

upon-Trent in the county of Stafford and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas by an instrument bearing date the seventh day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty and being under the hand and seal of the then Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield and being also under the hand and seal of the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent a separate district was assigned to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate at Fenton Calvert otherwise Great Fenton in the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent and the same was called 'The Particular District of Christ Church, Fenton.'

"And whereas the said particular district of Christ Church Fenton has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Christ Church Fenton should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Dalrymple Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation the boundaries of the said new parish of Christ Church Fenton shall be altered so that there shall be dissevered from such new parish all that portion thereof which is described in the first schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink and that the boundaries of the said new parish shall be further altered so that there shall be annexed to the same new parish all that further portion of the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent which is described in the second schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended as aforesaid and is thereon coloured green and that from and after the day of the same date and without any assurance in law other than such duly gazetted Order the said portion of the said new parish of Christ Church Fenton so to be dissevered therefrom as aforesaid shall be restored to and again become and be and form part of the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent and that from and after the day of the same date and likewise without any assurance in law other than such duly gazetted Order the said portion of the parish of Stoke-upon-Trent so to be annexed to the new parish of Christ Church Fenton as aforesaid, shall be included in and shall become and be and form part of the said new parish of Christ Church, Fenton.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Christ Church Fenton sometime part of the parish of Stoke-upon-Trent in the county of Stafford and in the diocese of Lichfield and to be restored to the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Christ Church Fenton which is bounded upon the north-east and upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent from the new parish of Christ Church Fenton aforesaid at the centre of the bridge which carries the road leading from Stoke-upon-Trent to Longton and which is called or known as High-street East over the line of the Biddulph Valley Branch of the North Staffordshire Railway and extending thence that is from the said boundary south-eastward along the middle of the said road or street for a distance of eight and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Pratt-street and extending thence south-westward for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named street and along the middle of Regent-road to the boundary at the centre of the bridge which carries the last-named road over the line of the Uttoxeter Branch of the said North Staffordshire Railway, which boundary divides the said new parish of Christ Church Fenton from the parish of Stoke-upon-Trent aforesaid.

"All which said hereinbefore-described portion of the new parish of Christ Church Fenton aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides other than upon the north-east and the south-east as aforesaid that is to say upon the south-west and upon the north-west by the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent or in other words upon the south-west by the said Uttoxeter Branch line of the North Staffordshire Railway aforesaid and upon the north-west by the said Biddulph Valley branch line of the same railway.

"The SECOND SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be annexed to the said new parish of Christ Church Fenton, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Stoke-upon-Trent aforesaid which is bounded upon the north-west and upon the greater part of the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church Fenton from the parish of Stoke-upon-Trent as aforesaid at the point where Grove-road is joined by the private road or lane leading to the Collieries and Iron Works of the Stafford Coal and Iron Company, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road or lane for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed 'F. Ch. Ch. N. P. 1886' and placed upon the south-eastern side of the same road or lane at the north-western end of the line of fences which divide the closes numbered respectively 2934 and 2938 upon the ordnance survey map of the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent on the $\frac{1}{2500}$ scale published in the year 1879, and upon the map hereunto annexed from the closes numbered respectively 3352 and 3353 upon the same maps, and extending thence that is from the last-mentioned point in the middle of the said private road or lane, first south-eastward to the said boundary-stone and then south-eastward, north-eastward, and south-eastward along the said line of fences for a distance of fifteen and a half chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the south-eastern end of the same line of fences which boundary divides the said parish of Stoke-
