The Minister of the Interior.

With reference to the Law of March 20, 1855. cap. C. on Public Health, and to the vote of the

Superior Council of Health. Decrees :-ART. I. The quarantine established by the Decree of the 22nd of July last at the frontier of Italy, in the provinces of Turin, Cuneo, and Port Manrizio, is abolished.

ART. 2. At the said frontiers the prohibition of the importation of rags, scraps, unwashed old clothes, used bedding, selvages and lint, remain in force until further orders.

The Prefects of the above-mentioned provinces are charged with the execution of this Ordinance. Rome, September 12, 1884.
