Br virtue of Section 1 of the Act of the 30th March, 1885, respecting additional precautions against the importation of Asiatic cholera into Denmark, the Ministry of Justice do hereby order quarantine to be imposed in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act on ships coming from or that have been in communication on the voyage with ships coming from Sicily.

THE Board of Trade have been informed by the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs that a Telegram has been received from Her Majesty's Minister at Berne, notifying that the Federal Government have decreed that the same measures which were adopted on the Franco-Swiss frontier against the introduction of cholera, are to be put in force on the Italian frontier.

These provisions direct that in every commune an appropriate building shall be kept in readiness tor the reception of pauper cholera patients. The railway authorities are instructed to deposit at certain stations all passengers who may fall ill while travelling. All cases of cholera are to be reported immediately to the local authorities by the persons responsible for the patient.

Specially appointed doctors will visit all

travellers at the frontier stations. The waitingrooms and buffets are to be disinfected. It is forbidden to transport persons suffering from, or suspected to be sickening with, cholera. Rags, worn bedding, and old clothes unwashed, may no longer be imported from France or Italy, passengers' luggage alone excepted.
