In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

THE following Addresses were presented to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, who, as representing Her Majesty The Queen, opened the Manchester Royal Jubilee Exhibition on the 3rd instant, at Manchester:—

To His Royal Highness The PRINCE OF WALES, K.G., K.T., K.P., &c., &c.

*May it please Your Royal Highness,*

WE, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of Manchester in Council assembled, desire, in the name of the Corporation, and of the great community we represent, to offer to Your Royal Highness and to Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales the assurance of our loyal and cordial welcome. We gratefully appreciate Your kindness in honouring this city by a visit, and feel that we are especially favoured in being permitted to regard Your Royal Highness as representing, on this auspicious occasion, Her Majesty The Queen. For this manifestation of Her Majesty's gracious consideration we are profoundly grateful; and trust we may not be presumptuous in the hope that, in the course of the ensuing autumn, Her Majesty may find it convenient to honour us with Her presence, and to observe the numerous improvements which have been made since Her last visit—thirty years ago—in this the chief centre of the staple manufacture of the district.

As citizens of Manchester we are deeply interested in the success of the Exhibition which Your Royal Highness has kindly consented to inaugurate. It has been organized on a scale of unusual magnitude and completeness, and its expenses are guaranteed by the generosity of the community. We venture to believe that it will prove not unworthy to rank with other and numerous manifestations of The Queen's subjects everywhere, of their desire fitly to commemorate this year of Jubilee, and of their high appreciation of the countless benefits enjoyed by the nation during Her Majesty's prolonged, beneficent, and prosperous reign.

We hail with pleasure the presence, for the first time, of Your Royal Highness and of Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, in this our new Municipal Hall, in which are transacted the local affairs of nearly half a million of industrious and self-governing people.

We gratefully recognize the readiness with which Your Royal Highness responds to appeals for Your counsel and support in the promotion of every social, educational, and charitable institutions of public importance, thus worthily emulating the example of Your illustrious father.

In conclusion, we would respectfully offer to Your Royal Highness and to Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, our sincere and earnest hopes for the continued health and happiness of Your Royal Highnesses and of Your family.

"IT gives Me sincere pleasure to be permitted, in behalf of The Queen, my dear mother, to visit the city of Manchester for the purpose of opening the extensive and interesting Exhibition which the inhabitants of Manchester have organized with such admirable zeal and energy, particularly as it is associated with your congratulations on Her Majesty's attaining the Fiftieth Year of Her reign.

"In Her name, I thank you for your loyal and dutiful Address.

"It has been a source of much gratification to The Queen to receive assurances of unflinching attachment to Her Throne and Person from all parts of the Empire on the occasion.

"The Princess of Wales and I desire to express Our admiration of the noble building which you have provided for the conduct of your municipal affairs, and We think it worthy of the vast wealth and importance of the city of Manchester.

WE, the Executive Committee of the Royal Jubilee Exhibition, beg to present to Your Royal Highness and to Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales our humble duty and our most cordial thanks for the honour You have done to our City and to this County Palatine by Your presence amongst us on this day. We are deeply sensible of the aid which is given to our enterprise by this mark of Your sympathy and interest, and we rejoice at the opportunity which You have thus given to us and to the people of this city and county of once more welcoming Your Royal Highness in our midst, and of testifying to You and to the Princess, who has so kindly consented to accompany You, our feelings of personal attachment and loyalty.

We desire, at the same time, to convey through Your Royal Highness our respectful thanks to Her Majesty The Queen for graciously permitting the use of the Royal title, and for other tokens of Her Royal favour in connection with our undertaking.

Our hope in entering upon it was to celebrate, in a manner worthy of the occasion, the completion of the Fiftieth Year of Her Majesty's happy, glorious, and memorable reign. To the greatness and the power of the English people, the teeming industrial population of this district contributes no mean share, and it has been our endeavour to illustrate to the best of our ability its resources, and, at the same time, to present in this great Exhibition a full illustration of the progress of the Arts and Manufactures of the United Kingdom.

The vast engineering industry of this district is fully represented, and we believe that so extensive

a display of machinery has not hitherto been collected in one place. The hardly less important chemical industry, on which the prosperity of our manufactures so largely depends, is also illustrated in a complete and scientific manner. Special attention has been paid, alike in the exhibits and in the treatment of the buildings, to the illustration of industrial design. The silk culture and manufacture has a department specially assigned to it. The handicrafts have, not less than the great staple industries, their special representation; and a contrast has been sought to the familiar externals of our modern industrial architecture by a faithful reproduction of some picturesque features of Old Manchester and Salford.

The natural products, manufactures, and art work of Ireland are shown in a section set apart for them, under the direction of the Royal Dublin Society, and will, we trust, be found worthily to illustrate the resources and progress of the Sister Island.

Finally, in the department of the Fine Arts, we have been enabled, by the generous assistance and public spirit of the owners of works of art throughout the Kingdom, to bring together such a complete and representative display of the work of English artists, during the past half-century, as has not before been seen, and which, we trust, may appear a not unworthy sequel to the Art Treasures Exhibition of 1857.

It was on this spot, and almost on this day, thirty years ago, that Your Royal Highness's Father, whose memory we shall ever cherish, honoured us by his presence at the opening of what was then the first great Exhibition of the accumulated Art Treasures of this country. We cannot forget how much this country owes, in its artistic and industrial development to the wise initiative and generous encouragement given by him in this and other ways. It is to us a source of pride and pleasure to be able to welcome here to-day, in the person of Your Royal Highness, the natural and fitting representative of Prince Albert's high public spirit and instructed interest in all that touched the sources of moral and material greatness in the English people.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The limits of the following Place which was declared by order of the Local Authority acting in and for the county of Aberdeen, to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia (namely),—the byres on the farm of Tillymaud, in the parish of Udney, occupied by Mr. William Walker, farmer, —are hereby extended so as to include the Place described in the Schedule to this Order, and the Place described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fifth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 6th day of May, 1887.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area declared by Order of Council dated the twenty-fifth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia (namely),—in the county of Banff, comprised within the following boundary, that is to say, commencing at the Harbour of Port Gordon at the west, and continuing along the Port Gordon and Keith turnpike-road until it reaches the turnpike-road from Fochabers to Banff, thence eastward by that turnpike-road to Inchgower, thence northerly along the road from Inchgower to Buckie to the sea there, and also the farm of Cleanhill, occupied by John Munro, all in the parish of Rathven, —is, except such portion thereof as is included in the Area described in Article 2 of this Order, hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and the Area above described, except as aforesaid, shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. The following Area (namely),—in the county of Banff, comprised within the following boundary,

that is to say, commencing at the Harbour of Port Gordon at the west, and continuing along the Port Gordon and Keith turnpike-road until it reaches the turnpike-road from Fochabers to Banff, thence eastward by that turnpike-road to the point where the said road crosses the burn of Buckie, thence northerly along the course of the said burn till it reaches the sea, all in the parish of Bathven,—shall continue to be and is hereby declared to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

3. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the seventh day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

THE Queen taking into Her Royal consideration that upon the decease of Ernest Augustus Charles Brudenell-Bruce, on the eighteenth day of October last, the dignity of Marquess of Ailesbury devolved upon his grandson, George William Thomas, now Marquess of Ailesbury, as the only son and heir of the late George John Brudenell-Bruce, Esquire, who whilst living was the eldest son and heir apparent of his father, the said Ernest Augustus Charles, Marquess of Ailesbury, whereby, according to the ordinary rules of honour, the sister of the said George William Thomas, Marquess of Ailesbury, cannot enjoy that title, place, and precedence which would have been due to her had her father survived and succeeded to the title and dignity of the Marquess of Ailesbury, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to ordain and declare that Mabel Emily Louisa Brudenell-Bruce, Spinster, shall have, hold, and enjoy the same title, rank, place, pre-eminence, and precedence as if her late father, the said George John Brudenell-Bruce, had survived his father, Ernest Augustus Charles, late Marquess of Ailesbury, and thereby succeeded to the dignity of Marquess of Ailesbury:

And to command that the said Royal order and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

Board of Trade (Harbour Department),

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch, dated 29th ultimo, from Her Majesty's Representative at Copenhagen, relative to quarantine, of which the following is an extract:—

Under date of the 27th April, the Minister of Justice published the following Notice:—

On account of reported cholera in Chili, quarantine regulations are to be applied to all arrivals from and all ships which on their voyage have communicated with others coming from Chilian ports.

The importation from Chili of used linen, used wearing apparel, and bedding (except passenger's luggage), wadding, carding wool, paper refuse, hair, and hides is forbidden.

Quarantine is imposed on all arrivals from Anglo-Hungarian ports, and on all ships which have communicated with vessels bound from those ports.

Quarantine is further imposed against ports in Sicily and ports on the mainland of Italy between Cape Ste. Maria de St. Leuce and the French frontier.

Quarantine regulations and the prohibition of

the importation of the above-named used articles are maintained against Chili, Austro-Hungarian ports, Italian ports on the Adriatic, between Austrian frontier and Cape Ste. Maria de Leuce, Sardinian ports, all ports in Paraguay and Uruguay, Argentine Republic, Tunis, Egypt, Red Sea, Fez, Mequinez, and Dar el Beida, in Morocco, Rio de Janeiro, Havana, and all ports in Japan.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the forty-third and forty-fourth years of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, entitled "The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880," it was, by the third section, provided that any person who between the first day of March and the first day of August in any year after the passing of the said Act, should knowingly and wilfully shoot or attempt to shoot, or should use any boat for the purpose of shooting or causing to be shot, any wild bird, or should use any lime, trap, snare, or net, or other instrument for the purpose of taking any wild bird, or should expose or offer for sale, or should have in his control or possession, after the 15th day of March, any wild bird recently killed or taken, should be liable to the penalty therein mentioned; and whereas by section eight of the same Act, power was given to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as to Great Britain, upon application by the Justices of any county in Quarter Sessions assembled, by order to extend or vary the time during which the killing or taking of wild birds, or any of them, is prohibited by this Act. And whereas the Justices of the county of Anglesey, in Quarter Sessions assembled, at Beaumaris, did, on Wednesday, the 6th day of April, 1887, make application to the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, with a view to the better protection of wild sea birds frequenting the Menai Straits, numbers of which are wantonly slaughtered by tourists and others, to extend the close time so fixed by the said Act so that the same should begin on the first day of March in each year, and end on the first day of October, with respect to the following birds:—

*Seal Islands—Alteration in Fog Signal at Clifty Island Lighthouse.*

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 179, of 30th July 1886, on the intended establishment of fog signals at certain lighthouse stations on the south and east coasts of Australia:—

The Government of Victoria has given further notice, that on 14th February, 1887, and until further notice, the following alteration would be

made in the character of the fog signal at Cliffy Island Lighthouse:—

The signal is a gun, which, during thick or foggy weather, will be fired once every five minutes.

The explosive rockets hitherto used at this station are discontinued.
