> T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 23rd day of *March*, 1887.

PRESENT:

Lord President. Lord John Manners.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Amendment of Article 87 of The Animals Order of 1886.

1. Regulation D (Animals not affected with Pleuro-Pneumonia or Foot-and-Mouth Disease or Swine-Fever) of Article 87 of The Animals Order of 1886 is hereby revoked, and the following provisions of this Article shall be read in the place of the said Regulation D, and shall be deemed to be Regulation D of Article 87 of that Order (namely):

(Regulation D.—Animals not affected with Pleuro-Pneumonia or Foot-and-Mouth Disease or Swine-Fever.)

(xvii.) Where an animal being in or on the market, fair, sale-yard, place of exhibition, lair, landing-place, wharf, railway station, land, water, common, uninclosed land, cow-shed, field, yard, sty, farm, park, or other place aforesaid, is seised as being affected with pleuro-pneumonia or footand-mouth disease or swine-fever, it shall be competent for a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority to seise and detain as suspected of

(a.) Any head of cattle that by reason of its having been in contact with or in the same herd with a head of cattle so seised as being affected with pleuro-pneumonia, or

(b.) Any animal that by reason of its having been in contact with or in the same herd with an animal so seised as being affected with foot-and-mouth disease, or

(c.) Any pig that by reason of its having been in contact with or in the same herd with a pig so seised as being affected with swinefever,

is, in his opinion, likely to spread pleuro-pneumonia or foot-and-mouth disease or swine-fever, and the suspected animal so seised and detained shall be dealt with as follows:

(xviia.) The suspected animal so seised may be slaughtered by or at the request of the owner or person in charge thereof at the place where it is seised : or

(xvii/.) The suspected animal so seised may be moved by or at the request of the owner or person in charge thereof, with a Licence of the Veterinary Inspector, to the nearest available slaughter-house, for the purpose of being there forthwith slaughtered; in which latter case the following provisions shall apply:

(xviic.) The Licence shall be available for twelve hours, and no longer.

(xviid.) The Licence shall specify the slaughterhouse to which the suspected animal is to be moved for slaughter, and it shall not be moved to any other slaughter-house or place.

(xviic.) The suspected animal so moved shall be moved to the specified slaughter-house, under the direction and in charge of an Inspector or other officer of the Local Authority; and he shall enforce and superintend the immediate slaughter there of the animal, and shall forthwith report to the Local Authority the fact of the slaughter there.

(xviif.) If the movement is to be into the District of another Local Authority, there must also be a Licence of that other Local Authority indorsed on or referring to the first-mentioned Licence; which second Licence must be granted before the animal is moved into the District of

that other Local Authority.

(xviig.) The suspected animal so moved into the District of that other Local Authority shall be moved to the specified slaughter-house under the direction and in charge of an Inspector or other officer of the Local Authority out of whose District it is moved; and he shall enforce and superintend the immediate slaughter there of the animal, and shall forthwith report to both the Local Authorities the fact of the slaughter

(xviih.) The suspected animal if not slaughtered as aforesaid, may be moved, in charge of an Inspector or other officer of the Local Authority, to some convenient and isolated place, and shall be there kept for such time as the Local Authority think expedient, subject, however, to its being there slaughtered at any time by or at the request of the owner or person in charge thereof.

Detention of Cattle that have been in Contact with Cattle Affected with Pleuro-Pneumonia.

-(1.) Any Local Authority may, if they think fit, on any evidence satisfactory to them that there is within their District any head of cattle which at any time within fifty-six days previous to the date of the Notice hereinafter-mentioned has been in contact with, or in the same herd with, any head of cattle affected with pleuro-pneumonia (such first-mentioned head of cattle being hereinafter referred to as such suspected animal), cause Notice to be served on the owner or person in a charge of such suspected animal, and also, if they think fit, a Notice on the occupier of any place in which such suspected animal then is, prohibiting the movement of such suspected animal during the period named in such Notice from the cow-shed, field, yard, park, or other like place in which such suspected animal then is, and thereupon it shall not be lawful for any person to move during such period such suspected animal in contravention of the terms of any such Notice, or any other head of cattle that may be in the same cow-shed, field, yard, park, or other like place with such suspected animal, without the permission of the Local Authority first obtained: Provided that the period named in such Notice shall not exceed fifty-six days from the date on which such suspected animal was in contact with, or in the same herd with, any head of cattle as aforesaid: Provided also that it shall not be competent for a Local Authority to cause any such Notice to be served during the time such suspected animal is in a market, fair, sale-yard, place of exhibition, landing-place, wharf, railway station, or other like place, or is being moved by land or by water.

(2.) With a view to the execution of the provisions of this Article a Local Authority may, from time to time, make such Regulations as they think fit for regulating the movement of cattle so detained under the provisions of this Article.

Regulations of Local Authority as to Movement of Cattle within their District on Account of **Pleuro-**Pneumonia.

3. Any Local Authority may, with the view of of preventing the spreading of pleuro-pneumonia, make, from time to time, such Regulations as

they think fit for prohibiting or regulating the movement by land or by water of cattle in the whole of their District or in any part or parts

Regulations of Local Authority as to Markets &c. on Account of Pleuro-Pneumonia.

-(1.) Notwithstanding anything in Chapter 16 (REGULATION BY LOCAL AUTHORITIES OF MAR-KETS, FAIRS, AND OTHER PLACES) of The Animals Order of 1886, any Local Authority may, with the view of preventing the introduction into their District, or the spreading in their District, of pleuro-pneumonia, make, from time to time, such Regulations as they think fit for prohibiting or regulating the exposing for sale of any cattle in or at any market, fair, auction, sale-yard, sale, or exhibition within their District.

(2.) No Regulation made by a Local Authority under this Article shall be deemed to apply

to the exposing for sale of-

(a.) Cattle in a Cattle-Plague Infected Place;

- (b.) Cattle in a Pleuro-Pneumonia Infected Place or Area; or
- (c.) Cattle in a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place or Area; or
- (d.) Cattle at any sale where such sale is held in accordance with the following conditions (namely):

(i.) That no head of cattle on the farm or premises is affected with pleuro-pneumonia:

(ii.) That each head of cattle exposed at the sale has been on the farm or premises not less than fifty-six clear days immediately before the day on which the sale is held, without having been moved therefrom:

(iii.) That no head of cattle exposed at the sale has been in contact with any cattle brought on to the farm or premises within those

fifty-six days.

Limitation on Regulations of Local Authority.

5.—(1.) The powers conferred on a Local Authority to make Regulations under this Order shall be exercised only by a Local Authority or their Executive Committee, and shall not be deputed to any other Committee nor to a Sub-Committee.

- (2.) No Regulation made by a Local Authority under this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of-
 - (a.) Cattle in or into or out of a Cattle-Plague Infected Place; or
 - (b.) Cattle in or into or out of a Pleuro-Pneumonia Infected Place or Area; or
 - (c.) Cattle in or into or out of a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place or Circle or Area; or
 - (d.) Cattle affected with pleuro-pneumonia:
- (e.) Cattle by Railway through the District of that Local Authority, without untrucking; which movement is regulated by the Acts of 1878 to 1886 and Orders of Council issued thereunder.

Slaughter of Suspected Cattle by Special Authority of Privy Council.

6.—(1). Where a Veterinary Inspector shall have certified to a Local Authority to the effect that a head of cattle is suspected by him to be affected with pleuro-pneumonia, that Local Authority, if authorized by the Privy Council to put in operation this Article, but not otherwise, may, if they think fit, cause that head of cattle to be slaughtered.
(2.) Where a head of cattle has been slaugh-

tered by order of a Local Authority under this

Article, the Local Authority shall in the case of each head of cattle so slaughtered, previous to the disposal of the carcase, cause a post-mortem examination to be made thereof, which examination shall be conducted by a Veterinary Inspector specially appointed in that behalf who shall forthwith report to the Local Authority, for the purposes of this Article, the result of such examination.

(3.) The Local Authority shall out of the local rate pay compensation as follows for cattle slaughtered under the authority of this Article:

(a.) Where the Veterinary Inspector so specially appointed as aforesaid reports to the Local Authority that the animal was affected with pleuro-pneumonia, the compensation shall be three-fourths of its value immediately before it became so affected, but so that the compensation do not in any such case exceed thirty pounds.

(b.) In every other case the compensation shall be the value of the animal immediately before it was slaughtered, but so that the compensation do not in any case exceed forty

pounds.

(4.) The provisions of Article 179 (Withholding of Compensation) Article 180 (Ascertainment of Value for Compensation) and of Article 181 (Record of Staughter) of The Animals Order of 1886 shall apply to the case of cattle slaughtered under the provisions of this Article.

General Provisions as to Regulations of Local Authority.

- 7.—(1.) Every Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Privy Council a copy of every Regulation made by them under the provisions of this Order.
- (2.) If the Privy Council are satisfied on inquiry with respect to any Notice served or Regulation made by a Local Authority under the provisions of this Order that the same is of too restrictive a character, or otherwise objectionable, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Production of Licences: Names and Addresses.

8.—(1.) Every person in charge of animals being moved, where, under any Regulation made by a Local Authority under the provisions of this Order, a Movement Licence may be necessary, shall, on demand of a justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Movement Licence, if any, authorizing the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Every person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

(3.) If a person in charge of animals being moved, where under any Regulation made by a Local Authority under the provisions of this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878

Offences.

9.—(1.) If an animal is moved in contravention of any Notice served under this Order, or of any Regulation made by a Local Authority under the provisions of this Order, or of the conditions of a Movement Licence thereunder, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing or permitting the movement, and the person

moving or conveying the animal, and the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which it is moved, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(2.) If an animal is exposed for sale in or at any market, fair, auction, sale-yard, sale, or exhibition in contravention of a Regulation made by a Local Authority under the provisions of this Order, or of the conditions of a Licence of a Local Authority thereunder, the person holding such market, fair, auction, sale, or exhibiton, and the occupier of the place where the same is held, and the owner or consignee of each animal so exposed, and the person so exposing the same, and the auctioneer, if any, or other person conducting a sale at such market, fair, auction, sale-yard, sale, or exhibition, and the person, if any, taking entrance-money or other payment for admission thereto, and the purchaser thereat of any anima so exposed in contravention of such Regulation or conditions of a Licence, such last-mentioned person or such purchaser knowing the animal to be exposed for sale in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(3.) If any person with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order allows an animal to stray he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

Extent.

10. This Order extends to England and Wales and Scotland.

Interpretation.

11. In this Order terms have the same meaning as in The Animals Order of 1886.

Short Title.

12. This Order may be cited as THE ANIMALS (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1887.

Commencement.

13. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the third day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

Ships having a doctor on board will be allowed to reckon the time the passage has lasted.

Arrivals from other Sicilian ports will be subjected to a medical visit.

Vessels to which the above quarantine restrictions refer have to be disinfected according to the regulations for arrivals from ports infected with cholera.

The measures to be taken against vessels not arriving in perfectly healthy condition will be decided from time to time by the Maritime Government to whom the facts of each single case are to be referred.
