

movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Every person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the person so authorized under this Article to demand the movement licence.

Offences.

10.—(1.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, or of the conditions of a movement licence thereunder, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(2.) If a person in charge of swine being moved, where under this Order a movement licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

Also that vessels coming with a clean bill of health through the Suez Canal from Red Sea ports will be received in free pratique provided they abstain from taking passengers in Egypt.
