THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the seventeenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

An Area comprising the Redditch Petty Sessional Division in the county of Worcester, except the parish of Oldberrow.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—at Broughton, in the petty sessional division of Romsey, in the county of Hants, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Stone Farm on the east, by the road leading from Stone Farm to Broughton Pirs on the north, thence in a straight line to Nine Mile Water on the north-west, thence in a straight line to the Farm in the occupation of Mr. Arnold on the Salisbury-road (leaving the Farm on the south and not including it) on the west, and thence in a straight line to Broughton Hill on the Mottisfont-road on the south, and thence back by the road leading to Stone Farm again on the east,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the second day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, to be an Area infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the seventeenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

Order, bearing date the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, defining a part of the Port of South Shields, in the county of Durham, as a Foreign Animals Wharf: Provided that nothing herein shall be deemed to invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the said Order before this Order takes effect, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Order hereby revoked before this Order takes effect.

This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) TRANSFER OF PARTS OF DISTRICTS ACT, 1884.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council approved on the 14th day of July, 1885, of an Agreement bearing date the 29th day of June, 1885, made between the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Evesham of the one part, and the Justices of the Peace of the county of Worcester in General Quarter Sessions assembled of the other part, whereby the jurisdiction, for the purposes of The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, of the whole of the district of the borough of Evesham was, from and after the date of such approval by the Privy Council as aforesaid, transferred to the district of the county of Worcester.

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to grant unto Thomas Duncombe Shafto, of Beamish Park, in the parish of Chester-le-Street, in the County Palatine of Durham, Esquire, in the Commission of the Peace for the said county, third son of Robert Eden Duncombe Shafto, of Whitworth Park, in the parish of Whitworth, in the aforesaid county, Esquire, by Catherine, third daughter of Sir John Eden, of Windlestone, in the parish of Auckland St. Andrew, in the said county, Bart., all deceased, Her Royal licence and authority that he and his issue may, in compliance with a clause contained in the last will and testament of his maternal uncle, Morton John Davison (formerly Morton John Eden), late of Beamish Park aforesaid, Esquire, deceased, take, use, and bear the surname of Eden only, instead of that of Shafto, and that he and they may bear the arms of Eden only; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the College of Arms, otherwise the
