

wells, pumps, water mains, pipes, or other sanitary works (if any) situate within the parish of Lydd and being the property of the Rural Sanitary Authority of the Romney Marsh Union and used by them solely for the purpose of the drainage, water supply, or cleansing of the said parish, and all liabilities (if any) attaching to the said Rural Sanitary Authority as such solely in respect of the said parish and such proportion of the liabilities (if any) attaching to the said Sanitary Authority as such as well in respect of the said parish as the rest of its district as is hereinafter mentioned shall immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme vest in and attach to the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the said Municipal borough acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority of the said borough.

The proportion aforesaid shall be so much of the whole of the said liabilities as bears the same proportion to the whole of the said liabilities as the rateable value of the property within the said parish for sanitary purposes bears to the rateable value for sanitary purposes of the property within the whole district of the said Sanitary Authority at the commencement of this Scheme.

"12. The term property in this Scheme means and includes all property, real and personal, and all things in action, and all rights of common or commonable rights, and rights to toll, and all franchises, privileges, and rights which have any pecuniary value, and all charters, records, deeds, books, and documents, and all rights, and all claims to relief, and all rights to avoid contracts or otherwise, and includes any estate or interest, legal or equitable, in or in respect of any property so defined.

"13. The term market property in this Scheme means and includes rights to market tolls, and all franchises, liberties, privileges, and rights relating to markets, and all lands and premises used for the purposes of or in connection with markets or fairs.

"14. For the purposes of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, and this Scheme so far as the same relate to freemen, the Old Corporation shall be deemed to have been dissolved by the said Act; and all the rights and exemptions reserved by and the provisions of section 10 of the said Act shall apply accordingly.

"Every person now claiming to be entitled as a freeman or burgess or otherwise, in accordance with the provisions of section 10 sub-section 1 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, shall, on or before the expiration of one calendar month from the commencement of this Scheme, send to the Town Clerk his claim in writing, and future claims shall be similarly sent in on or before the 1st day of September in every year. The Town Clerk shall within one month after the expiration of the time for sending in claims make out a roll (to be called 'the Freemen's Roll') containing the names of all such claimants and the names of those previously admitted and then alive; and such rolls shall be revised and settled by the Mayor on such day or days as he shall from time to time appoint, provided that such day or days shall be fixed to be at least one month after, but within two months of the expiration of the time for sending in claims, and that public notice of every such appointment has been given by him by affixing notice thereof fourteen days previously on or near the outer door of the Townhall in the said borough.

"On every such revision the Mayor shall examine into the claims and all objections thereto, and shall retain on or add to the roll the names of those persons only who are entitled to be on the roll, and shall sign the roll when complete.

"No person who shall once have established his claim shall (if alive) be struck off the roll on any subsequent revision, unless notice in writing of any objection to his claim be served on him at least seven days previously to the date fixed for such revision.

"The Freemen's Roll shall be kept by the Town Clerk, and shall be open to inspection at his office by any person at all reasonable times on payment of a fee of one shilling, and he shall supply printed copies thereof to any applicants at the price of one shilling each.

"The property to which the freemen aforesaid are for the time being entitled shall be managed by the New Corporation, and the payments specified in or authorized by sub-section 1 (a) of section 10 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, shall be made by the Treasurer of the borough, who shall annually prepare an account showing in detail all such payments, and the surplus remaining after payment thereof, and the New Corporation shall deal with the surplus as by law required.

"The payments specified or referred to in sub-section 1 (d) of section 10 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, shall be made to the Treasurer of the borough.

"The Town Clerk is authorized and required, when making out the first Roll of Freemen, to insert the name of any freeman whom the books of the Corporation show to have taken up his freedom, and who is known to be alive.

"15. All the rights privileges exemptions duties and liabilities of the Old Corporation as a corporate member of the Cinque Port of New Romney shall vest in and be enforceable against the New Corporation and all rights privileges and exemptions heretofore vested in and enjoyed by the Burgesses Freemen, and Inhabitants of the town of Lydd by reason of such town being a corporate member of the Cinque Port of New Romney shall notwithstanding anything herein contained continue vested in and enjoyed by the burgesses freemen and inhabitants for the time being of the said borough anything in this Scheme to the contrary notwithstanding and as if the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883 had not been passed."

WHEREAS an Act was passed in the thirtieth and thirty-first years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to consolidate and amend the law relating to the Public Health in Scotland;" and by the thirty-first section of the said Act it is enacted, that "whenever any part of the United Kingdom appears to be threatened with, or is affected by, any formidable epidemic, endemic, or contagious disease, the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any three or more of them (the Lord President of the Council or one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State being one), may, by Order or Orders by them from time to time made, direct that the provisions for the prevention of diseases, contained in Part III hereof be put in force in Scotland, or in such parts thereof, or in such
