Venice, May 5.

**T**HE Captain-General *Cornaro* is arrived before *Napoli di Malvasia*, in which there is a Garrison of 500 Men. It's believed, he designs formally to attack that place.

*Francfort, May 14* The Imperial Commissaries have provided a great Magazine in this City, for the use of the Forces that are to act on this side; and the like Provision has been made in several other places. It's certain, that the Elector of *Saxony* will march in Person with his Forces towards the *Rhine*, which are expected in this Neighbourhood towards the end of this Month. The French are drawing together in *Alsace*, to compose the Army which is to be commanded by the Dauphin; and some of their Troops have begun to Encamp on the *Moselle*, not far from *Trier*, where they are to form a flying Camp, to be commanded by the Marquis de *Boufflers*. The last Letters from *Vienna* tell us, that the Emperor had not yet named the General Officers that are to command his Forces this Summer.

*Cologne, May 12.* We have an account from *Suisserland*, that the Deputies of the 13 Cantons, being lately extraordinarily assembled at *Baden*, had given Audience to the Imperial, Spanish, and French Ambassadors; The two first represented to them the French King's several Violations of the Peace and Truce, and the barbarous Devastations and inhuman Cruelties committed by his order in the Empire; desired, they would not grant the Crown of *France* any more Levies or Recruits, but that they would recal their Troops now in that Service; and offered to receive into the Emperor's pay two *Suisse* Regiments of 2000 Men each, and two more into the Service of the State of *Milan*. The French Ambassador told them the great regard the King his Master had for the whole Helvetick Body, and the advantages they might expect from his Alliance, and pressed them to a strict observance of it. Upon these matters, the said Deputies took no Resolution, but referred the consideration thereof to the General Dyet, which is to meet the 21st of this Month at *Baden*.

*Cologne, May 16.* The *Brandenburg* Forces are marching to their Rendezvous; and those that remain still on the other side of the *Rhine*, are ordered to draw together at *Nuis*. The Electoral Prince Palatine has taken a review of his Troops in the Dutchy of *Juliers*, and in the Country of *Bergs*, and is expected here to morrow. We have advice, that the *Bavarian* Forces are ordered to march towards *Francfort*, near which place the Imperial Army is to have its General Rendezvous.

*Hamburg, May 15.* The Letters from *Warsaw* inform us, that the Dyet of that Kingdom ended very happily the 7th Instant, at 8 in the morning, for which *Te Deum* was sung, and the Cannon dis-

charged round that City. They write from *Canningsberg*, that the Elector of *Brandenburg* would receive on the 23d Instant the Homage of the States of *Prussia*, at which, according to custom, two Noblemen of *Poland* are to be present; after which, his Electoral Highness intends to pass by water to *Culberg* in *Pomerania*, from whence he may be in three days at *Berlin*. And by the middle of *June* he will be at the Head of his Forces. The Troops of *Lunenburg* are ordered to march, to joyn the rest of the Confederate Forces on the *Rhine*; whither the 6000 *Suedes* will likewise begin their march about the 20th of this Month. We are told from *Copenhagen*, that the King of *Denmark* intends to take a Voyage this Summer to *Norway*.

*Paris, May 16.* The Letters from *Brest* tell us, that the French Fleet (which parted from *Corke* the 17th of the last Month) arrived there on the 4th Instant with 5500 Irish, commanded by Lieutenant-General *Macarty*, who were come ashore, and quartered about *Brest*, being to be new clothed before they are put into Garrisons. The French Troops that were sent to *Ireland*, found no Conveniencies provided for them at their landing; and the Air not agreeing with them, many are fallen sick. They say, the General Rendezvous of the Irish Forces was appointed near *Kilkenny*, but that they cannot take the Field till Forage is plentiful, having no Magazines; And that the late King *James* has made *Monsieur de la Hoguette* Lieutenant-General. They write from *Toulon*, that *Monsieur de Chasteau Regnault* sailed from thence the 3d Instant with 6 great Men of War, and 3 Fireships, to joyn the Fleet at *Brest*. The Chevalier de *Noailles* parted from hence the 11th for *Rochfort*, to command the 15 new Gallies that are to be employed in the Ocean. The Dauphin will begin his Journey on Wednesday next towards *Germany*, and intends to be the 29th at *Strasbourg*, and the first of the next Month at *Landau*.

*Brussels, May 17.* Our Governor-General went the last week to *Charleroy* to visit that Garrison, and returned hither on Friday last, being guarded by a Regiment of *Hanouer* Dragoons, under the command of the Baron de *Vetri*. In his way he viewed the ground about *Pieton*, where it's said the Confederate Army is to Encamp. His Excellency has sent the *Sieur de Trimont* to *Prince Waldecke*, to adjust with him divers matters relating to the Campaign. The Dutch Forces are drawing together about *Tillemont*; And those in the Service of these Countries are, it's said, to Rendezvous between *Asch* and *Ninove*. The Marechal of *Luxemburg* came on Saturday last to *Leuse*, where he caused a Camp to be marked out; and a Bridge to be laid over the *Scheid* near *St. Antoin*: Which the French Troops that were gathered together between *St. Amard* and

*Montagne* have since passed, in order to their marching to their new Camp at *Leuse*, where they were expected yesterday. Our Governor has ordered his Servants and Equipage to be in a readiness to take the Field against the end of this Week.

*Hague, May 19.* The Count of *Oxenstern* Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Sweden*, took his place yesterday at the meeting of the Allies. The Heer *Van Nortwyck*, and the Heer *Van Cloufe*, Deputies of this State for the Field, intend to go the next week to the Army, which is to Rendezvous between *St. Tron* and *Telienmont*. We have an account from *Shus*, that *Jacob Martinet* one of the Schepen of that Town, and *Cornelis Rzelantz*, had upon their Tryal been convicted of holding Correspondence with the French, in order to betray or burn the Town; that the first was sentenced to be strangled, his Body to be quartered, and his Head to be set up over one of the Gates; and the other to be hanged; and that they were accordingly Executed on the 16th Instant. They write from *Flanders*, that the Court at *Brussels* will forbid the Commerce of Letters to *Spain* through *France*. The Duke of *Savoy*, as we are told by the last Letters from *Paris*, has complied with the French Demands.

*Edinburg, May 8.* This day the Act for Repealing the Articles was approved by the Parliament, and had the Royal Assent; after which, Committees were appointed to consider of a Bill for Settling the Church Government; A Bill for giving a Supply to Their Majesties; a Bill for Freedom of Speech; and a Bill about Fines and Forfeitures. Sir *Thomas Livingston* has sent out several Parties in pursuit of the Rebels, who, as we understand by a person newly come from the Highlands, are, since their late defeat, in a great disorder and consternation. Here is a Report, that the Laird of *Loghiell* of *Louquabar*, the chief of the *Camerons*, and of the greatest Interest among the Rebels, was lately killed in a private Quarrel. Major-General *Mackay* will begin his march to-morrow or next day with the Forces hereabouts, to joyn those in the North.

*Lisburne, May 5.* Yesterday came hither a Soldier, who had made his Escape from *Charlmonnt*, where he was a Prisoner; He tells us, That the late Succor they had received, was no more than 4 days Provisions for the Garrison that was then there, which those that brought it had not had time to consume, nor daring to stir out any more, because of our Troops that were posted round the place to watch them; inasmuch, that the Garrison was in a worse condition than before, and had already been forced to eat Horse Flesh. It's reported, that the Duke of *Berwick* is drawing a Body of Men together for their Relief; and on the 10th several Regiments are marching that way. The 20th Instant arrived at *Belfast* the Regiment of *Trelswany*, and yesterday those of *Nassau* and *Brandenburg*.

*Pembroke, May 7.* This morning arrived in our Harbor the *Kings-fighter* from *Carrickfergus*, whence she came on the 3d Instant.

*Highgate, May 7.* On Sunday last passed by this place the *Paul* Brigant, going towards *Dublin* Bay to cruise.

*Chesler, May 12.* On the 7th Instant sailed from *Highgate* the *Ruby* and *Smyrna* Merchant, with the Ships under their Convoy for *Ireland*. And on the 8th the *Mary* Galley, with the Vessels that had on Board the Wagons and Horses. The same day about 50 Sail arrived there, with the *James* Galley, from *Carrickfergus*, whence they came on the 5th. The 9th, 20 Wagons more were shipped; the 10th, arrived here 500 Recruits; and the 11th, 32 of the Kings Wagons, which went this morning to *Highlake*. By a Person that came from *Dublin* the 24th of *April* last, (having made his Escape in a Wherry) we are told, That Provisions are very scarce there; That several Quarrels have already happened between the Irish and the French; And that the Horse of the Irish Army is in a very ill condition.

*Leverpoole, May 10.* Yesterday Sir *Clouesty Shovel* with 3 Men of War sailed from *Highlake* towards the Bay of *Dublin*.

*Plimouth, May 11.* On the 7th Instant the *Charles* Galley, with about 10 Merchant Ships, English and Dutch, under her Convoy, sailed from hence for the Downs, but they were forced back again the next day by contrary Winds. On the 8th arrived here Their Majesties Ships the *Woolwich*, the *Sweepstakes*, the *Constant Warwick*, and the *Greyhound*, with the *Mary*, *Henrietta*, and *Kitchen* Yachts, and about 100 Sail of Merchant Ships laden with Stores and Provisions; and yesterday they set sail again together with their Majesties Ship the *Terk*, for *Ireland*.

*Barnstable, May 11.* On Tuesday last arrived at *Isford Combe* a Pink belonging to *New-England*, and designed for *Bristol*. Here is brought in a Dutch Flyboat, which was found floating on the Sea, without any living Creature or any Goods in her.

*Deal, May 10.* On the 8th Instant passed by, on the back of the *Guadwin*, about 18 Sail of Dutch Flyboats, with their Convoy, bound for *Portsmouth*.

*Portsmouth, May 13.* On the 10th Instant arrived at *Spithead* about 20 Vessels under the Convoy of two Dutch Men of War, having on Board the Troop of Guards commanded by the Duke of *Ormonde*, and the Earl of *Oxford*'s Regiment of Horse; which Landed on the 11th, and are quartered in the adjacent Towns. The *Jersey* and the *Alceste* sailed two days ago out of this Harbor to *Spitehead*.

*Whitehall, May 13.* On the 11th Instant Don *Pedro de Ronquillo*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of *Spain*, had a publick Audience of His Majesty, to notify the Marriage of the King his Master, from whom, as also from the Queen Mother of *Spain*, he delivered Letters to His Majesty, wherein They thank His Majesty for sending a Squadron of his Ships with the Queen, and express the great Esteem and Value they have for His Majesty's Royal Person and Friendship.
