THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and under and in pursuance of The Swine-Fever (Infected Circles) Order of 1884 (in this Order referred to as the Circles Order), do direct and order, and it is hereby directed and ordered, as follows:

1. The Circles Order shall, from the dates mentioned in Article 2 of this Order, apply and extend to and be in force in the Districts mentioned in the Schedule to this Order, and shall continue to apply and extend to and be in force in those Districts until the Privy Council by further Special Order direct and order.

2.—(1.) The provisions of Article 5 (*Power to Local Authority to make Regulations*) of the Circles Order shall apply and extend to and be in force in such Districts from the date of this Order.

(2.) Except as aforesaid, the provisions of the Circles Order shall apply and extend to and be in force in such Districts from and immediately after the twenty-sixth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

(**FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.**)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 26th day of August, 1884.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The

Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—the parishes of Stoke Holy Cross, Dunston, Poringland, Shotesham St. Mary and St. Martin, Shotesham All Saints, and Swainsthorpe, in the county of Norfolk,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the ninth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-seventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.
