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Venice, April 28.

THE great Convoy sailed on Monday last for the Levant, whither a considerable sum of Money is sent for the payment of the Army. By a Vessel from Durazzo we have advice, That the Bassa's of Bosnia and Albania had received Orders from the Port, to send all the Forces they could draw together to the Ottoman Army, that is to act against the Imperialists: And that the Bassa of Arcegovina had with 3000 men attack'd the Fort of Sluino, but after three Assaults, was beaten off with great loss.

The ARTICLES for the Surrender of the Fortreſs of Caniſa.

I. That the Magazines at Caniſa, with the Powder, Ammunition, Cannon, and Arms, and all the publick Money, with whatever else belongs to the Publick, shall be delivered to the Emperor's Commiſſaries: And the Turks shall be oblig'd to diſcover to them all Mines and Powder hid under ground.

II. That all Priſoners of both Sexes ſhall be ſet at Liberty without any Ransom, ſo ſoon as the Capitulation is concluded.

III. That all Inhabitants and Strangers in the Town ſhall be permitted to march out with their Arms, Clothes, Goods, Children, Servants, Horses and other Cattel, and be conducted to ſome part of the Ottoman Dominions, but without displaying their Colours, or beating their Drums. If any of the Rascians that are in Service in the Town be desirous to retire, it shall be allowed them, and they shall not be hinder'd on account of Debt; and those that are willing to stay in the Town, shall not be molested on any pretence.

IV. That all Renegadoes shall be permitted to return to the Christian Faith, if they desire it; and it shall not be allowed to hide or carry away any Christian Child, Male or Female.

V. That they shall have Carriages allowed them to the River Drave, and from thence Boats and Boatmen to carry them into the Turkish Dominions.

VI. That as soon as the Capitulation is concluded, the Imperial Soldiers shall be posted in the outward Palanque towards the Gate, called Paſchla Capui, and in this Palanque the Turks shall have liberty to sell their Goods.

VII. That ſo ſoon as the Ratification of this Capitulation shall be brought from Vienna, and that the Carriages and Boats are ready, the Turks shall leave the place, and begin their march.

VIII. That the Turks shall deliver up all the Registers of the Revenue, and Books, containing the Military Contributions owing out of the Districts belonging to Caniſa, as also the Revenue of the Spah's, which is raised in the Tributary Villages.

IX. That as they going on they shall have a sufficient Guard who shall safely conduct them to the next Turkish Camp; but the Turks shall leave some of their Officers to the best German Garrison they pass by, till such time as the Contoy and the Banks return: That 7 of the principal Houses shall be permitted to pass by Land on Horse-back, through Belgrade to the Turkish Dominions, with a Conduct.

X. That on their way, Proviſions shall be furnished them with their Money at reasonable Rates.

XI. And there being Priſoners taken on both sides, and the Letters granted, which are not yet signified,

nor their Ransoms paid, so that that matter is very well settled. It's agreed, that the said Debts shall be remitted on both sides, so that neither Christian nor Turk shall hereafter be molested on account thereof.

These Articles were ratified by the Emperor with this Condition, That so soon as the Ratification arrived, though the Carriages were not in a readiness the same day as is expressed in the 7th Article; yet one of the chief Gates of the Town should, without any delay, be delivered to the Imperialists, as had been always practiced in like cases: But that the Imperialists should not from thence enter into the Town to give the Turks any disturbance, but should continue at the said Gate till the Wagons were got ready. And in pursuance of this Capitulation, the Fortreſs of Caniſa was Surrendered to the Imperialists on the 13th of April, 1690.

Vienna, May 4. The Nomination of Officers for the next Campaign is not yet made, though no body doubts but Prince Louis of Baden (who arrived here on Monday last from Bohemia) will command against the Turks; And the Marquis of Baden, President of the Council of War, under the Elector of Bavaria on the Rhine. The Imperialists found in Caniſa 59 Pieces of Brass Cannon, 11 of Iron, and 3 Mortar-Pieces, with a great quantity of Arms and Ammunition. We hear, that the Sieur Toche, who was General and Chief Minister to the late Prince of Transilvania, is on his Journey hither; into whose hands 'tis said, the Administration of that Government will be put during the young Prince's Minority.

Frankfort, May 10. We have an account from Suifferland, That the City of Geneva had taken an alarm upon the arrival of a Body of French Troops in their Neighbourhood, and the Duke of Savoy's sending several Pieces of Cannon that way, and that they had it under consideration, whether they should receive a Garrison of Suiffers. We are told from Strassbourg, that the Marquis d'Uxelles had taken possession of the Government of Alsace, vacant by the death of the Baron de Monclar; And that the Dauphin was expected in those Parts towards the end of this Month. The French are drawing a Body of Men together about Landau.

Cologne, May 12. The Electoral Prince Palatine took on Tuesday last a review of his Troops quartered about Jagers, and the next day of those that are posted near Ambach. The Brandenburg Forces are gathering into a Body.

Hamburg, May 12. The last Letters from Sweden tell us, That the Squadron which the King of Sweden designs to joyn with the Dutch, was almost ready to sail, consisting of 12 Men of War, viz. The Wrangel of 76 Guns, the Babus of 70, the Bicking of 70, the Finland of 70, the Eastland of 50, the Hullan of 50, the Ostland of 50, the Wacmeister of 46, the Seebecke of 40, the Hope of 50, the Lifland of 50, the Falcon of 24 Guns. We are told from Courmsberg, that their Electoral Highnesses of Brandenburg would part from thence about the

the middle of this month on their return to Berlin. The Letters from Warsaw of the 28th past, say, the Dyet continued still; but that the last prolongation, consented to by the Deputies, would expire in three days.

Brussels, May 14. The Letters from Maastricht of the 2d Instant tell us, that the Dutch Forces were marching to the place appointed for their General Rendezvous; and there is a discourse, that they will besiege Dinant. The French Encampment between St. Amand and Montagne, having the Schelde in Front, and the River Scarpe behind them; there may be now about 12000 Men, and the rest of the Troops that are to compose the Army to be commanded by the Duke of Luxembourg, are moving that way. The Advices from Vienna say, that the Elector of Bavaria is to command the Imperial Forces in Germany this Campaigne.

Hague, May 16. The Brandenburg Forces are already in a Body about Wesel, to the number of 15000 Men, and more are marching from several parts of his Electoral Highness's Dominions to join them. The Army of this State will be Encamped by the 20th of this Month. Monsieur Dankelman, the Brandenburg Plenipotentiary, will part from hence to morrow morning for England. The Letters from Paris of the 12th, confirm the arrival of the French Squadron with several Irish Regiments at Brest; and add, That Monsieur d'Avaux, and the Count de Gasse, (who returned with this opportunity from Ireland) were come to Versailles, and that the former had been several hours with the King. The Dauphin's Journey towards Germany continued fixed for the 17th of this Month.

Edinburgh, May 5. Last night the Lord Commissioner and the Privy-Council received, by an Express from Sir Thomas Livingston Governor of Inverness, the following account of the Defeat of the Highland Rebels, who were drawn together to make a descent into the Low Country.

Sir Thomas Livingston being informed, that the Rebels had appointed their General Rendezvous at Strathspry, that Colonel Buchan and Colonel Canon were already arrived there with 2000 Men, and that they expected to be in few days 4000 strong, he drew together his own Regiment of Dragoons, 2 Troops of Horse, commanded by Captain Hayes second Son to the Lord Yester, and Captain Burnett, 6 Companies of the Laird of Grimsby's Regiment, 400 Men of Sir James Leslie's, and a Company of Highlanders commanded by . . . Mackay, and marched towards the Rebels. On the 30th of the last Month he got more particular Intelligence of their Numbers, and how they lay Encamped, and thereupon continuing his march, came about the middle of the night to Bridg Castle. He understood there were two Forts, one near the Rebels Camp, where they had posted a strong Party in a Church; and another farther up the River which was not guarded. The latter he passed with the greatest part of his Troops, and ordered the rest to attack the Rebels in the Church, who up in our first firing, fled to their Camp, which our Horse and Dragoons entered about the same time, and put the Rebels into so great confusion, that they betook themselves to flight, and to get to the Hills. We killed near 1000 of the Rebels, and took about 100 Prisoners, most of them Gentlemen and Officers, (the Names and Qualities of divers of which are not yet known) and Colonel Buchan and Colonel Canon escaped very narrowly, not having had time to put on their Clothes. After this, Sir Thomas Livingston sent a Party to attack the Castle of Strathspry, in which the Rebels had a Garrison under the command of Col. Buchan's Nephew, who surrendered on different terms. We took, besides Arms and Ammunition, 200 Bolls of Meal, also a Standard which the Rebels were to set up for the late King James. And in all this we lost but one Man, but had 4 or 5 wounded, and 1000000s killed and disabled.

Stamford, May 6. Yesterday went out the laden Fleet of 100000, being above 100 Sail, with the Assurance Fleet of their Convoy. And last night came into Torrington Haven about 50 Sail of Light Ships, under Convoy of the Phoenix, and above 50 Sail are now coming to the Bar.

London, April 30. Colonel Trevelyan's Regiment, and the Regiments that were with them, sailed out of this

Harbor on Sunday last, under the Convoy of the Kingfisher, and James Galley, for Carthagena.

Casler, May 7. On Monday 25 of the King's Carridges, drawn each by 4 Horses, came in here; and are since gone down to Highlake, in order to their Transportation for Ireland. We have an account by persons come from Highlake, that there were yesterday 4 Men of War, and about 250 Ships more, in that Road.

Falmouth, May 5. On Saturday arrived here the Sloop of Guernsey, and this day the *Elbow of London*, both from Bilbao; whence they came about 18 days ago in company of 30 Sail more, English and Dutch, in the Convoy of 3 Dutch Men of War; many of which are gone up the North Channel.

Plymouth, May 6. Yesterday came in here two Merchant Ships of London, and a Swedish Ship of 40 Guns, being part of the Bilbao Fleet; and two more we hear are put into Falmouth, and one into Penzance. The six *Bilbao* Men, now in this Port, will sail under Convoy of the Charles Galley with the first fair Wind for the Down.

Weymouth, May 7. This day passed by Portland to the westward a great Fleet of Ships, Sailors, as it's believed, for Ireland.

Portsmouth, May 8. The Wind has continued fair for the Ships that sailed from St. Helens on the 5th Instant, bound to Ireland. On Tuesday came into this Harbor a Dutch Man of War to visit.
