PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the four hundred and tenth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may by Order in Council fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of every ship which passes the same or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions in, by, and subject to which the light dues authorized to be levied by the said Act are paid and collected:

And whereas the Commissioners of Irish Lights have erected a new lighthouse on Mew Island, off the coast of the County Down, and a light has been exhibited therefrom and a fog-signal established thereat:

And whereas the light from the lighthouse on Copeland Island off the coast of the County Down has been extinguished:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that from and after the date of this Order, or from and after the time of the receipt of a copy of this Order by the officers authorized to collect light dues, the tolls of three-sixteenths of a penny per ton oversea, and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton coasting now leviable in respect of the light on Copeland Island shall cease; and that in lieu thereof there shall be leviable in respect of the said light and fog-signal on Mew Island for every ship, whether British or foreign, the toll of three-eighths of a penny per ton of the burden of every such ship for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom if on an oversea voyage, and one-eighth of a penny per ton if on a coasting voyage:

The said tolls shall be levied, subject to the regulations and exemptions contained in the Consolidated Table of Light Duties sanctioned by Orders in Council, dated, respectively, the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in the Order in Council dated the twenty-first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and also in the special section of the Consolidated Tables prepared in pursuance of an Order in Council dated the sixth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, or to such other regulations and exemptions as may from time to time be duly sanctioned; and subject also to the gross abatement or discount of seventy per centum mentioned in an Order in Council dated the fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, or to such other abatement or discount as may for the time being be in force.

And whereas the Commissioners of Irish Lights are about to improve the light hitherto exhibited from the lighthouse on Tory Island off the coast of the County Donegal and that such improved light will shortly be exhibited and a fog signal established:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that, from and after the exhibition of the said improved light, or from and after the time of the receipt of notice of such exhibition by the officers authorized to collect light dues, there shall in lieu of the tolls hitherto levied in respect of the existing light be paid in respect of the said improved light and fog signal for every ship, whether British or foreign, the toll of three-eighths of a penny per ton of the burden of every such ship for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom if on an oversea voyage, and one-eighth of a penny per ton if on a coasting voyage.

The said tolls shall be levied subject to the regulations and exemptions contained in the Consolidated Table of Light Duties sanctioned by Orders in Council dated respectively the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in the Order in Council dated the twenty-first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and also in the special section of the Consolidated Tables prepared in pursuance of an Order in Council dated the sixth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, or to such other regulations and exemptions as may from time to time be duly sanctioned, and subject also to the gross abatement or discount of seventy per centum mentioned in an Order in Council dated the fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, or to such other abatement or discount as may for the time being be in force.
