

Ecclesiastical Commissioners further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Andrew situate as aforesaid and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that so long as the Reverend Thomas Lander the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint George Battersea shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication solemnization or performance as aforesaid at the said church of Saint Andrew situate as aforesaid shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Thomas Lander: And provided also, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew Battersea being:—

"All that part of the new parish (sometimes district chapelry) of Saint George Battersea in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester wherein the present incumbent of such new parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded upon the south-east partly by the new parish of All Saints South Lambeth and partly by the new parish of Christ Church Clapham both in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the south-west by the new parish of Saint Philip Battersea in the same county and diocese or in other words by the line of the South London Railway, upon part of the north-west by the consolidated chapelry of All Saints Battersea Park in the county and diocese aforesaid, or in other words by the line of the London and South-Western Railway, and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said consolidated chapelry of All Saints Battersea Park from the new parish of Saint George Battersea aforesaid at a point at the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the London Chatham and Dover Railway over the main line of the London and South-Western Railway aforesaid and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named line of railway for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the same line of railway over Stewart's-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said road for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to a point at or near to its junction with Corunna-place opposite to the south-western end of the wall or fence which divides the house and premises known as No. 53 Stewart's-road from the house and premises known as No. 55 Stewart's-road, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the said wall or fence for a distance of one and a half chains or there-

abouts to its junction with the wall or fence which divides some of the houses and premises situate on the south-eastern side of Saint George's-road from some of the houses and premises situate on the north-western side of Corunna-road and continuing thence still north-eastward along the last-described wall or fence for a distance of three and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with the wall or fence which divides the house and premises known as No. 45, Patmore-street from the house and premises known as No. 44 Patmore-street and continuing thence still north-eastward along the last-described wall or fence for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to its north-eastern end on the south-western side of Patmore-street aforesaid and continuing thence still north-eastward and in a direct line across the last-named street to a point at the south-western end of the wall or fence which divides the house and premises situate on the north-eastern side of the said street and called or known as 'the Royal Oak' otherwise No. 1 Patmore-street and the house and premises situate on the south-eastern side of Saint George's-road aforesaid and known as No. 20 Saint George's-road from the house and premises situate on the north-eastern side of Patmore-street aforesaid and known as No. 2 Patmore-street and continuing thence that is from the last-described point still north-eastward along the last-described wall or fence for a distance of one chain and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the wall or fence which divides other houses and premises situate on the south-eastern side of Saint George's-road from other houses and premises situate on the north-western side of Corunna-road aforesaid and continuing thence still north-eastward along the last-described wall or fence for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to its junction with the wall or fence which divides the house and premises known as No. 107 New-road from the house and premises known as No. 105 New-road and continuing thence still north-eastward along the last-described wall or fence for a distance of one and a half chains or thereabouts to its north-eastern end on the south-western side of New-road aforesaid and continuing thence still north-eastward and in a direct line to a point in the middle of the last-named road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the same road for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to its junction with Saint George's-road aforesaid and with Sussex-street and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to a point at its present north-eastern end upon the wall or fence which forms the present boundary of the land belonging to and in the occupation of the London and South-Western Railway Company and extending thence first eastward and then alternately south-westward south-eastward and north-eastward along the last-described wall or fence for a distance of thirty-nine chains or thereabouts (thereby passing at the backs of the houses situate on the south-eastern side of Sussex-street aforesaid at the backs of most of the houses situate on the north-eastern side of New-road aforesaid at the backs of the houses situate on the north-western side of William-street and finally passing along the north-eastern ends of the last-named street and of John-street) to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint George Battersea from the new parish of All Saints South Lambeth aforesaid."
