

# The London Gazette.

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Turin, May 6.

**T**HE Duke of Savoy returned hither on Sunday last from *Mondovi*; and the same day declared the Marquis *Di San Giorgio* Governor of *Vercelli*; and the *Sieur Bagnolo* Commandant of *Lucerne*. On *Wednesday* the French attack'd a Party of the *Vandois*, who had advantageously posted themselves in one of their Valleys, but were repulsed with the loss of 200 Men killed, and a Lieutenant-Colonel and several others taken Prisoners. The French Forces commanded by *Monsieur Catinat*, are drawing together near *Pignerol*. It's said, that they demand Contributions of the *Duchy of Milan*.

*Venice*, May 12. The *Abbot Conti* being arrived here with the Consecrated Cap and Sword from *Rome*, he presented the same on Sunday last to the *Doge* in the Church of *St. Marke*, a great many Persons of Quality assisting at the Ceremony. By a Felucca, which came from *Spalatro* on the 9th Instant, we have advice, that the *Montegrini*, who were drawn together in a Body, in order to join with the Forces of this State, being informed that the *Bassa of Arcgovina* was marching with a resolution to attack them, put themselves into so good a posture, that they not only repulsed him, but put his Troops to flight, killing 4 or 500, and taking many Prisoners, of which number was the *Bassa* himself with two other Officers of principal Note among the Turks; We hear by the same way, that the Turkish Forces that had drawn together on the Frontiers of *Dalmatia*, were marched to join the Ottoman Army which is to act against the Germans. The Captain of a *Marchione*, who parted from *Corfou* the 24th past, and arrived here this day, reports, that they had advice there by Letters of the 22d past from *Preveza*, that the Captain General *Cornaro* understanding that the Turkish Fleet was come out with a design to attempt the Relief of *Napoli di Malvasia*, he failed to meet them, but that in bad weather the *St. Marke*, and the *Issippo*, (Admiral *Waller* being on board the latter) were separated from him; that these two Ships met afterwards the Turkish Fleet consisting of 14 Men of War and 7 Gallies between *Scio* and *Metelino*, and after a sharp Fight, one was blown up, and the other sunk; but that the Turks believing the rest of our Fleet was not far off, durst not pursue their Course towards *Napoli di Malvasia*. We must expect by Letters from our Fleet, the certainty of this News, with the further Circumstances of it.

*Vienna*, May 14. The Emperor has named the Velt-Marshal *Caprara* to command his Forces in *Germany* this Campaign; but in case they join with those of the Elector of *Bavaria*, he is to yield the chief Command to his Electoral Highness: He will in few days begin his Journey towards the Empire. Prince *Louis of Baden* is likewise on his departure for *Bulgaria*. The last Letters from *Nizza*, say, the Turks had drawn 10000 Men together near *Nicepuli*; That they expected a Body of Tartars to join with them; And that their design was to attack *Widin* both by Water and Land, for which purpose they had armed a great many small Vessels that had been brought from the *Black-Sea*.

*Cologne*, May 23. The Confederate Forces, that were quartered in these parts, are all in motion, some towards the *Meuse*, and others towards *Flanders*, so that the Campaign will now be very quickly opened. There are Letters from *Vienna* which speak of a great probability of a sudden Peace with the Turks.

*Paris*, May 23. The Dauphin began his Journey the 17th Instant towards *Germany*, accompanied by the Duke of *Vandome*; He lay the next day at *Vitry*; and purpotes to be on the first of *June* at *Lindau*. The Marquis *de Prasna*, Ambassador from *Savoy*, is ar-

rived here, but has not yet had Audience. The French Troops under the command of *Monsieur Catinat* entered, as we are assured, on the 9th Instant into *Piedmont*, but without committing any Hostilities; and in the mean time the Duke of *Orleans* labours very earnestly to accommodate Matters between the two Courts. They write from *Brest* of the 15th, that they work very hard on the Fleet that's fitting out there. And that many of the Irish Soldiers that came lately from *Ireland* are dead, there reigning a contagious Distemper amongst them, which they have likewise communicated to the French.

*Brussels*, May 24. The 20th Instant our Governor-General sent the Prince *de Vaudemont*, the Marquis *de Bedmar*, and the Heer *Van Tirmon* to Confer with the Prince of *Waldecke* at *St. Tron*; They returned the next day, and with them came Lieutenant-General *Alva*, and several other General Officers; who acquainted his Excellency, that Lieutenant-General *Webbenum* was posted with 12000 Men near *St. Tron*, to cover the march of the rest of the Dutch Forces that are drawing together at *Bonneff*, where Prince *Waldecke* intended to be this day. The French Army under the command of the Duke of *Luxemburg*, after having destroyed the Forage about *Aeth and Leuse*, repass'd the *Schelde*, and advanced to *Harlebecke* on this side of *Courtray*, from whence He sent two Detachments, one towards *Deynse*, and the other towards the Canal of *Bruges*, to waste and destroy the Country. Our Governor upon the advice of their Motions drew together the Forces quartered in *Flanders* and *Brabant*; who are now in a Body of about 16000 near *Dendermond*; and his Excellency went yesterday to *Ghent*, to give the necessary Orders for the security of those Parts against the Enemies Incurfions; and we hear just now, that the two French Detachments before-mentioned are, upon the march of our Troops, returned to their Camp at *Harlebecke*.

*Hague*, May 26. The States of *Holland* are separated for a fortnight. Count *Coningsje*, the Imperial Minister, is arrived here from *England*; whither the Prince of *Hesse Darmstadt* is lately gone with a noble Retinue, intending to accompany his Majesty to *Ireland*. The Squadrons of this State are all failed to join the English Fleet, except six Men of War fitted out by the Admiralty of *Friseland*; Admiral *Evertz* commands them as he did the last year, and is himself on board a Ship of 100 Guns belonging to *Zeland*. The *Sieur Bonfise* is come hither from the City of *Hamburgh*, to sollicite a Neutrality, but the Ministers of the Allies have declared against it, so that he is like to return without any success in this Commission. Prince *Waldecke* was according to our last advice at *St. Tron*, and intended to go from thence on the 24th Instant to *Bonneff*, where he had appointed the General Rendezvous of his Army, which will be composed of 36000 Fighting Men. We hear from *Flanders*, that there have been discovered at *Bruges* and *Audenarde* several Treasonable Practices and Correspondencies to betray those places to the French. Two Persons more have been apprehended at *Shuys* for holding Correspondence with them. Our Advices about the Duke of *Savoy* are very various and uncertain.

*Edinburgh*, May 15. The 13th Instant the Letters and other Papers taken from the Rebels, after their defeat on the first Instant, in the Camp at *Cambdell*, were read in Council. Yesterday the Parliament met again, and forfeited all those now in Rebellion against Their Majesties in the *Highlands* or elsewhere. Our Forces are marching towards the North.

*Lisburne*, May 15. The 11th Instant the Governor of *Charlemont* demanded a Parley, which being granted, with Leave to send to the General, the Lieutenant-Governor and a Colonel came hither from that Garrison on the 12th;

and the same day the Articles were agreed on for the surrender of that place; as follows;

That all the Garrison, viz. the Governour, Officers, Soldiers, Gunners, and all other Inhabitants, (the Deserters who ran from us since the first day of September last only excepted) and all other Persons in the said Garrison shall have their Lives secured, and march out with their Arms, Bag, and Baggage, Drums Beating, Colours Flying, March lighted, Banners in their Mouths, each Officer and Soldier 12 Charges of Powder, with Match and Ball proportionable, and their Horses, without any molestation in their Persons or Goods now in their possession, not belonging to the Stores, upon any pretence whatsoever.

That the said Garrison may march the nearest way to Dundalk, and not be compelled to march above 8 or 9 miles a day.

That all the sick and wounded Officers, and other Persons that are not able to march at present, may remain within the said Garrison till they are able to march, and then to have a Pass to go to the next Irish Garrison.

That none of the Army under his Graces Command shall enter the said Fort, except such who are appointed by him to take possession of the same, till the Garrison be marched clear out of the Gates. That there shall be a sufficient Convoiy appointed for the said Garrison to conduct them to the place before-mentioned.

That they shall deliver fully and wholly without any embelishment or diminution all the Stores belonging to the said Fort, and that an Officer shall be immediately admitted to take an account of the same.

That the Fort shall be put into the possession of such Forces as his Grace shall think fit at Eight of the Clock on Wednesday next, being the 15th day of this Instant May, at which hour the said Garrison shall march out, and an hour before the outward Gate shall be delivered to such Forces as his Grace shall appoint; in case a supply of one month Provision for Eight hundred Men be not brought into the Garrison for their Relief between the Signing hereof and the said time.

That the above-mentioned Articles shall be inviolably performed on both sides without any Enquiry, Mental-Reservation, or Fraud whatsoever, according to the true intent and meaning thereof.

Lastly, That all Acts of Hostility shall cease betwixt the said Garrison and Army so soon as notice can be given on both sides.

In pursuance of this Capitulation the Governour Tige & Regiment, and the Garrison (who had almost consumed all their Provisions) marched out yesterday 800 strong, leaving in the place a good quantity of Ammunition, and 17 Pieces of Brass Cannon, and two Mortars. His Grace went on Tuesday to Lisnagory, to see the Garrison as they marched away, and afterwards to visit the place, which is very strong, and considerable by it's situation; and we expect his Grace here again this day.

Cobler, May 19. The 16th Instant the James Galley and the Swift sailed from Highlake with the Ships under their Convoy bound for Ireland. Yesterday arrived several Vessels from Belfast, and brought the News of the Actual Surrender of Charlemont on the 14th of this month. They say likewise, that Brigadier Stewart had been with 500 Men within half a mile of Dundalk, and had brought away several hundred head of Cattle.

Pardocks, May 17. The 10th Instant sailed from hence about 40 Merchant Ships under the Convoy of the *Sapier*, for *Carrickfergus*. The 11th a Fleet of above 80 Sail, of which four were Men of War, passed by this Harbour bound for Highlake. Last night came in here the *St. Albans*, the *Dover*, and the *Experiment* from cruising on the Coast of Ireland.

Plymouth, May 13. The 14th Instant arrived here the *Kings-Fisher* from *Carrickfergus*; and the *Bonadventure* from cruising; and a Dutch Privateer brought in a French Prize laden with Wine and Brandy. The 15th came in the *Forefight* and *Garsland*, with several Tin Ships, and others bound to the Eastward; and an *Oslander* with a French Prize. The 16th arrived the *Mary Galley* from Highlake. Yesterday sailed from hence their Majesties Ships the *Crown*, the *Forefight*, the *Bonadventure*, and the *Swallow*, with several Merchant Ships to the Eastward. The *Diligence* of London is arrived here from Belfast.

Droit, May 19. The 15th Instant went out of the Downs about 20 Sail of Vessels laden with Ammunition, Provisions, &c. for Ireland, under the Convoy of the *Arch-Angle*. There are now in the Downs their Majesties Ships the *Sussex* and the *Burwick*.

Portsmouth, May 20. On the 16th Instant arrived at *St. Helens* 5 Dutch Men of War, one of them a Vice-Admiral, another a Rear-Admiral. The same day came to Spithead the *Arch-Angle* with 20 Sail of Vessels bound for Ireland. The 17th all the Men of War, English and Dutch, sailed from Spithead to *St. Helens*, where they still continue, under the command of Rear-Admiral De-

will, and 2 Dutch Vice-Admirals, and 3 Rear-Admirals being in all between 30 and 40 Men of War besides Frigates. The Wind at N. E.
