The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

WHEREAS by section 18 of "The Extradition Act, 1870," it is, among other things, enacted, That if by any law made after the passing of the said Act by the Legislature of any British Possession provision is made for carrying into effect within such Possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in, or suspected of being in, such British Possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Act in the case of any Foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, either—

Suspend the operation within any such British Possession of the said Act, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such Foreign State, and so long as such law continues in force there, and no longer ;

Or direct that such law or Ordinance, or any part thereof, shall have effect in such British Possession, with or without modifications and alterations, as if it were part of the Act.

And whereas on the third day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, an Ordinance was enacted by the Legislature of British Guiana, whereby provision is made with regard to the extradition of fugitive criminals from French Guiana.

And whereas it is provided by the said Ordinance that the said Ordinance shall come into operation and take effect only after Her Majesty shall by Order in Council direct that the said Ordinance shall have effect within the colony, and after such Order in Council shall have been published in the Official Gazette.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in pursuance of "The Extradition Act, 1870," and in exercise of the power in that behalf in the said Act contained, doth by this present Order, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, direct that the said Ordinance shall have effect in the Colony of British Guiana without modification or alteration, as if it were part of "The Extradition Act, 1870."

And the Right Honourable Edward Stanhope, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by a Convention, bearing date the second day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, concluded between His Majesty the German Emperor, King of Prussia, and Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, it has been agreed to extend to the parts of the German Empire hitherto standing in no treaty relations with Great Britain in respect to the protection in copyright in works of literature and art which have first appeared in those parts of the said Empire and in this country the treaty rights at present operative in virtue of the stipulations contained in the Conventions named therein between Prussia and other German States on one side, and Great Britain on the other.

And whereas due protection has been secured within the dominions of His Majesty the German Emperor King of Prussia for the authors of books, dramatic works, or musical compositions,

and the inventors, designers, or engravers of prints and articles of sculpture, and the authors, inventors, designers, or engravers of any other works whatsoever of literature and the fine arts first published in the dominions of Her Majesty.

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Law relating to International Copyright," and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her reign, intituled "An Act to enable Her Majesty to carry into effect a Convention with France on the subject of Copyright, to extend and explain the International Copyright Acts, and to explain the Acts relating to Copyright in Engravings," doth order and it is hereby ordered that from and after the twenty-ninth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, the authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers of any of the following works, that is to say, books, dramatic works, musical compositions, drawings, paintings, sculpture, engravings, lithographs, and any other works of literature and the fine arts, in which the laws of Great Britain give to British subjects the privilege of Copyright, and the executors, administrators, and assigns of such authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers, respectively, shall as respects works first published within the said parts of the German Empire after the said twenty-ninth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, have the privilege of Copyright therein for a period equal to the term of Copyright which authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers of the like works, respectively, first published in the United Kingdom are by law entitled to, provided such books, dramatic works, musical compositions, drawings, paintings, sculpture, engravings, lithographs, or other works of literature or the fine arts shall have been registered and copies thereof shall have been delivered according to the requirements of the said recited Acts within twelve months after the first publication thereof in any part of the said parts of the German Empire.

And it is hereby further ordered that the authors of dramatic pieces and musical compositions which shall after the day aforesaid be first publicly represented or performed within such parts of the German Empire, or their executors, administrators, or assigns, shall have the sole liberty of representing or performing in any part of the British Dominions such dramatic pieces or musical compositions during a period equal to the period during which authors of dramatic pieces and musical compositions first publicly represented or performed in the United Kingdom are entitled by law to the sole liberty of representing or performing the same, provided such dramatic pieces or musical compositions have been registered and copies thereof have been delivered according to the requirements of the said first recited Act within twelve months after the time of their being first represented or performed in any part of such portions of the German Empire.

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, and by virtue of the authority of the said secondly hereinbefore recited Act, doth hereby order that the authors of any works published or of any dramatic pieces first publicly represented in such portions of the German Empire at any time after the day next after the twenty-ninth day of October, one thousand eight
