Chancery of the Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Downing Street, March 21, 1887.

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to issue a Statute of the Most Distingnished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, bearing date the 19th day of March, 1887, increasing the total number of the Ordinary Members thereof, and providing that the Additional Members of the Order appointed under the Special Statute of the 28th day of June, 1886, shall become Ordinary Members of the said Most Distinguished Order, with rank and place among the Ordinary Members of their respective classes, according to the dates of their respective appointments, and abrogating the said Special Statute of the 28th day of June, 1886.

the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs the following copy of a Decree from Her Majesty's Representative at Rome, respecting quarantine regulations in Italy :-

(Translation.)

1887.—Ordinance of Maritime Health, No. 3.
The Minister of the Interior,—

In view of the Law of 20th March, 1885, &c., and of the Ordinance No. 2, of the 8th instant;

Considering also the fact that certain small islands of the Sicilian Sea from their position, their special interests, and requirements are obliged to have direct and immediate communications with the mother island-

Decrees:

ART. 1. With the exception of the Eolian Islands, in which the quarantine treatment established by Ordinance No. 2, of the 8th instant, is continued in force, all the little islands coming within the territorial circumscription of Sicily

will be able from to-day to reopen free communications with the mother island, excepting in the case-according to the provisions of the abovementioned Ordinance—of ships leaving an infected port, when they will have to undergo quarantine at Augusta.

ART. 2. From the same date the above-mentioned islands, being thus placed in communica-tion with Sicily, will be subjected to quarantine with the mainland and with all the islands of the kingdom, in which the quarantine treatment against Sicily is enforced, and they will be treated accordingly.
