

that is to say, commencing at the Harbour of Port Gordon at the west, and continuing along the Port Gordon and Keith turnpike-road until it reaches the turnpike-road from Fochabers to Banff, thence eastward by that turnpike-road to the point where the said road crosses the burn of Buckie, thence northerly along the course of the said burn till it reaches the sea, all in the parish of Bathven,—shall continue to be and is hereby declared to be an Area infected with pleuropneumonia.

3. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the seventh day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

THE Queen taking into Her Royal consideration that upon the decease of Ernest Augustus Charles Brudenell-Bruce, on the eighteenth day of October last, the dignity of Marquess of Ailesbury devolved upon his grandson, George William Thomas, now Marquess of Ailesbury, as the only son and heir of the late George John Brudenell-Bruce, Esquire, who whilst living was the eldest son and heir apparent of his father, the said Ernest Augustus Charles, Marquess of Ailesbury, whereby, according to the ordinary rules of honour, the sister of the said George William Thomas, Marquess of Ailesbury, cannot enjoy that title, place, and precedence which would have been due to her had her father survived and succeeded to the title and dignity of the Marquess of Ailesbury, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to ordain and declare that Mabel Emily Louisa Brudenell-Bruce, Spinster, shall have, hold, and enjoy the same title, rank, place, pre-eminence, and precedence as if her late father, the said George John Brudenell-Bruce, had survived his father, Ernest Augustus Charles, late Marquess of Ailesbury, and thereby succeeded to the dignity of Marquess of Ailesbury:

And to command that the said Royal order and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch, dated 29th ultimo, from Her Majesty's Representative at Copenhagen, relative to quarantine, of which the following is an extract:—

Under date of the 27th April, the Minister of Justice published the following Notice:—

On account of reported cholera in Chili, quarantine regulations are to be applied to all arrivals from and all ships which on their voyage have communicated with others coming from Chilian ports.

The importation from Chili of used linen, used wearing apparel, and bedding (except passenger's luggage), wadding, carding wool, paper refuse, hair, and hides is forbidden.

Quarantine is imposed on all arrivals from Anglo-Hungarian ports, and on all ships which have communicated with vessels bound from those ports.

Quarantine is further imposed against ports in Sicily and ports on the mainland of Italy between Cape Ste. Maria de St. Leuce and the French frontier.

Quarantine regulations and the prohibition of

the importation of the above-named used articles are maintained against Chili, Austro-Hungarian ports, Italian ports on the Adriatic, between Austrian frontier and Cape Ste. Maria de Leuce, Sardinian ports, all ports in Paraguay and Uruguay, Argentine Republic, Tunis, Egypt, Red Sea, Fez, Mequinez, and Dar el Beida, in Morocco, Rio de Janeiro, Havana, and all ports in Japan.
