THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Monte Video, reporting, under date of July 14th, that the Sanitary Board of Monte Video has just issued a Decree subjecting all vessels proceeding from Toulon, Marseilles, or other places where cholera is known to exist to eight days quarantine on arrival at Monte Video, a period which will be prolonged to ten days in case of any instance of serious ill-health having occurred on board during the voyage out, and of fifteen days should any person among crew or passengers happen to be manifestly or possibly suffering from cholera at the date of arrival and inspection. These provisions will apply to any other ports in the Old or New World in which cholera may declare itself.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Christiania, intimating that the Norwegian Government have declared all the ports in Great Britain and Ireland, Belgium, and Holland, as well as the German ports in the North Sea, infected with cholera, no quarantine, however, being imposed upon vessels arriving from an infected port unless cases of cholera have actually occurred on the passage, in which event they must proceed to the Quarantine Establishment at Christiansand and there undergo five days quarantine. Vessels with clean bills of health, although arriving from infected ports, are not obliged to proceed to Christiansand, but are, after examination at the port of arrival, permitted to land passengers, &c., if there is no disease on board.
