Venice, March 17.

**W**E have Advice from Malta, That the Gallies of that Order will sail from thence, about the middle of the next Month, with 1200 Land Soldiers, to joyn the Venetian Fleet in the Levant. The last Letters from *Napoli di Romania* are of the 23d of the last Month; The Captain-General *Cesare* was then there, making the necessary Preparations for the opening of the Campagne. The next week a great Convoy will sail from hence for the Levant.

*Warsaw*, Feb. 20. The Term limited by the Laws of this Kingdom for the sitting of the Dyet, (which is 6 weeks) being ready to expire, and no Resolution yet taken in any of the important Matters before them, some of the Deputies have demanded a prolongation thereof, as has been heretofore practised in like occasions; but others oppose it, alledging, that there is yet time enough left for them to come to a Conclusion in the principal Points that were at their first Meeting proposed to their Consideration. We have an account from the Frontiers, That the Turks and Tartars have put another Convoy into *Caminie*. All our Advices from *Moscow* assure us, That great Preparations are making on that side against the next Campagne, and that the young Czar continues his Resolution of commanding his Army in Person.

*Vienna*, March 19. We hear, that two Officers are coming hither from the Garrison of *Caminia*, with the Articles of Capitulation for the Surrender of that place, which they desire to have confirmed by the Emperor. The Letters from *Nissa* say, That General *Veterani* had put that and the Neighbouring Garrisons into a good Posture of Defence; and that the Enemy had not appeared in any considerable Bodies since the Retreat of the Tartars. The Turkish Envoys continue still at *Comarra*.

*Ratibonne*, March 22. The Differences about the Succession of *Saxe Lawemburg* are now under Debate in the Dyet, in order to the finding out a way to adjust them. It has, we are told, been proposed, That the Emperor should be desired to appoint three Princes of the Circle of *Lower Saxony*, to wit. the King of *Sweden* as Bishop of *Bremen*, the Elector of *Brandenburg* as Duke of *Mergenburg*, and the House of *Luxemburg*, to be Protectors of the Duchy of *Saxe*

*Lawemburg*, (lying withing the said Circle) provisionally, and till such time as this Matter can be finally accommodated; so that each of them shall put a certain number of Men into the chief Places thereof, and that the Vete and Session for that Duchy in the Dyet shall in the mean time be suspended, or put into the hands of the said Protectors, to be taken care of by one of their Ministers residing here; Which it's hoped, the Parties concerned will be prevailed with to agree to.

*Hamburg*, March 23. On the 24th Instant arrived here the Suedish Vice-Admiral, the Baron *de Taube*, with a Commission to raise 600 Seamen for the Service of that Crown; And it's believed, a like Levy will be made for *Denmark*. We are told from *Copenhagen*, That the King of *Denmark* has given leave to several Officers, in his Service, to go and pass the next Campagne in the Imperial Army on the *Rhine*. They write from *Warsaw* of the 24th, That the Baron *Zirowski* was arrived there in the Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, and that he had on the 22d his first Audience of the King and Prince of *Poland*.

*Lisbonne*, March 16. An Officer is come hither from Colonel *La Callimote*, to give the General an account of their late Action at *Charlemont*; which is as follows.

The Regiment of *Callimote* being posted this Winter along the River called *Black-water*, and near *Lough-Neagh*, they greatly streightned the Garrison of *Charlemont* on that side, and hindered their having any Correspondence with the County of *Tyrone*. About 8 days ago Colonel *La Callimote* possessed himself of a small Village within a mile of *Charlemont*. The Enemy, upon notice of it, came out with 300 Men to attack us; but though we had not had time to intrench our selves, yet we repulsed them with the loss of three men on their side, and one wounded on ours. We were employed the next day and the following in casting up some little Works, and in observing the Avenues of the Place, and the Enemies Out Posts on both sides the River, which we obliged them to abandon, giving them every night new Alarms. On the 12th Instant, about 9 at night, Colonel *Callimote* marched with a Party of his Regiment, and a small Detachment of Colonel *St. Johns*'s, making in all about 80 Soldiers and 20 Officers, whom he caused to Embark at a place called *Dry Gab*, in three large Boats. B-

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ing come within half a mile of *Charlemont* he lauded his men, and leaving a Guard with the Boats, marched to the Town; and though they were discovered at a good distance by the light of the Moon, yet they passed the Ditch, and made themselves Masters of the Main Guard. Our men divided themselves into two Parties, the one marched towards the Gate of the Castle, to hinder the Rebels from falling out; and the other attack'd a Redoubt, lately built within 30 Paces of the Counter-scarp to cover their Bridge, which might contain 30 Men, and had now in it 15 with a Sergeant, and after some little Resistance entred the same, killing 6, and taking the rest Prisoners. Monsieur de la Borde Major to *La Callimere*, with 30 Men, took another Redoubt; and we plundered and burnt the Houses, as far as the Gate of *Armagh*, which the Enemy had abandoned. After this, the day coming on, we retired with Drums beating by the Causey that leads to *Blackwater* Town. The whole Action was carried on with a great deal of Vigor and Conduct. The Rebels left above 50 Men, killed and taken Prisoners. On our side, Major *La Borde* was killed with Cartridge-Shot from the last Cannon that was fired, and Lieutenant-Colonel *Belsasse* and Captain *Le Rapin* were wounded, the first in the Head, and the other in the Thigh; and besides these, we had but one man killed, and 5 or 6 wounded. There are now about 400 men in *Charlemont*, who want Salt, Wood, Tobacco, and Brandy; and Bread and Meat begins likewise to be very scarce among them. The Strength of the Place lyes in its Situation; but we doubt not, so soon as the weather permits, to be in few days Masters of it.

The Prince of *Wirtemberg*, who commands the Danish Forces is just now arrived here from his Quarters to visit the General.

*Falmouth*, March 24. The 22d Instant came in here a Dutch Man of War of 54 Guns, having been separated from 3 English and 4 Dutch Men of War, who parted on the 16th Instant from the Fleet under the Command of Admiral *Russell*, as they were going with the Queen of *Spain* in to the *Groene*; as the *Streights* Squadron commanded by Vice-Admiral *Killigrew*, with the Merchant Ships under their Convoy, did at the same time. This day arrived here another of the Dutch Men of War with a French Prize laden with Salt and Brandy. And there are now several great Ships off of this Harbor, which, it's believed, are the rest of their Company.

*Plymouth*, March 25. Their Majesties Ship the *Plymouth*, and a Dutch Man of War, are, since my last, arrived in this Port. They parted, together with the *Hope*, the *Northumberland*, and 4 Dutch Men of War more, on the 16th Instant, from the Fleet commanded by Admiral *Russell*, within sight of Land to the westward of the *Groene*; but were in their return hither separated by bad weather. Two Dutch Men of War of their Company are, we hear, put into

*Falmouth*, one of them having taken a French Veisell bound for *Newfoundland*.

*Portsmouth*, March 27. Yesterday came to *Spithead* from the Downs Their Majesties Ship the *Soldadoes*, and the same day the *Richmond* sailed to the westward.
