In witness whereof, we have hereunto set our common seal, this twelfth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in consideration of a benefaction of two hundred pounds sterling, which has been paid to us in favour of the rectory of the Holy Trinity, Capenhurst, in the county of Chester, and in the diocese of Chester, and in respect of which we have agreed to pay to the Incumbent of the same rectory, and to his successors, a yearly sum of six pounds, do hereby, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven, section five, grant to the Incumbent of the said rectory of the Holy Trinity, Capenhurst, and to his successors, to meet such benefaction, one other yearly sum or stipend of six pounds, such yearly sum or stipend to be payable out of the common fund under our control, and to be calculated as from the fifth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, and to be receivable in equal half-yearly portions, on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each and every year: Provided always, that if at any time lands, tithes, or other hereditaments sufficient, in our opinion, to produce the yearly sum or stipend so payable out of our common fund, as lastly herein mentioned, or any part thereof, shall be annexed by us to the said rectory, in substitution for such yearly sum or stipend, or for such part thereof, our liability for the payment of such yearly sum or stipend, or of such part thereof, as the case may be, shall thereupon and thereafter cease and determine.

INSTRUMENT assigning a Particular District to the Church of Saint Philip, Kingston-upon-Hull, in the Diocese of York.

To all to whom these presents shall come the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York,

send greeting:

WHEREAS a church has lately been built within the limits of the parish of Sculcoates, in the town and county of the town of Kingston-upon-Hull, in the diocese of York, by and at the expense of certain well disposed persons, who have, with the approbation of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, and of the said William, Archbishop of York, secured to the said new church an endowment and a repair fund, in accordance with the provisions of the several Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts," or of some of them, and particularly of the l present Majesty, chapter ninety-seven.

And whereas under the powers or authorities contained in the said Acts or of some of them, and in the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, with the consent of the said William, Archbishop of York, by an instrument bearing date on or about the eleventh day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, declared that the perpetual right of patronage of, and of nominating a minister to serve, the said new church from time to time and at all times whenever it should be requisite to nominate a minister to serve the same should, from and after the consecration of such church, be vested in, and be exercised by, and belong to the Reverend Henry William Kemp, Clerk in Holy Orders, Master of the Charter House in the town of Kingston-upon-Hull aforesaid, the Reverend Joseph McCormick, now Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of the Holy Trinity, Kingston-upon-Hull, in the town and county of the town of Kingston-upon-Hull aforesaid, Robert Jackson, of Albion-street, Kingston-upon-Hull aforesaid, Esquire, John Briggs, of Clyde-terrace, Anlaby-road, Kingston-upon-Hull aforesaid, Esquire, and Joseph Armitage Wade, of Hornsea, near Kingston-upon-Hull aforesaid, Esquire, their heirs and assigns, as

And whereas the said church has since been consecrated, and is called "The Church of Saint

Philip, Kingston-upon-Hull."

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England deem it expedient that a particular district, to comprise a portion of the said parish of Sculcoates, a portion of the said parish of the Holy Trinity, Kingston-upon-Hull, and certain extra-parochial territory called or known as Charter House, in the same town, county, and diocese, should be assigned to the said church of Saint Philip, Kingston-upon-Hull, and also that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church.

Now know ye, that the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in exercise and execution of the powers or authorities for this purpose contained in the several Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts" as aforesaid, or in some of them, and particularly in the Act of the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter thirty-eight, in the said Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and in the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling them in this behalf, do hereby, with the consent of the said William, Archbishop of York (testified by his being a party to and executing these presents), assign to the said church of Saint Philip, Kingston-upon-Hull, as a particular district, all those portions of the said parish of Sulcoates, and of the said parish of the Holy Trinity, Kingston-upon-Hull, and all that extraparochial territory called or known as the Charter House as aforesaid, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended, and co direct that the same shall be called "The Particular District of Saint Philip, Kingston-upon-Hull."

And the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners
