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Venice, March 3.

A Vessel is arrived herein 34 days from Constantinople, and another in two Months from Smyrna; all the News they bring, is, That the new Viceroy *Muperli* does wholly apply himself to the carrying on of the War; That he had sent Chiaufes into all parts of the Empire to raise Men; and that he designed to have made *Mezzomorto*, late Bash of *Argiers*, Captain of *Bulla*, and had accordingly sent for him, but understood afterwards that he was fled from *Argiers* upon some Disturbance that had happened there. The Troops of *Wirtemberg* and *Wolfenbuttel* are marched to *Verona* to Quarter thereabouts: But those of *Bavaria* continue at the *Lido*, and will pass with the first Convoy to the *Levant*.

Vienna, March 5. Their Imperial Majesties, with the King of the *Romans*, arrived the second Instant at *Closter Neubourg*; From whence they came hither yesterday, making their Entry into this City with great Solemnity; The Cannon were thrice discharged, and at night there were Bonfires and Illuminations. It is contained by Letters of the 12th past from *Nissa*, That the *Tatars* had repassed the *Danube*, and were gone home to secure their Country against the Invasion of the *Moscovites*, whom they had taken in their late Incursions. Our Advices add, That the *Turks* had quitted *Prissina* and *Pecchia*, but that they had put a Garrison into *Prissina*; and that 1000 *Turks* and *Arnotes* had posted themselves near the Pass of *Coffara*, that leads towards *Bosnia*; upon News whereof, the *Sieur Birkenfeldt* was sent with a strong Detachment from *Nissa*, to fall upon them. That Captain *Stramberg* was arrived at *Nissa* with the Garrison of *Kazanek*, (who were reported to have been put to the Sword by the *Turks* after they had surrendered upon Articles) with about 200 Men more, who were dispersed after the defeat of Colonel *Strassle*. That 20 Wagons were arrived at *Nissa* with Provisions and Ammunition from *Belgrade*. That *Tenswaer* was block'd up by the Imperial Garrisons in *Lippa*, *Lepos*, and *Cerasulber*, and was reduced to great Necessity. And that General *Hessler* was at *Cranstadt* in *Transylvania*; but intended to march again into *Valachia*, to oblige the Prince and States of that Country to make good their late Agreement with Prince *Louis*, by which they are to furnish a certain number of Horses for the use of the Imperial Troops, and Provisions, or Money in lieu thereof, for their Subistence.

Frankfort, March 12. The Imperial Commissaries are busied with providing Magazines in this and other places in *Franconia* against the next Campaign. A Party from *Mentz* meeting this week 50 French Horses, who were sent out to burn some Villages, killed 30, and took 10 Prisoners.

Cologne, March 14. Lieutenant-General *Spaen* has been at *Bon*, to take a review of the Troops in Garrison there. On Friday last 800 French Horses appeared near *Sarzig*, about 4 German Miles from *Bon*, whereupon a Detachment of *Brandenburgers* was sent out against them, but the Enemy retired towards *Kempnich*. We hear from *Coblentz*, That 120 *Indians*, that marched from thence the 12th Instant, met a French Party between *St. Gregoys* and *Maren*, whom they put to flight, killing several, and taking 6 Prisoners.

Hannover, March 14. The Bishop of *Munster* has given our Commissioners the raising of several new Regiments, intending, as we are assured, to assist the Empire with 10000 Men this next Campaign. The Count de *B. de* is to Command the 6000 *Suedes*, which are to join with the Confederate Forces on the *Rhine*. The Electors

of *Saxony* and *Brandenburg* have had a Conference at *Crossen*, as it's believed, about the Business of *Saxe Lawenburg*.

Brussels, March 15. The last Courier from *Spain* brought a Commission for Count *Salazar*, Lieutenant-General of the Horse, to be Governor of the Town and Citadel of *Ghent*. The Regiment of Dragoons of *Hwaer*, and that of Horse of *Brancaccio*, that were Quartered here, marched on Wednesday last to *Charleroy*, and a great Convoy of Provisions and Ammunition has been sent thither from *Mulines*. There have been Reinforcements likewise sent to our other Frontier Garrisons. We hear, That an *Officer* *Caper* has taken 4 or 5 small Vessels that were going with Provisions and Ammunition to *Dunkirk*.

Paris, March 17. The King returned the 7th Instant from *Compeigne*. He has made two new Lieutenant-Generals, to wit, *La Rablere*, and *Langalerie*, 9 *Marschalls de Camp*, the Counts de *Siffen*, *Villars*, *Melic*, *Cogny*, *Lambre*, *St. Silvester*, *Quanon*, *Daguast*, and *Longueval*, and divers Brigadiers of Horse, Foot, and Dragoons. His said, the Dauphin is to Command the Army towards *Germany*, and the *Marschalls de Duras* and *Large* under him. The Dauphiness continues very ill. Our Affairs with *Rome* seem to tend towards an Accommodation.

Hague, March 17. The States of *Holland* have resolved to raise the Hundred Penny, to be paid one half in *May*, and the other in *August* next. They have resolved likewise to take up four Millions of *Gilders* at 4 per Cent, and that the Lenders shall be exempted from this Hundred Penny. The Conference of the Ministers of the Alliance was held yesterday in the *Truce-Chamber*, where the Powers were mutually examined. The Baron de *G. G.* is arrived here as Plenipotentiary from the Duke of *Hannover*. Prince *Waldecke* will part from hence in 8 or 10 days to visit the Frontier Garrisons, and to give Orders about the Troops, which will now very suddenly begin to march. In the meantime, all Officers are ordered to repair immediately to their respective Commands.

Edinburgh, March 6. The Danish Fleet, that lately marched from hence, are all on board: The Horse will Embark the next week for *Ireland*; and will be speedily followed by the other Regiments designed thither from hence.

Lisburne, March 3. His Grace the Duke of *Schomberg* has received Letters from Colonel *Wolfe*, giving an account, That he had certain advice from *Crowan*, that the Duke of *Berwick* had left that place, and was gone back to *Dublin*, and that the Troops he had with him were returned to their Quarters, there remaining only the old Garrison under the Command of Brigadier *Wanchep*. And that so soon as the weather was a little more favorable, he did not doubt but to beat the Enemy out of *Crowan*, and all the places they are possess'd of in that Part.

Whitehaven, March 2. Four hundred Danish Foot are Embarked here, and will sail this Afternoon for *Ireland*.

Falmouth, March 6. Yesterday came in here about 25 Sail of Merchant Men bound for *Virginia*, under the Convoy of the *Samuel* and *Henry*, and the *Scepter*: They will sail again with the first fair Wind.

Plymouth, March 9. On Friday last the Fleet with the Queen of *Spain* set sail from *London*. And this day sailed from hence the Ships bound for the *West-Indies*, with the Convoy, the Wind blowing fresh at E.N.E. and fair weather.

Convent, March 9. On Thursday last came into this Road Their Majesty's Ship the *Swallow*, and yesterday she sailed again with several Vessels bound for *Guatemala*. A Dutch Privateer brought in here last night a Vessel of *Berwick* of 150 and 400 Tuns, laden with Salt and Brandy.

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
