Venice, March 10.

There are Letters from *Napoli di Romania* of the 23d of the last Month, which inform us, That the Captain-General *Cornaro* had taken a Review of the Troops quartered thereabouts: And that upon Advice, that the Turks were fitting out several Vessels at *Scio* and *Canea* to carry Succors to *Napoli di Malvasia*, he had sent Captain *Nicolo Pisani* with three Frigates, to reinforce the Squadron that was appointed to cruise on that Coast. The Troops of *Wirttemberg* and *Welfenbuttel*, that returned lately from the *Levant*, are now Quartered about *Verona*, and will, so soon as the weather is a little more favourable, begin their march towards *Germany*; From whence we are expecting 2000 Men, which the Duke of *Mecklenburg Gustraw* is, according to the Treaty made with him, to send to the Assistance of this Republick.

Marsaw, Feb. 17. The Dyet of this Kingdom is still Assembled, but without coming as yet to any Resolution about the Matters the King proposed to them at their first Meeting, their Debates thereupon having been often interrupted by other Affairs, though of much lesser Importance. On the 11th Instant, one of the Deputies pretending to be dissatisfied with the Matter then in debate, protested, according to the Liberty which the Laws of the Kingdom give to all the Members of the Dyet, against all the Resolutions that should be taken, and so left the Assembly, which must thereupon have broke up, had he not been prevailed with by some Persons of the chiefest Quality, who went to him for that purpose, to return to his Place in the Dyet. The French Minister is ordered immediately to depart this Kingdom, upon the discovery of his Cabals to embroil the Publick Affairs, and to hinder the good conclusion of the Dyet. It is continued, that the Tartars have lately put a Convoy of Provisions into *Cumniee*, which began to be very much streightened for want thereof.

Vienna, March 12. The last Advices from *Bulgaria* tell us, That the Imperialists continue to work with an extraordinary diligence on the Fortifications of *Nissa*, *Widin*, and their other Frontier Places, which they have already put into a very good Posture of Defence: And that several Officers and Soldiers, who were taken Prisoners in the Fight of *Kazanecke*, and had afterwards made their Escape, arrived daily at *Nissa*, and gave an account of the terrible Ravage the Tartars had made in the County of *Cassova*, &c. and of the great numbers of People they had carried away with them. The Imperial Forces that block up *Canisa*, have taken a Turkish Officer, who was going from that Garrison to the Grand Visier and the Basha of *Bosnia*, to acquaint them with the Condition they were reduced to, and that they should be forced, if not speedily relieved, to surrender the place. The Turkish Envoy is still at *Coverra*, and it's said, they will be permitted to stay there, till they have sent to the Port for farther Instructions. This week arrived here the Lord *Packer* Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Great Britain*, having on the 28th of the last Month waited upon the Elector Palatine at *Nembourg*, to deliver a Letter from His Majesty; where his Lordship was received with all imaginable Honor and Respect.

Frankfort, March 20. Several Regiments of the Forces of *Hesse Cassel* marched through this place on the 14th Instant, being ordered, in pursuance of the Measures taken among the Allies, to enter into the *Bergstrasse*, and to post themselves between the *Main* and the *Neckar*; and the Count de *Lippe*, who Commands them, is expected

here in two or three days. They write from *Basse* of the 12th Instant, That the Imperialists do assemble some Troops near *Rhinfeldt*, and that they are fortifying a very advantageous Post on the *Rhine* near *Augst*, the Frontier of *Suisse*.

Cologne, March 17. The Electoral Prince Palatine has named the Baron de *Wanghe* to go in the Quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of *Portugal*, whither he will very speedily begin his Journey. The Baron de *Spizen* returned hither the 15th, and had the next day a Conference with the other Generals at present here.

Paris, March 21. The King has declared, that the Dauphin shall Command his Forces this Summer in *Germany*; and his Equipage is accordingly preparing, which is to be ready by the 10th of the next Month; but he will not part from hence himself till about the 20th, intending, as 'tis said, to be at *Strasbourg* on the first of *May*. Monsieur de *Carinat* is to Command a Body of 10 or 12000 Men towards *Italy*. The King has named the Archbishop of *Paris* to be a Cardinal, at the first Promotion that shall be made in favour of the Crowns. The Bishops that have not yet their Bulls, are to meet here, in order to write a Submissive Letter to the Pope, upon which they hope to obtain them. We hear, that the King of *Poland* is entered into new Engagements with the Emperor. The Dauphiness continues extremely ill.

Hague, March 24. The Plenipotentiaries of the Allies had a second Conference yesterday, and have resolved to meet constantly on Mondays and Thursdays. The Baron de *Goers* the elder is arrived here, with the Character of Plenipotentiary from the Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel*, and will assist at the next Meeting. Prince *Waldack* will part from hence the next week to visit the Frontier Garrisons, and to give Orders about the opening of the Campaign. The Count de *Solmes* arrived here yesterday from *Germany*.

Lisburne, March 9. Colonel *Wolfeley* has, by his Letters of the 4th Instant from *Belturbat*, given his Grace the Duke of *Schomberg* an account; That he sent out the night before a Party, under the Command of Lieutenant-Colonel *Echlin* and Major *Billing*, to beat up the Enemies Quarters at *Cavan*; and at the same time gave Orders for the attacking of *Butlers-bridge* the next morning by break of day, which was accordingly done by a Party of Horse and 50 Foot of Colonel *Earle's* Detachment, who behaved themselves extremely well, and beat the Rebels from their Breast-work, and getting over the River, pursued them, who were about 60, killed 20, and took 16 Prisoners, among whom was the Captain that Commanded them, and an Ensign; without the loss of a Man on our side, only a Cornet wounded. From thence our Horse marched to *Cavan*, and joyned our other Party. The Enemy had notice of their coming, and had posted themselves behind the Walls of the Houses that were burnt the last time, but our Men advancing under their Shot, beat them from thence, killed between 60 and 80 of them, and burnt the remaining Houses, Colonel *Wauchope*, who Commands in the Fort, not daring to stir out. We lost in this Action 8 Men, and an Ensign of Major-General *Kirk's* Regiment. Colonel *Wolfeley* adds, that he had

had certain Advice, that Brigadier Nugent was dead, with 15 Officers more, who were wounded in the former Action at Cavan.

Edinburgh, March 13. Baron Fenell's Regiment of Dragoon Horse was shipped on Saturday last. Colonel Damp's Regiment marches from hence to-morrow to Greenock, where they are to embark on Tuesday next. Colonel Desfont's Regiment is come to this place, and will in few days continue their march, in order to their Embarking like wife for Ireland.

Falborough, March 12. The Crown Frigate sailed from hence last Tuesday, to cruise to the westward.

Plymouth, March 16. We have an account, That the Fleet under the Command of Admiral Russell, consisting of between 4 and 500 Sail, passed by the Lands-end on Sunday last in the morning; the Wind has been ever since very fair for them, so that it's hoped the Queen of Spain is, ere this time, landed at the *Goyno*. Yesterday came into this Port two Dutch Privateers from *Flushing*.

Portsmouth, March 16. On Wednesday last sailed out of this Harbor to *Spithead* Their Majesties Ship the *Oronon*, being a second Rate, and Rear-Admiral of the Red. Yesterday arrived here the *Swallow* Frigate from *Greenwich*.

Chesler, March 17. The last of the Danish Forces, that embarked at *Hughlake*, set sail from thence on Wednesday last with a fair Wind for *Ireland*.

His Majesty has been pleased to constitute the Right Honorable Sir *John Lowther*, of *Lowther*, Baronet, Vice-chamberlain of His Majesties Household, *Richard Humblet* Esq; (who is also made Chancellor of the *Exchequer*) *Thomas Pelham* Esq; and Sir *Stephen Fox*, Lords Commissioners of the Treasury.

His Majesty has been likewise pleased to appoint *Henry Guy* Esq; to be one of the Commissioners of Their Majesties Customs, in the place of Mr. *Pelham*.
