THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Copenhagen, reporting that, in view of the presence of Asiatic cholera in Austria-Hungary, the Danish Government has ordered that all ships coming from Austro-Hungarian ports, or which have communicated on the voyage with ships coming from such ports, shall be subject to medical inspection, and the importation of used linen, clothing, or bedding from such ports is interdicted, unless they are personal luggage. Further, the importation is forbidden of rags, used wadding, short wool, paper refuse, hair, and hides coming from ports in Austria-Hungary.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at

Pernambuco, enclosing the following translation of a Quarantine Notice issued by the Brazilian Government:—

Declared infected the ports Venice and Brindisi, and subject to rigorous quarantine at lazaretto. Ilha Grande vessels coming from those ports destined to any Brazilian ports, after the 8th of this month.

Declared suspected Italian ports in the Adriatic, Otranto Channel, Gulf of Taranto, and Ionian Sea, as far as Reggio, in the Straits of Messina, and Austrian ports in the Gulf of Trieste and Istrian Peninsula as far as Fiume.

Ships from suspected ports which have had cases of cholera during the voyage or susceptible cargoes will only be admitted into the port of Rio de Janeiro.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a note from the Netherlands' Minister, intimating that the Netherlands' Government have revoked the prohibition against the importation and transit of rags, used clothing, and unwashed linen from Spain and Gibraltar, and have declared the Austro-Hungarian ports of the Adriatic infected with cholera.
