**REGULATIONS**

**TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.**

*By Her Majesty's Command,*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

**PRESENTATIONS.**

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the

cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

To VICTORIA, QUEEN of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the Dominions thereunto belonging.

*May it please The Queen,*

It is with feelings of humble thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father, that we approach our beloved Sovereign with the tribute of our loyal and respectful congratulations on the completion of the Fiftieth Year of Her Reign.

For more than two centuries it has been our privilege to give to successive occupants of the Throne, the simple, but sincere assurances of our loyal attachment. But on no former occasion have we had greater cause for devout gratitude to Almighty God, than in commemorating the marvellous progress which the nation has been permitted to witness since the year when William Allen, the trusted friend of Thy honoured Father, appeared before Thee, as one of a deputation, with the message of our faithful love, on the occasion of Thy Accession, in 1837.

The abolition of the apprenticeship system in the West Indies, and the final extinction of slavery throughout the British Dominions, the extension of religious liberty, the amelioration of the criminal code, the removal of restrictions on trade and commerce, and of many of the inequalities arising from class legislation; the

measures which have been adopted to secure a general system of education, and the extension of the elective franchise; the increased encouragement given in so many influential quarters to the promotion of habits of temperance and self-restraint amongst the masses of the people. These are but a few amongst the many lessons given us by the half-century now drawing to its close, inviting to thankful recognition and continued persevering effort in the promotion of the great cause of righteousness and truth.

It is in a spirit, we trust, of Christian humility, which we believe will not be misunderstood, that we mingle these our congratulations with the expression of our unfeigned sorrow, that war should have so often disturbed a Reign otherwise so happy and illustrious. It is the King of Kings Himself who pronounces the words, "Love your enemies." We rejoice to know that our beloved Queen has, with her own hand, as a fitting motto for this Jubilee year, commended to her subjects the angelic message announcing His reign, "Peace on Earth, good will towards Men."

Alone, amongst the long line of English Monarchs, it has been Thy peculiar happiness to admit Thy people to a share in the intimacies of Thy domestic life. Permit us to assure Thee that in the review of this eventful period we have not forgotten Thy greatest sorrow. It is our joy to believe that it has pleased the Father of Mercies to grant in no small measure the consolations of His grace in the blessed experience that His chastening is to His children ever a discipline of perfect love.

In the heartfelt conviction that the religion of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ is the only foundation for the true happiness of man, and for the prosperity of nations, it is our fervent prayer that this may continue to be the stability of Thy throne, and to influence all the deliberations of Thy Government; and that when Thy service in this life shall have been accomplished, Thy earthly crown may, in His great mercy, be exchanged for the crown of righteousness "that fadeth not away."

To Her Royal Highness the PRINCESS LOUISE, MARCHIONESS OF LORNE.

*May it please Your Royal Highness,*

WE, the Executive Council appointed to arrange and prepare this Royal Jubilee Exhibition, desire to express our sincere and respectful thanks for the gracious favour of Your Royal Highness's presence on this occasion, for the purpose of performing, by Her Most Gracious Majesty's command, and on Her behalf, the inaugural ceremony of to-day.

That Your Royal Highness, accompanied by Your noble husband, should, in Her Majesty's name, preside over that ceremony, is a fitting and worthy sequence to the memorable occasion on which twelve months ago Her Majesty, by Her personal presence, bestowed upon this place so signal a manifestation of Her Royal favour.

It was considered that to reopen this magnificent series of Buildings, for the purpose of holding in them another Exhibition, during this memorable year of National Jubilee, would be most desirable for many reasons, especially as affording to the people of Liverpool and of this part of Her Majesty's Duchy of Lancaster a suitable place for the public celebrations befitting the occasion, which otherwise would have been wanting.

The Exhibition now to be opened, though in some respects to be regarded as a continuation of that held last year, has for its special object the adequate representation of the triumphs of War and the yet grander victories of Peace, which, under Her Majesty's illustrious guidance, have rendered the half century, whose close the whole Empire is about to commemorate, the most glorious in the annals of our country.

Although the story of those wondrous years will find fitting illustration in the trophies of valour, the products of science, and the masterpieces of art, collected within these walls, in none will the strength of the Empire be more fitly or more truly exemplified than in the exhibits gathered together from those far-reaching Colonies, with which Your Royal Highness, more than any other member of the family of Her Majesty, has with your noble husband been especially identified.

To Her Majesty we have to express our gratitude for Her continued consideration in many ways; for the distinction given to our undertaking by Her illustrious patronage, and by the permission to Your Royal Highness to represent Her on this occasion, and also for the most interesting relics of the military campaigns of Her reign which she has been graciously pleased to contribute.

It is then with feelings of the deepest reverence for Her Majesty, of devoted loyalty to Her Empire, and of profound respect for Your Royal Highness, that we offer to yourself and to the Most Noble the Marquis of Lorne a sincere and heartfelt welcome here to-day, and we would ask that it may now please Your Royal Highness to declare, in Her Majesty's name, that this Exhibition is henceforth open to the public.

"Her Majesty has desired me to say that She will never forget the cordial welcome which She received when She visited your city last year, and when the whole population of Liverpool and of the Duchy of Lancaster was so largely represented to meet Her.

"Her Majesty has watched with interest and admiration their conduct in times of distress, and has rejoiced at the ever-growing prosperity of this part of Her dominions,—a prosperity due to the energy of the Lancashire men and women.

**W**HEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such foreign State, and so long as such Law continues in force there and no longer:

And whereas, in accordance with section 18 of "The Extradition Act, 1870," the Legislature of the Dominion of Canada has, by laws passed in the years 1877 and 1882, and respectively styled "The Extradition Act, 1877," and "An Act to Amend the Extradition Act, 1877," made provision for carrying into effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in, or are suspected of being in, the Dominion:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the twentieth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, between Her Majesty and the King of the Belgians, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, in the case of which Treaty the above-mentioned Acts of Parliament were applied by an Order in Council of the twenty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six:

And whereas a Declaration was concluded on the twenty-third day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, between the Government of Her Majesty and the Government of His Majesty the King of the Belgians, extending the provisions of the above-mentioned Treaty to certain additional crimes in the case of which Declaration the above-mentioned Acts of Parliament were

applied by an Order in Council of the thirteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven :

And whereas a Declaration was concluded on the twenty-first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, between the Government of Her Majesty and the Government of His Majesty the King of the Belgians, for amending Article I of the above-mentioned Treaty, which Declaration is in the terms following :—

“ THE Government of Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and the Government of His Majesty the King of the Belgians, being desirous to provide for the more effectual repression of crimes and offences in their respective territories, have agreed as follows :—

“ ARTICLE I.

The words “ except as regards Great Britain, native-born or naturalized subjects of Her Britannic Majesty, and except as regards Belgium, those who are by birth, or who may have become, citizens of Belgium,” which occur in Article I of the Extradition Treaty of the 20th May, 1876, are suppressed.

ARTICLE II.

The following paragraph is added to Article I of the said Treaty :—

“ In no case, nor on any consideration whatever, shall the High Contracting Parties be bound to surrender their own subjects, whether by birth or naturalization.”

ARTICLE III.

The present Declaration shall come into force ten days after its publication in the manner prescribed by law in the respective countries.

In witness whereof the undersigned have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with



“great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes,” it is, amongst other things, enacted, “That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes: and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested: and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect.

And whereas William, Lord Archbishop of York, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, made a report dated the second day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven to Her Majesty in Council in the words following, that is to say:—

“To the QUEEN’S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

“The undersigned William, Lord Archbishop of York Primate of England and Metropolitan in pursuance of an Act made and passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of Your Majesty’s reign intituled “An Act to abridge the holding of Benefices in Plurality and to make better Provision for the residence of the Clergy” doth hereby report to Your Majesty in Council.

“That there are in the county and diocese of York the ecclesiastical parishes of Thorne, Hatfield, Sykehouse and Fishlake.

“That certain portions of the said ecclesiastical parishes of Hatfield, Sykehouse and Fishlake consist of isolated pieces of land situated within the boundaries of the said ecclesiastical parish of Thorne or immediately adjacent thereto.

“That the population of the said parish of Thorne according to the last census is three thousand four hundred and eighty-four and that

of the said isolated portions of the parishes of Hatfield Fishlake and Sykehouse is seventy or thereabouts.

“That according to the same census the population of the said parish of Hatfield was one thousand seven hundred and eighty-eight that of the said parish of Fishlake was five hundred and ninety-six and that of the said parish of Sykehouse four hundred and twenty-six.

“That the said parish of Thorne is more particularly delineated and described in the map or plan annexed hereto and is thereon coloured round with a green verge line.

“That the said isolated portions of the parishes of Hatfield Sykehouse and Fishlake are particularly described in the schedules to the scheme hereafter written and are also delineated in the map annexed hereto and are thereon coloured pink the said isolated portions of the parish of Hatfield being also coloured round with a red verge line, the said isolated portions of the parish of Sykehouse being coloured round with a blue verge line and the said isolated portions of the said parish of Fishlake being coloured round with a yellow verge line.

“That the net yearly value of the benefice of Thorne is one hundred and seventy pounds that of the benefice of Hatfield is one hundred and sixty-nine pounds that of the benefice of Fishlake is two hundred and forty pounds and that of the benefice of Sykehouse is three hundred pounds.

“That the Reverend Joseph Johnson Littlewood is Vicar of the vicarage of Thorne, the Reverend George Philip Haydon is the Vicar of Hatfield the Reverend John White McKinlay Milman is the Vicar of Sykehouse and the Venerable Hopkins Badnall is the Vicar of Fishlake.

“That Henry Robert Beauclerk Coventry an infant is the patron of the said vicarages of Hatfield and Thorne and the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Durham are the patrons of the said vicarages of Sykehouse and Fishlake.

“That the said incumbents and patrons are consenting parties to the separation and annexation hereinafter proposed.

“That it appears to the said Archbishop that certain portions of the said parishes of Hatfield Sykehouse and Fishlake more particularly described in the scheme and on the plan hereto annexed may be advantageously separated from those parishes to which these now respectively belong and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Thorne.

“That pursuant to the directions contained in the before-mentioned Act the said Archbishop has prepared a scheme in writing appended to this report describing the mode in which it appears to him that the separation and union may be best effected and how the alterations and changes consequent upon such separation and union may be best carried out with justice to all parties interested.

“And the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with such scheme he doth by this report to Your Majesty in Council certify the same to Your Majesty in Council together with the consents in writing of the patrons and incumbents of the benefices to be affected to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case it should be thought expedient and proper so to do make an Order for carrying the same into effect.

“As witness the hand of the said Archbishop the second day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven. “W. Ebor.”

And whereas the scheme, together with the

schedules thereunto annexed, and the consents referred to in the report of the said Archbishop, are in the words and figures following :—

“ The SCHEME referred to.

“ That those portions of the parish of Hatfield in the county and diocese of York described in the first schedule hereto and particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed and thereon coloured round with a red verge line, those portions of the parish of Sykehouse in the same county and diocese described in the second schedule hereto and particularly delineated on the said map and thereon coloured round with a blue verge line and those portions of the parish of Fishlake in the same county and diocese described in the third schedule hereto and particularly delineated on the said plan and thereon coloured round with a yellow verge line shall be severed from the parishes to which these portions at present respectively belong and shall be united to the parish of Thorne in the same county and diocese for ecclesiastical purposes.

“ That all fees and payments arising from baptisms churchings marriages and all other ecclesiastical offices solemnized in respect of such portions of the parishes of Hatfield Sykehouse and Fishlake as shall be included within and added to the said parish of Thorne and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a parish in respect of the said portions of the parishes of Hatfield Sykehouse and Fishlake shall henceforth belong to and be receivable by the incumbent of Thorne.

“ That no alteration shall be made as to the patronage or endowment of any of the said benefices affected by this scheme.

“ That the inhabitants of the said portions of the parishes of Hatfield Sykehouse and Fishlake added to the parish of Thorne shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Thorne but shall not be entitled to accommodation in the churches of the parishes to which such portions now respectively belong.

“ The FIRST SCHEDULE hereinbefore referred to.

“ 1. All those three detached portions of the parish of Hatfield situated within the boundaries of the parish of Thorne to the south of the Stainforth and Keadby Canal and adjoining on the Burgar Common which said detached portions are numbered respectively 39, 40, and 41 on the annexed plan.

“ 2. All that detached portion of the said parish of Hatfield situated within the boundaries of the said parish of Thorne to the south-west of the said Stainforth and Keadby Canal near to Thorne Bridge which said detached portion is numbered 37 on the annexed plan.

“ 3. All that detached portion of the parish of Hatfield situated within the boundaries of the said parish of Thorne bounded on the north by the Thorne and Crowle-road and on the east by the Whitegate-road and numbered 36 on the annexed plan.

“ 4. All those two detached portions of the parish of Hatfield situated within the boundaries of the said parish of Thorne bounded by the said Thorne and Crowle-road on the north and the said Whitegate-road on the west and numbered respectively 33 and 34 on the annexed plan.

“ 5. All those four detached portions of the parish of Hatfield situated within the boundaries of the parish of Thorne and bounded on the west by the Green-lane or Middle-road and numbered 29, 30, 31 and 32 on the annexed plan.

“ 6. All those two detached portions of the parish of Hatfield situated within the boundaries of the said parish of Thorne bounded on the west by the Thorne and Marshland-road and on the east by the Moor Drain and numbered 26 and 27 on the annexed plan.

“ 7. All those three detached portions of the parish of Hatfield situated within the boundaries of the said parish of Thorne bounded on the south by a road leading from the said Thorne and Marshland-road to the Bawtry and Selby-road and known as Moor Ends-road, and numbered 23, 24 and 25 on the annexed plan.

“ 8. All that detached portion of the parish of Hatfield immediately adjoining the said parish of Thorne and bounded on or towards the north and west by that parish and on or towards the south and east by the detached portion of the parish of Sykehouse in the second schedule to this scheme fourthly described.

“ 9. All that detached portion of the parish of Hatfield immediately adjoining the said parish of Thorne at the south-west corner of the said parish called Dirtness Levels bounded on the north by lands called Lovers Grounds on the south and east by the county of Lincoln and on the west by the parish of Thorne aforesaid.

“ All which said detached portions of the parish of Hatfield are particularly delineated on the said plan hereto annexed and thereon coloured round with a red verge line.

“ The SECOND SCHEDULE before referred to.

“ 1. All that detached portion of the parish of Sykehouse situated within the boundaries of the parish of Thorne bounded on the west by the Green-lane or Middle-road and on the south and east by the detached portion of the parish of Hatfield particularly described in the first schedule and numbered 29 on the annexed plan which said detached portion of the parish of Sykehouse is numbered 15 on the same plan.

“ 2. All that detached portion of the parish of Sykehouse situated within the boundaries of the parish of Thorne bounded on the west by the Thorne and Marshlands-road and on the south by Broad Bent Gate-road and numbered 14 on the said plan.

“ 3. All that detached portion of the parish of Sykehouse immediately adjoining the said parish of Thorne and bounded on the north and east by a detached portion of the parish of Fishlake particularly described in the third schedule to this scheme and on or towards the south and west by the said parish of Thorne and numbered 12 on the annexed plan.

“ 4. WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid.

"by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas William, Lord Archbishop of York, hath in pursuance of the provisions of the aforesaid Act made a report dated the second day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, to Her Majesty in Council in the words following, that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"The undersigned William Lord Archbishop of York Primate of England and Metropolitan in pursuance of an Act made and passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign intituled 'An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality and to make better provision for the residence of the Clergy' doth hereby report to Your Majesty:

"That there are in the county and diocese of York the ecclesiastical parishes of Hatfield, Fishlake, Sykehouse and Thorne.

"That certain portions of the said parishes of Fishlake, Sykehouse and Thorne consist of isolated pieces of land situated within the boundaries of the parish of Hatfield.

"That the population of the said parish of Hatfield according to the last census is one thousand seven hundred and eighty-eight and that of the said isolated portions of the parishes of Fishlake, Sykehouse and Thorne is altogether forty-two or thereabouts.

"That according to the same census the population of the parish of Fishlake was five hundred and ninety-six that of the parish of Sykehouse four hundred and twenty-six and that of the parish of Thorne three thousand four hundred and eighty-four.

"That the said parish of Hatfield is particularly delineated and described in the map or plan annexed hereto and thereon coloured round with a pink verge line.

"That the said isolated portions of the parishes of Fishlake, Sykehouse and Thorne are particularly described in the schedules to the scheme hereafter written and are delineated in the map annexed hereto and thereon are coloured respectively blue yellow and brown.

"That the net yearly value of the benefice of Hatfield is one hundred and sixty-nine pounds, that of the benefice of Fishlake, two hundred and forty pounds, that of the benefice of Sykehouse three hundred pounds and that of the benefice of Thorne one hundred and seventy pounds.

"That the Reverend George Philip Haydon is vicar of the vicarage of Hatfield, the Venerable Hopkins Badnall is vicar of Fishlake, the Reverend John White McKinlay Milman is vicar of Sykehouse and the Reverend Joseph Johnson Littlewood is vicar of Thorne.

"That Henry Robert Beauclerk Coventry infant son of the late Henry Amelius Beauclerk Coventry is the patron of the said vicarages of Hatfield and Thorne and the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Durham are the patrons of the said vicarages of Fishlake and Sykehouse.

"That the said incumbents and patrons of the said benefices of Hatfield, Fishlake, Sykehouse and Thorne are consenting parties to the separation and annexation hereinafter proposed.

"That it appears to the said Archbishop that certain portions of the said parishes of Fishlake, Sykehouse and Thorne more particularly described in the scheme and plan hereto annexed may be

advantageously severed from those parishes and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the parish of Hatfield.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the before-mentioned Act the said Archbishop has prepared a scheme in writing appended to this report describing the mode in which it appears to him that the separations and union may be best effected and how the alterations and changes consequent upon such separations and union may be best carried out with justice to all parties interested and the said Archbishop being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with such scheme he doth by this report to Your Majesty in Council certify the same to Your Majesty in Council together with the consents in writing of the patrons and incumbents of the benefices to be affected to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case it should be thought expedient and proper so to do make an Order for carrying the same into effect.

"That all fees and payments arising from baptisms churchings marriages and all other ecclesiastical offices solemnized in respect of such portions of the said parishes of Fishlake Sykehouse and Thorne as shall be included within and added to the said parish of Hatfield and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings or emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a parish in respect of the said portions of the parishes of Fishlake Sykehouse and Thorne shall henceforth belong to and be received by the incumbent of Hatfield.

"That no alteration shall be made as to the patronage or endowment of any of the said benefices.

"That the inhabitants of the said portions of the parishes of Fishlake Sykehouse and Thorne added to the parish of Hatfield shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Hatfield.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme

"in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and enquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne; and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That when by any Order of Her Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth have within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts, for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the control or interference of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid; but if such incumbent or incumbents shall not have so consented thereto, this last-mentioned provision shall not come into operation until the next avoidance of the benefice by the incumbent objecting thereto, or by the surviving incumbent objecting, if more than one shall object thereto; and in such case the last-mentioned provision shall forthwith after such avoidance, come into operation, and shall be binding on all persons whatsoever."

And whereas John Fielder, Lord Bishop of Oxford, hath represented in a writing dated the sixteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, to the Right Honourable Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend John Fielder Bishop of Oxford, do hereby represent to your Grace that by an order of Her Majesty in Council bearing date the second day of September one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, approving of a

scheme of the Right Reverend Samuel then Lord Bishop of Oxford, the townships or chapelries of Stoke Mandeville and Buckland were separated from the parish of Bierton in the county of Buckingham and diocese of Oxford and united and constituted a separate benefice and a perpetual curacy and the respective chapels in the said townships or chapelries were within the limits of the respective chapelries, constituted the parish church to all intents and purposes as if the said two townships or chapelries were two separate parishes or benefices then about to be created.

"That according to the last census the population of Stoke Mandeville is four hundred and ninety-seven and the population of Buckland is eight hundred and sixty-three.

"That the net yearly value of the said benefice of Stoke Mandeville and Buckland is one hundred and seventy-two pounds or thereabouts, of which one hundred and twelve pounds or thereabouts arises or is payable in respect of tithes or compositions for tithes within Stoke Mandeville and sixty pounds or thereabouts arises or is payable in respect of stipends payable out of tithe rent charge within Buckland.

"That there is a house of residence at Stoke Mandeville sufficient for the residence of the incumbent. There is no glebe house of residence at Buckland.

"That there is at Stoke Mandeville a church capable of affording accommodation for one hundred and eighty-two persons. There is at Buckland a church distant five miles or thereabouts from the church of Stoke Mandeville and capable of affording accommodation for one hundred and ninety-three persons. There is also at Buckland Common a chapel distant eight and a half miles or thereabouts from the church of Stoke Mandeville and capable of affording accommodation for ninety-two persons.

"That Stoke Mandeville and Buckland are separate and distinct parishes for all civil purposes. They do not adjoin at any point.

"That it appears to me that the said township chapelry or parish of Buckland may under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of Her present Majesty chapter one, hundred and six and the second and third years of Her said Majesty chapter forty-nine be advantageously separated from the benefice of Stoke Mandeville and Buckland and constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have promised in the event of the said township chapelry or parish of Buckland being separated from the said benefice of Stoke Mandeville and Buckland and constituted a separate benefice and also in the event of the two benefices being held by separate incumbents to augment the income of Stoke Mandeville to two hundred and fifty pounds per annum and to augment the income of the proposed separate benefice of Buckland after the twenty-ninth day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven when the term for which a certain lease of the rectorial estate of Buckland was granted will have expired.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the first-mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent-charges and other ecclesiastical rates and payments and in

respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested.

"And I do submit the same to your Grace together with the consent in writing of the Very Reverend William John Butler D.D. Dean of the Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Lincoln and the Chapter of the same church, the patrons of the said benefice of Stoke Mandeville and Buckland (the Reverend Meyer Menser Clerk D.D. the vicar or perpetual curate of the vicarage or perpetual curacy of Stoke Mandeville and Buckland aforesaid not consenting to the said scheme). To the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme, certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under my hand this sixteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven. "J. F. Oxon."

And whereas the scheme and consent referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"The SCHEME referred to in the foregoing Representation.

"That the said township chapelry or parish of Buckland shall be separated from the township chapelry or parish of Stoke Mandeville and constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice by the style of the perpetual curacy of Buckland of which the church of Buckland shall be the parish church.

"That the said proposed separate parish and benefice shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said benefice of Stoke Mandeville with Buckland.

That all the annual stipends or other endowments belonging to the said benefice of Stoke Mandeville and Buckland that arise or are payable for or in respect of the said township chapelry or parish of Buckland shall be transferred to the said proposed separate parish and benefice of Buckland and belong to and form part of the endowments thereof.

"That baptisms churchings marriages and burials shall as heretofore be performed in the church of the said proposed separate parish and benefice and that the fees for all such offices or any of them and all ecclesiastical dues offerings and other emoluments arising from or in respect of the said benefice and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the Incumbent of the said proposed separate parish and benefice of Buckland.

"That the Incumbent of the said proposed separate parish and benefice shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits thereof.

"That the right of nominating an incumbent to the said proposed separate parish and benefice shall for ever be vested in the said dean and chapter of Lincoln and their successors.

"That the apportioned first fruits and tenths now charged upon the said benefice of Stoke Mandeville with Buckland shall be charged upon and payable by the incumbent of the benefice of Stoke Mandeville alone in exoneration of the said proposed separate parish and benefice.

"That the inhabitants of the said township chapelry or parish of Stoke Mandeville shall not henceforth be entitled to accommodation in the church of the said proposed separate parish and benefice of Buckland nor shall the inhabitants of the said township chapelry or parish of Buckland be entitled to accommodation in the church of the said township chapelry or parish of Stoke Mandeville except nevertheless any person possessing a



legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pew or sitting in either of the said churches and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same. "J. F. Oxon."

"The CONSENT above referred to.

"To the Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"We William John Butler D.D. Dean of the Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Lincoln and the Chapter of the same church, the patrons or persons entitled to present to the benefice of Stoke Mandeville and Buckland in the county of Buckingham and diocese of Oxford, if the same were now vacant, by this writing under our common seal, do signify to your Grace our consent to the scheme hereinbefore proposed and to everything therein contained.

"Dated this twentieth day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven."



And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration; and whereas the said Archbishop being satisfied with the said scheme hath certified the same, and the consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, by his report dated the thirtieth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, which said report is in the words and figures following:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend John Fielder Lord Bishop of Oxford has represented unto us amongst other things:—

"That by an order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the second day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight approving of a scheme of the Right Reverend Samuel then Lord Bishop of Oxford the townships or chapelries of Stoke Mandeville and Buckland were separated from the parish of Bierton in the county of Buckingham and diocese of Oxford and united and constituted a separate benefice and a perpetual curacy and the respective chapels in the said townships or chapelries were within the limits of the respective chapelries constituted the parish church to all intents and purposes as if the said two townships or chapelries were two separate parishes or benefices then about to be created.

"That Stoke Mandeville and Buckland are separate and district parishes for all civil purposes. They do not adjoin at any point.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said township chapelry or parish of Buckland may under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and six and the second and third years of your Majesty chapter forty-nine be advantageously separated from the benefice of Stoke Mandeville and Buckland and constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent-charges dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage

and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consent thereto in writing of the patrons of the benefice of Stoke Mandeville with Buckland has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consent before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter one hundred and six certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"As witness our hand this thirtieth day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven. "Edw. Cantuar."

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said scheme be carried into effect.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Michael and All Angels situate at Beckwithshaw in the parish of Pannal in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Pannal, of the new parish of Low Harrogate in the county and diocese aforesaid and of the extra-parochial place or territory called or known as Haverah Park also in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and new parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Pannal and of the said new parish of Low

Harrogate together with the contiguous extra-parochial place or territory called or known as Haverah Park as aforesaid should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Michael and All Angels situate at Beckwithshaw as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Boyd, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon, as such Bishop, and with the consents of the Reverend Alfred Peache, of the Firs, Hampstead, in the county of Middlesex, Clerk in Holy Orders, of the Reverend William Wynter Gibbon, of Harrogate in the said county of York, Clerk in Holy Orders, of Robert Baxter of Victoria-street, in the city of Westminster, Esquire, of William Irving Hare of Number 118 Pall Mall in the said county of Middlesex Esquire, and of the Reverend William Hagger Barlow, of Oakfield Clapham Park, in the county of Surrey, Clerk in Holy Orders, the patron, both of the vicarage of the said parish of Pannal, and of the vicarage of the said new parish of Low Harrogate (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Pannal, and of the said new parish of Low Harrogate together with the contiguous extra-parochial place or territory called or known as Haverah Park as aforesaid which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Michael and All Angels situate at Beckwithshaw as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels, Beckwithshaw.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels Beckwithshaw, comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the parish of Pannal in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon wherein the present incumbent of such parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded upon the south partly by the parish of Kirkby Overblow and partly by the new parish of Stainburn both in the county and diocese aforesaid, upon the north-west by the parish of Fewston upon the north by the hereinafter mentioned extra-parochial territory called or known as Haverah Park, and at the northernmost extremity by the new parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle Killinghall all in the said county and diocese and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the east partly by the hereinafter described portion of the new parish of Low Harrogate in the county and diocese aforesaid and partly by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Low Harrogate from the parish of Pannal aforesaid at the point where How Hill-road is joined by How Hill Quarry-road and extending thence first south-westward then south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty-seven and a half chains or thereabouts (thereby

passing Low House) to the point where the same road is crossed by the stream called or known as Bull Dike and continuing thence still generally south-eastward along the middle of the said Bull Dike for a distance of twenty-seven chains or thereabouts to its junction with the stream called or known as Crimple Beck that is to the boundary upon the southern bank of Crimple Beck which divides the said parish of Pannal from the parish of Kirkby Overblow aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Low Harrogate which is bounded upon the north by the said new parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle Killinghall upon the west and upon the south by the parish of Pannal aforesaid, and upon all other sides that is to say upon the east and upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Pannal from the new parish of Low Harrogate aforesaid at the point at Beckwith Head where the said How Hill-road, Lady-lane and Beckwith Head-road all meet, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Dudley Hill Killinghall and Harrogate High-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of six and a half chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries the same road over Harlow Car Beck which flows from Harlow Hill Slack past the south-western side of Crag House into Oak Beck and extending thence first north-westward and then northward along the middle of the said Harlow Car Beck for a distance of fifty-seven and a half chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the junction of the same beck with Oak Beck aforesaid which boundary divides the said new parish of Low Harrogate from the new parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle Killinghall aforesaid, and

"III. All that the said extra-parochial territory called or known as Haverah Park as aforesaid which is contiguous to and is bounded upon the south-east and upon the south by the firstly hereinbefore described portion of the parish of Pannal aforesaid and which said extra-parochial territory is bounded upon all other sides as follows upon the south-west and upon part of the north by the parish of Fewston aforesaid upon the remaining part of the north by the parish of Hampsthwaite in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the north-east by the new parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle Killinghall aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon. *C. “We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-seven of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist situate at Devonport within the limits of the parish of Stoke Damerel in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter.

“Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Stoke Damerel and of the consolidated chapelry of Saint Aubyn Devonport in the county and diocese aforesaid which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and such consolidated chapelry respectively.

“And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Stoke Damerel and of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Aubyn Devonport should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Baptist situate at Devonport.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Henry Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter as such Bishop, and with the consent of Sir John St. Aubyn of Saint Michael's Mount in the county of Cornwall Baronet the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Stoke Damerel, and with the consent of the Reverend William St. Aubyn Clerk in Holy Orders the rector or incumbent of the said rectory and as such the patron of the perpetual curacy of the consolidated chapelry of Saint Aubyn Devonport aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Stoke Damerel and of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Aubyn Devonport which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John the Baptist situate at Devonport as aforesaid and that the same should be named ‘The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Baptist Devonport.’

“We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Baptist Devonport being:—

“All that portion of the parish of Stoke Damerel in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded upon the north by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Aubyn Devonport upon the west and part of the south by the new parish of Saint Mary Devonport upon the remaining part of the south and upon part of the east by the new parish of Saint Stephen Devonport (the said consolidated chapelry and also both the said new parishes being within the original limits of the parish of Stoke Damerel aforesaid) and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the remaining part of the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Stephen Devonport from the parish of Stoke Damerel aforesaid at the point where the street or road called the Back of George-street joins Barrack-lane and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Stoke Damerel from the consolidated chapelry of Saint Aubyn Devonport aforesaid at the point where the same lane joins Barrack-street.

"All that portion of the district parish of Saint John the Baptist Toxteth Park in the county and diocese aforesaid wherein the present incumbent

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Catharine situate at Southbourne-on-Sea in the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Pokesdown within the original limits of the parish of Christchurch in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Catharine situate at Southbourne-on-Sea as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Harold, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Pokesdown which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Catharine situate at Southbourne-on-Sea as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Catharine Southbourne-on-Sea.'

"And with the like consent of the said Edward Harold Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified as aforesaid) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Catharine situate at Southbourne-on-Sea as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that so long as the Reverend Thomas William

Wilkinson, Clerk in Holy Orders the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said new parish of Pokesdown shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization or performance at the said church of Saint Catharine situate at Southbourne-on-Sea as aforesaid shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Thomas William Wilkinson: And provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Catharine Southbourne-on-Sea, being:—

"All that part of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Pokesdown within the original limits of the parish of Christchurch in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester which is bounded generally on the north-east by the said parish of Christchurch or in other words partly by the River Stour and partly by Christchurch Harbour on the south by the English Channel and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the north-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the southern boundary of the said new parish that is to say upon the seashore at a point opposite to the middle of the southern end of Fishermans-road, upon the Cliff, and extending thence northward and in a straight line to the middle of the southern end of the said road and extending thence in a direction first northward and then north-eastward along the middle of the same road for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bellevue-road, and extending thence eastward across the last-named road to the western end of the fence which extends in a straight line along the rear of the houses and building plots upon the northern side of Bellevue-road aforesaid and along the rear of the mews and premises at the back of the South Cliff Hotel, and continuing thence still eastward along the said fence for a distance of twenty-seven chains or thereabouts to its eastern extremity on the western side of the road or lane which leads from Westover-road in a north-westerly direction and connects it with the road leading from Pokesdown to Tuckton sometimes called or known as Stourcliff-road, and extending thence first eastward to a point in the middle of the said connecting road or lane and then north-westward along the middle of the same road or lane for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road sometimes called Stourcliff-road as aforesaid and extending thence in a direction generally north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty-two chains or thereabouts to the point at Tuckton where the same road is joined by the road leading to Iford and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to the point at or near to Tuckton Farm, where the same road bends towards the north-west and strikes the southern bank of the River Stour aforesaid and extending thence due northward and in a straight line for a distance of two chains



or thereabouts to the boundary in the middle of the same river which boundary divides the said new parish of Pokesdown from the parish of Christchurch aforesaid.

"Save and except from the above-described part of the new parish of Pokesdown aforesaid all that portion (containing within its limits the hamlet of Wick) which is bounded on the north and upon the north-east by the parish of Christchurch aforesaid, or in other words by the said River Stour and by Christchurch Harbour aforesaid and upon all other sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the south-west and upon the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Pokesdown from the said parish of Christchurch as aforesaid at a point in Christchurch Harbour opposite the antient earthwork known as the Double Dikes and due north of the Warren Farm House and of the point where the footpath which leads from the said farm house towards Wick is joined by the footpath which leads along the western side of the said Double Dikes towards Southbourne-on-Sea and extending thence that is from the said point in Christchurch Harbour aforesaid due southward and in a straight line for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts partly across the said Christchurch Harbour and partly across the marsh land known as Wick Hams, to the said point on the northern side of the Warren Farm House where the footpaths join as aforesaid, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the first-described footpath for a distance of fifty-five chains or thereabouts to the point where it joins the cross road or lane which leads from Wick into the road leading from Warren Farm to Tuckton and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said cross road or lane for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading from Warren Farm to Tuckton as aforesaid and extending thence first north-westward and then northward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of thirty-eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road which leads from Wick to Tuckton on the southern bank of a certain creek or backwater of the River Stour aforesaid and extending thence first northward to the mid-channel of the said creek or backwater and then westward and then again northward along the same mid-channel for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to the boundary in the middle of the River Stour aforesaid which divides the said new parish of Pokesdown from the parish of Christchurch as aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.
