Whitehall, September 29, 1886.

THE Queen, taking into Her Royal consideration that upon the decease without issue of Plantagenet Pierrepont, Viscount Falkland, Admiral in the Royal Navy, on the 1st day of February last, the dignity of Viscount Falkland devolved upon Byron Plantagenet, now Viscount Falkland, as the eldest son of Byron Charles Ferdinand Plantagenet Cary, Esquire (commonly called the Honourable Byron Charles Ferdinand Plantagenet Cary), Captain in the Royal Navy, who was the third son of Charles John, Viscount Falkland, and next brother of the said Plantagenet Pierrepont, late Viscount Falkland, whereby according to the rules of honour, the sisters of the said Byron Plantagenet, Viscount Falkland cannot enjoy that place and precedence which would have been due to them had their late father survived his elder brother, and succeeded to the dignity of Viscount Falkland. Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to ordain and declare that Emma Amelia, Widow of Thomas Benyon Ferguson, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, Selina Catherine, wife of Charles Edward Fox, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, Master in Equity, High Court, Bombay, and Annie Christiana Cary, Spinster, shall henceforth have, hold, and enjoy the same title, place, pre-eminence and precedence, as if their late father, the said Byron Charles Ferdinand Plantagenet Cary had survived his brother, the said Plantagenet Pierrepont, late Viscount Falkland, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Viscount Falkland:

And to command that the said Order and Declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Vienna, enclosing the following translation of Notices published by the Ministries of Commerce at Vienna and Pesth on the subject of quarantine in the ports of Austria and Hungary:—

Notice.

Vessels arriving at Trieste from Fiume in a

normal condition will henceforth not be subjected to a seven days period of observation, but only to a strict medical examination, to disinfection of effects on board, and to a period of observation of twenty-four hours.

Notice.

The sanitary measures adopted on arrivals from the districts of Metkovich, Fortopus, and Neum, as well as the medical examination and disinfection of arrivals from the district of Spalato in the other ports of Dalmatia, have been rescinded.

Vienna, September 30, 1886.

Notice.

All vessels arriving from infected ports of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy, except in cases of illness or death on board, will, after strict medical inspection, disinfection of the linen, and twenty-four hours supervision, be admitted to free pratique. Such sanitary measures will take place at the ports of arrival, and not at the lazzaretto of Martinschizza.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Serajevo, stating that on account of the outbreak of cholera in Hungary and Croatia, travellers arriving in Bosnia from those countries will be examined by a physician, and, together with their luggage, disinfected at Bihae, Kostajnica, Gradiska, Novi, Brod, Rastela, and Kladuza.
