

begun to Capitulate; and that when he came away, the Hostages were going to be exchanged.

Ratisbonne, March 20. The States of the Empire assembled here, are endeavouring to find out some Expedient to accommodate the Difference about the Succession of *Saxe-Lawemburg*, which at present interrupts the other Affairs of the Dyet. Prince *Louis of Baden* is now here, being recovered of his late Illness. He is, 'tis said, to command again this Summer the Imperial Army in *Hungary*, which will be composed of 30000 Men.

Frankfort, March 26. The Imperial Forces quartered in the *Wasterwall*, have Orders to be in a readiness to march by the 15th of the next Month. And we are informed, that those of *Saxony* will about the same time begin their march towards the *Rhine*.

Cologne, March 28. The Advices from *Hungary* say, That the Garrison of *Canfa* had Capitulated; that Hostages were given on both sides, and that the Turks had sent two of their chief Officers with the Conditions to *Vienna*, which they desired to have signed by the Emperor himself.

Hannburg, March 28. We have an account from *Prussia*, That their Electoral Highnesses of *Brandenburg* were expected the 21st of this Month at *Coumberg*, where great Preparations have been made for their Reception. The Dyet of *Poland*, according to our last Advices from thence, was still assembled, but were come yet to no Resolution upon the Affairs proposed to them at their first Meeting. An Officer is come hither to raise 600 Seamen for the Service of the King of *Sueden*, who we hear has ordered 16 Men of War to be fitted out against the Summer. The Elector of *Saxony* makes very considerable Preparations for the Campagne, and intends (as they write from *Dresden*) to return himself with his Forces towards the *Rhine*. We are told from *Zell*, That a Body of the *Lunenburg* Forces is to encamp, so soon as the weather is a little more favourable, at *Boitzenburg*, on the *Elbe*.

Hague, March 31. The States of *Holland* having consented to the state of the War for this present Year, and dispatched several other Affairs, adjourned yesterday till the 14th of the next Month. Prince *Waldeck* will part from hence the beginning of the next Week for *Bolduc* and *Maestricht*. All our Officers are commanded to have their Troops in a readiness to march; and the Vessels appointed for the Transportation of the Artillery, Ammunition, &c. are to Rendezvous, in 10 or 12 days at *Bygen op Zaam*. The Prince of *Nassau* Stadtholder of *Frisland* and *Groningen*, is arrived here from *Leeuwarden*, and assisted yesterday in the Council of State. The Heer *Van Amstrongen*, and the Heer *Van Lauren*, appointed Envoys Extraordinary from this State to the Courts of *Denmark* and *Sueden*, will begin their Journey thither very speedily. The Letters from *France* of the 28th Instant, say, That the Dauphin's departure for *Germany* was put off till the 20th of *May*. That Orders had been published for the raising the Arrier-Ban. That there was appointed an Assembly of the Clergy of that Kingdom in *May*. And that the Dauphines had the day before Received the *Extreme Unction*.

Eimburg, March 20. We have an account from *Ireland*, That *Baron Juel's* Regiment of Danish Horse landed the 11th Instant at *Belfast*; and that on the 13th, the last of the Danish Foot landed there from *Inghlake*. Colonel *Donep's* Regiment of Horse will Embark to morrow, and Colonel *Sestled's* on Saturday.

Pembroke, March 19. Sir *Gleneshy Shovel* conti-

nues in this Harbor with Their Majesties Ships under his Command.

Famouth, March 20. On Monday last a Dutch Caper brought in here a French Vessel of 80 Tuns, laden with Wine and Brandy for *Ireland*.

Plymouth, March 23. The 19th Instant came in here Their Majesties Ships the *Crown* and *Benadventure* from cruising, and the 21st the *Kings-Fisher* from the Eastward. The latter sailed again yesterday for *Bristol*. And this day arrived here the *Swallow* Frigate.

Portsmouth, March 25. Their Majesties Ships the *Breda*, the *Fore-sight*, and the *Richmond*, sailed yesterday out of this Harbor to *Spirithead*.

Whitehall, March 26. His Majesty has been pleased to Constitute Mr. *Abraham Kick* his Consul at *Rotterdam*.
