The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council-

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirtyseven, sections six and eight have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property situate in the parishes of Canwick and Washingborough in the county

of Lincoln and now vested in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture bearing date the twenty-fifth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and made or expressed to be made between William Newton of Newark-upon-Trent in the county of Nottingham Esquire of the one part and us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the other part the lands and hereditaments described in the first part of the schedule hereto annexed situate in the parishes of Canwick and Washingborough in county of Lincoln became with their appurtenances and are now vested in us.

"And whereas under and by virtue of a certain other indenture bearing date the tenth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine and made or expressed to be made between Richard Keyworth and John Collingwood Surveyors of the Highways for the parish of Canwick in the county of Lincoln of the one part and us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the other part all that plot or piece of land situate in the said parish of Canwick and more particularly described in the second part of the said schedule became with its appurtenances and is now vested in us.

"And whereas under and by virtue of a certain other indenture bearing date the sixth day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five and made or expressed to be made between Robert Cooling of Heighington in the county of Lincoln Yeoman and William Dobson

of Waddington in the said county Farmer of the one part and us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the other part a piece of land situate in the said parish of Washingborough and more particularly described in the third part of the said schedule became with its appurtenances and is now vested in us.

"And whereas the said lands and hereditaments are not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant, but are now in our possession, but some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are

governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our common fund it is expedient that the said lands and hereditaments or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands and hereditaments or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

" Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act all or any of the said lands and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid with their appurtenances and all our estate right title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands tithes rent-charges tenements or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary stock, or other public securities in England.

#### PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the "laws concerning the burial of the dead in "England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, "and to amend the Act concerning the burial " of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with the following modifications, viz.:

STAPENHILL.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Stapenhill, in the county of Derby; and also in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard (as have never before been buried in, and which, when opened, are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be alloted, as can be buried at or below the

depth of five feet.

Wolston.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Wolston, in the county of Warwick; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :-

(a.) In such vaults as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brick-

work properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffina or disturbing human remains burials, may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard (as have never before been buried in and which when opened are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the

depth of five feet.

STRETTON SUGWAS: Forthwith and entirely in the old churchyard of the parish of Stretton Sugwas, in the county of Hereford, except for the burial at their decease of Mrs. Elizabeth Yeomans and Mr. William Charles

SAINT PETER'S, WORCESTER: Forthwith and entirely in Whittington church, in the parish of Saint Peter's, Worcester, and also in the part of the churchyard which lies on the south, south-west, west and north-west sides of the church; and in the rest of the churchyard except as fellows:-

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(d.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard (as have never before been buried in, and which, when opened, are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they nay be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-seventh day of December next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said twenty-seventh day of December.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows, viz.:

In the parish churchyard of Attleborough, in the county of Norfolk, until the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hun-

dred and eighty-six.

In the parish churchyard of Stretham, in the county of Cambridge, to the thirtieth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six. C. L. Peel.

THE ANIMALS (AMENDMENT) ORDER ÒF 1886.

T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 16th day of November, 1886.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

PRESENT:

Lord John Manners.

Sir Francis Sandford. HE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most

Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Norway declared a Free Country.

1.—(1.) The Animals Order of 1886, Kingdom of Norway Amendment, is hereby revoked: Provided that nothing herein shall he deemed to invalidate or made unlawful anything done under the said Order hereby revoked before the commencement of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Order hereby revoked before the commencement of this Order.

(2.) From and after the commencement of this Order animals brought from the Kingdom of Norway shall be subject to the provisions of Chapter 32 (Foreign Animals not subject to SLAUGHTER OR QUARANTINE) of The Animals Order of 1886, and the Kingdom of Norway shall be deemed to be included in the list of Free Countries named in Part I. of the Fifth Schedule to that Order as if the Order hereby revoked had not been made.

Amendment of Article 151 of The Animals Order of 1886.

2. The following provisions of this Article shall be read in the place of Article 151 of The Animals Order of 1886, and shall be deemed to be Article 151 of that Order (namely):

Conditions of Landing.

151.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals at a Landing-Place for foreign animals under the provisions of this Chapter is subject to the following conditions:

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any country other than in Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or in Norway, or in Iceland, or in New Zealand, or in the Channel Islands, or in the Isle of Man, or in the United States of America (provision as to which country is made by the second condition of this Article), or in Denmark or in Sweden (provision as to which two countries is made by the third condition of this Article).

Se ond, That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-one days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in the United States of America. Third. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any swine exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in Denmark or in Sweden.

Fourth. That the vessel has not within twentyone days before taking them on board or at
any time since taking on board the animals
imported, entered any port or place in any
country other than in Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or in Norway, or
in Iceland, or in New Zealand, or in the
Channel Islands, or in the Isle of Man, or
in Denmark, or in Sweden, or in the United
States of America.

Fifth. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in any country other than in Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or in Norway, or in Iceland, or in New Zealand, or in the Channel Islands, or in the Isle of Man, or (subject to the sixth condition of this Article) in Denmark or in Sweden.

Sixth. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any swine exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in Denmark or in Sweden.

(2.) And the animals imported shall not be landed at a Landing-Place for foreign animals unless and until—

(a.) The owner or charterer of the vessel in which they are imported, or his agent in England or Wales or Scotland, has entered into a bond to Her Majesty the Queen, in a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds, with or without a surety or sureties, to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Customs, conditioned for the observance of the foregoing conditions; and

(b.) The master of the vessel has on each occasion of importation of foreign animals therein satisfied the Commissioners of Customs, or their proper officer, by declaration made and signed or otherwise, that all the animals then imported therein are properly imported according to the provisions of this Article.

#### Interpretation.

3. In this Order terms have the same meaning as in The Animals Order of 1886.

#### . Short Title.

4. This Order may be cited as THE ANIMALS (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1886.

#### Commencement.

5. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the twenty-fourth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

#### (SWINE-FEVER.)

A T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 19th day of November, 1886.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—the Petty

Sessional Division of Miskin Lower, in the county of Glamorgan,—which was declared by Order of Council to be an Area infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twentieth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

Madeley Union.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Madeley Union, in the county of Salop :-

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the several parishes and places comprised in the said Union ;-

And to all others whom it may concern. WE, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby Order, with respect to the relief of the Poor in the said Madeley Union, as follows :-

ARTICLE 1.—Subject to the provisions of the General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners, dated the twenty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, in force in the Union, every able-bodied male pauper who receives relief within the Union, and is relieved out of the Workhouse, shall be relieved in the following manner; that is to say:—
Half at least of the relief given to such pauper

shall be given in food, clothing, and other articles

No such pauper shall receive relief from the Guardians, or any of their officers, or any Over-seer of any Parish or Place in the Union, while he is employed for wages or other hire or remuneration by any person; but every such pauper so relieved shall be set to work by the Guardians.

ARTICLE 2.—The Guardians shall, fourteen days after the day when this Order comes into force, and from time to time afterwards as the Local Government Board may require, report to the Local Government Board the place or places at which able-bodied male paupers shall be so set to work in the Union, the sort or sorts of work in which they or any of them shall be employed, the times and mode of work, and all such other matters relating to the employment of such able-bodied paupers as the said Guardians shall deem material to be communicated to the Local Government Board, or as the Local Government Board shall require.

ARTICLE 3 -If the Guardians shall depart, in any particulars instance, from any of the regulations hereinbefore contained, and shall, within fifteen days after such departure, report the same and the grounds thereof to the Local Government Board, and if the Local Government Board shall approve of such departure, then the relief granted in such particular instance shall, if otherwise lawful, not be deemed to be unlawful, or be subject

to be disallowed.

And whereas provision is made in a General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, in force in the said Union, for the appointment of an officer, to be termed a Superintendent of Out-door Labour, and for the continuance in office of such officer, and it is expedient that further provision should be made as hereinafter mentioned;

We therefore further Order, that if at any time the number of able-bodied male paupers requiring relief shall be so small as to render the services of a Superintendent of Out-door Labour unnecessary, the Guardians may dispense with the services of such an officer.

5. To provide for the deposit of a map or maps of the extended borough, and to make copies thereof evidence, and to authorize charges to be made for inspection or copies of or extracts

from any such map.

6. 8. To vest in the Corporation, for the benefit of the extended borough, all estates, property, funds, tolls, or other revenues, rights, and privileges, vested in the Corporation for the benefit of the existing borough, but subject to the debts and liabilities affecting the same, and to

make provision for the apportionment and discharge of such debts and liabilities.

9. To make provision for the repayment and discharge of all or such part of the moneys borrowed and now owing by the local and other authorities and bodies having any jurisdiction, rights, or powers in or over the added area as the Corporation may be required to repay and discharge either out of the funds, rates, or revenues of the extended borough, or otherwise, as the intended Act may prescribe.

10. To empower the Corporation and any such local or other authority or body as aforesaid to enter into and carry into effect agreements as to the adjustment of liabilities, or otherwise in respect to any of the matters aforesaid, and to confirm and give effect to any such agreement or agreements which may have been or may be

8. Power to justices to regulate the removal and the mode of conveyance for the purpose of interment, and the interment of the body of any person who has died of an infectious disease, or for the proper officer to carry out the same, and

for the recovery of the expenses thereof.

9. To prevent the use of public conveyances for the removal of the bodies of persons who may

have died from infectious disease.

10. To empower the Local Board to let for any period, and upon such terms as they may think proper, any portion of their present or future office or offices, building or buildings for parochial or other purposes.

11. To make provision for enabling the Local Board to cause the supply of water to be renewed to any house from which it may have been disconnected, the payment of rates and expenses of such renewal, and the recovery of the same in a

summary way.
