TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

1. THE Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office at the Bank of England, on Thursday, the 29th instant, at one o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Act 40 Vic., cap. 2, to the amount of £2,160,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £1,000, £5,000, or £10,000. They will be dated the 6th August, 1886, and will be payable at three or six months after date (at the option of the persons tendering), viz.:—on the 6th November or 6th February next, respectively.

3. The Tenders must specify the net amount per cent. which will be given for the amounts applied for; and the Tenders of private individuals must be made through a London Banker.

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same on Friday, the 30th instant, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England not later than three o'clock, on Friday, the 6th proximo.

6. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

WHEREAS a representation has been duly made to me, as Secretary of State for the Home Department, by the Justices acting in and for the Petty Sessional Division of Cranbrook, in the county of Kent, that a Fair has been annually held at Goudhurst, within the said Petty Sessional Division of the said county, on the 26th day of August, and that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that the said Fair should be abolished:

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No 153.)—MEDITERRANEAN—ASIA MINOR.—KARAMANIA—MARMARICE HARBOUR APPROACH.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 67 (2, 3), of 18th March, 1886, on the intended exhibition of lights from the two undermentioned lighthouses, then in course of construction, in the approach to Marmarice Harbour:—

The Turkish Government has given further notice, that on 1st July, 1886, the following lights would be exhibited:—

(1.) *Fixed Lights on Cape Marmarice.*

The lights on Cape Marmarice, western side of approach to Marmarice Harbour, are two fixed white lights, placed vertically. The upper light is elevated 131 feet above the sea; both lights should be visible in clear weather from a distance of twelve miles.

The lighthouse is situated 54 yards within the extremity of the Cape.

Position, lat. 36° 43' 55" N., long. 28° 20' 45" E.

(2.) *Red Light on Adassi Point.*

The light on Adassi Point, south extreme of Passage Island and on the west side of East Pass, Marmarice Harbour, is a fixed red light, elevated 59 feet above the sea, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of six miles.

The lighthouse is situated 21 yards from the extremity of the Point.

Cape Race—Irregular Action of Fog Signal.

INFORMATION has been received from Captain R. H. Hamond, H.M.S. "Emerald," that on the morning of 30th May, 1886, the fog whistle at Cape Race was sounded at irregular intervals, varying in time from one to two minutes.

This irregular action of the fog signal had also been noticed by the Commander of the British mail steam vessel "Siberian," who was consequently doubtful whether it was the signal at Cape Race, or that of some fishing vessel.
