"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the district of Saint John the Baptist, Great Marlboroughstreet, in the county of Middlesex and in the

diocese of London being :-

"All that portion of the district chapelry of Saint Thomas, Regent-street sometime part of the parish of Saint James Westminster in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London aforesaid which is bounded on the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said district of Saint John the Baptist, Great Marlborough-street from the district chapelry of Saint Thomas Regent-street aforesaid at the point where Argyll-street joins the street called or known as Argyll-place and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said Argyll-place for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Regent-street and continuing thence still in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of one chain or thereabouts across the last-named street to the boundary on the western side of the same street at or near to its junction with Maddoxstreet, which boundary divides the said district chapelry of Saint Thomas Regent-street from the parish of Saint George Hanover-square in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London aforesaid, all which said hereinbefore described portion of the district chapelry of Saint Thomas Regent-street is bounded upon the remaining sides other than upon the south as aforesaid that is to say upon the west, the north and the east as follows, upon the west partly by the parish of Saint George Hanover-square aforesaid and partly by the new parish of Hanover Chapel (Regent-street) within the original limits of the last-mentioned parish, upon the north by the district parish or rectory of All Souls in Saint Marylebone in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London aforesaid and upon the east by the district of Saint John the Baptist Great Marlborough-street aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been submitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

HEREAS the Right Honourable Sir Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days'

previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws con-"cerning the burial of the dead in England beyond "the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the "Act concerning the burial of the dead in the "Metropolis," made a representation stating, that for the protection of the public health no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with the following modifications, viz.:—

ATTLEBOROUGH.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Attleborough, in the county of Norfolk, and also in the churchyard after the thirtieth June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, except as

iollows :-

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the church-yard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order, viz., widows, widowers, sons and daughters, as can be buried at or below that depth.

WINSLOW. — Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Winslow, in the county of

Buckingham.

St. Sidwell, Exeter.—Forthwith and entirely in the Baptist Chapelyard, Paris-street, Exeter, except for the burial of Miss Jessy Faulkner Rouse and Mr. James Jerman, at their decease.

HELHOUGHTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Helhoughton, in the county of Norfolk, and also in that part of the churchyard which lies to the south of the church, except as follows:—

(a.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet, without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at

or below that depth.

ALL SAINTS, HABERGHAM. — Forthwith and entirely in the Church of All Saints, Habergham, in the parish of Whalley, in the county of Lancaster; and also in the churchyard
