Genoua, April 4. Venice, April 21. From Zante and several other parts in the Levant we are informed that the Turks have in all their Ports fitted up their ships, which lie ready with Soldiers and all necessaries to be sent with the fi st opportunity into Candia. One of their ships passing from Smirna, was by a Grecian Privateer forced on shoar at the Isle of Limans in the Archipelago; the ship broken in pieces, 70 of the Turks made prito es, the rest-escaping to Land.

Several Cossairs of Tanis, departing lately from Scio to cruize, met with a ship belonging to Genoua well laden from Alexandria, which they seized as d sent away for Barbary,

They likewise inform us that the Grand Seignior is passed (as he intended from Adrianople into Morea there to give O der for the transposation of his forces in projecution of the Siege of Candia, upon which he is resolved to employ his whole force.
