THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Place (namely),—so much of the district of the city of New Sarum as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north and west by that portion of the Southampton-road commencing at the boundary of the city and extending thence in a westerly direction to the entrance to Saint Martin's Church-street, on the east by Saint Martin's Church, Saint Martin's Church-yard, and Fowler's Croft, and on or towards the south by the public street called Saint Martin's Church-street,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, to be a Place infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the eighteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.
