

(PORT OF BRISTOL (AVONMOUTH).—APPROVAL OF LANDING-PLACE FOR FOREIGN ANIMALS.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 7th day of September, 1885.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 and 1884, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby approve of the following part of the Port of Bristol as a Landing-Place for foreign animals not subject to slaughter or quarantine:

All that space and premises situate on the north side of the dock and premises called or known as the Avonmouth Dock, situate at or near the confluence of the rivers Avon and Severn, in the county of Gloucester, commencing at a point at the water's edge of the north-east side of the Entrance Lock to the said Dock formed by the recess of the inner gate, thence in a north-westerly direction for a distance of sixty-nine yards or thereabouts bounded by the said Lock, thence at a right angle in a north-easterly direction for a distance of ten yards or thereabouts bounded by a wooden fence, thence in a south-easterly direction for a distance of twenty-seven yards or thereabouts bounded by a wooden fence, thence in a north-easterly direction for a distance of thirteen yards or thereabouts bounded by a wooden fence, thence in a northerly direction for a distance of one hundred and seventy-five yards or thereabouts along the west side of the cattle-path bounded by a wooden fence, thence in a westerly direction for a distance of twenty-eight yards or thereabouts bounded by the side of the Cattle Lairs, thence in a northerly and north-easterly direction for a distance of one hundred and thirty-seven yards or thereabouts to the boundary wall of the Dock premises, thence in a south-easterly direction alongside the said boundary wall for a distance of seventy-four yards or thereabouts, thence in a southerly direction along the railway cattle sidings for a distance of one hundred and three yards or thereabouts, thence in a westerly direction for a distance of nine yards or thereabouts bounded by a wooden fence, thence in a south-westerly direction for a distance of ten yards or thereabouts bounded by a wooden fence, thence in a westerly direction for a distance of twenty-six yards or thereabouts bounded by a wooden fence, thence in a southerly direction for a distance of one hundred and ninety yards or thereabouts along the east side of the cattle-path bounded by a wooden fence, thence in a southerly direction for a distance of twenty-seven yards or thereabouts bounded by a wooden fence, thence in a south-westerly direction for a distance of ten yards or thereabouts to the water's edge of the said Lock bounded by a wooden fence; all which space and premises are coloured pink on the plan of the said Landing-Place deposited for the purposes of this Order at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Gloucester.
