and I engaged in their tasks during the

On Jan. 1st, 1861, I rode that same trail from Franklin to the Little Colorado River, where we crossed, took the Dr. Adams, the Cottonwood and the Superstitions, arrived there that day with the first stage from Custer, which came from Fort Verde via the San Tan Valley. On Tuesday the 5th, I was forced to go from Franklin to the San Tan and San Geronimo, which were in great high water, and went to the mountains running with a lot of men.

Falmouth, Mar. 1. Viceroy came in here the
Prestre-boat, called the Spanish Princess, a 6 days
from the Coyne; since the other Prestre-boat,
that went out from hence, arrived 3 days before
this came away. In her way hither she met three
of Their Majesties Ships, the York, Coven, and Mon-
tane sailing off of Falmouth, and on Saturday all
took a French Vessel bound with Wine &c. for
Ireland, which she brought in with her.

Promoue May 2. Their Majesties Ships the *Tort*,
the *Martime*, and the *Crown*, came in here yesterday
from cruising; and give an account, That 15
days ago they saw about 15 French Men of War,
close upon a Wind, making the best of their way
towards Argo, which they believe were the French
Fleet returning home from Ireland. They took in
sight of them a small Irish Privateer; but this Vessel
was some time after overtaken by a sudden gust of
wind, and the Men that were on Board drowned.
Two Dutch Cruisers that are arrived here from the
Carre report likewise, that on the 24th past they
saw, 60 Leagues N. & W. of Ufsewe, about 60
Sail of French Ships, most of them Men of War,
heading towards their own Coast. Two other
Dutch Cruisers have brought in here a French Prize
of 15 Chars, and 4 Pateresses laden with Sugars
from the West-India, and bound for Nantes. This
day arrived here the Windmill of this Town from
Uspensk; and the James of Jersey, the Biscay Mer-
chant, the Sujana, and the Biscay Arms, from Bi-
saya, bound for London.

Plymouth, May 4. The two Dutch Caiques that came from the Groyne, sailed from hence twice in the last for Holland. Yesterday were sent above from the York, and a Dutch Caique, about 30 French and Irish prisoners.

We much, Mar 3. On Wednesday last was brought into this Harbor a French Prize of between 30 and 40 Guns; she was taken off of Bay Isle by two Dutch Capers, who fell into a Fleet of 50 Sail of French Vessels, all light, and bound for Bours-deaux, and took 10 of them, which was as many as they could well man.

Portsmouth, May 5. This morning sailed from St. Helens about 60 Merchant Ships laden with Stores for Ireland, under the Convoy of the Worcester, the Greyhound, the Constant Warwick, and the Sweepstakes. There are now about 20 English and Dutch Men of War at Spithead.
