French Lieutenant killed and four or five Dragoons wounded.
