2. The International Code signal of distress indicated by N C;

3. The distant signal, consisting of a square flag, having either above or below it a ball or anything resembling a ball.

At night-

1. A gun fired at intervals of about a minute;

 Flames on the ship (as from a burning tar barrel, oil barrel, &c.);

3. Rockets or shells throwing stars of any colour or description, fired one at a time, at short intervals.

WHEREAS, by the four hundred and tenth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that, upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy or beacon Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of every ship which passes the same, or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by and subject to which the light dues authorized to be levied by the said Act are paid and collected.

And whereas the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses are erecting a new lighthouse on the Oxcars Rocks in the Firth of Forth, and a light

will shortly be exhibited therefrom;

Now therefore Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that, from and after the exhibition of the said light, there shall be paid in respect thereof for every vessel, whether British or foreign, which shall pass into or out of the inner basin of the Firth of Forth through the Queen's Ferry, or which shall cross to the westward of an imaginary line drawn from Burntisland to Granton, or which shall trade between ports within the area enclosed by said imaginary line and Queen's Ferry, inclusive, but excluding Burntisland and Granton, a toll of eight-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burden of every such vessel for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom if on an oversea voyage, and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton of the burden of every such vessel for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom if on a coasting voyage.

The said tolls shall be levied subject to the regulations and exemptions contained in the New Consolidated Table of Light Duties sanctioned by Orders in Council dated, respectively, the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in the Order in Council dated the twentyfirst day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and also in the special section of the Consolidated Tables prepared in pursuance of an Order in Council dated the sixth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, or to such other regulations and exemptions as may from time to time be duly sanctioned, and subject also to the gross abatement or discount of seventy per centum mentioned in an Order in Council dated the fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, or to such other abatement or discount as may for the C. L. Peel. time being be in force.

HEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas Orders in Council have been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards be postponed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be post-

poned as follows, viz.:

In the parish churchyard of Stanwix, in the county of Cumberland, to the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In that part of the parish churchyard of Old Windsor which was added thereto in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, to the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the parish churchyard of Towcester, in the county of Northampton, to the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred

and eighty-five.

In the parish churchyard of Northfleet, in the county of Kent, to the thirty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the parish churchyard of Exning, in the county of Suffolk, to the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the churchyard at Lyndhurst, in the county of Hants, to the thirty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

of June, 1885, by the Governing Body of the Queen's College, Oxford, have been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

"Whereas by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, clause 54; it is provided that a Statute made by the Commissioners for a College may after the cesser of the powers of the Commissioners be subject to alteration from time to time by statutes made by the College under the said Act, and not otherwise. And whereas
