THE Board of Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Guayaquil, transmitting copy and translation of a law, in virtue of which a new customs tariff will come into force in Ecuador on the 1st November next. Attention is called in the Despatch to an Article of the Law referred to, which provides that all vessels arriving at the ports of Ecuador shall bring a manifest or "Sobordo," and invoices of their cargo certified by the Ecuadorian Consul, by the Consul of some friendly nation, or by the local authorities at the port of despatch.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs the following translation of a Notice issued by the Portuguese Government:—

Maritime Health Notice, No. 281.

In view of official information received, and the opinion of the Consultative Board of Public Health having been heard, the ports of Spain in the ocean from Cadiz (already declared infected) as far as Ayamonte, inclusive, are declared infected with cholera morbus since the 20th September last.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for the Colonies a copy of a Proclamation by the Governor of Gibraltar, which provides, as follows:—"With reference to the Proclamation of 23rd July last, that arrivals from Spanish ports with clean bills of health viséd by a British Consular authority, be admitted after three days quarantine of observation. Vessels arriving without being provided with such 'visé' will be treated under the provisions of the Proclamation above referred to.—Given at Gibraltar, the 1st day of October, 1885."

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for the Colonies, copy of a Notice issued by the Government of the Gambia, dated 27th August last, and announcing that, in consequence of cholera in Spain, all steamers and vessels arriving at the port of Bathurst, in the British Settlement on the River Gambia, from any Spanish port or from any place in free communication therewith, may be placed in quarantine.
