BALTIC ENTRANCE—THE SOUND.—COPENHAGEN APPROACH.

Trekroner Battery—Alteration in Character of Fog Signal.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 267 of 3rd November, 1886, on intended alteration in character of the fog signal at the north-east angle of Trekroner Battery, approach to Copenhagen from the northward:—

The Danish Government has given further notice, dated 11th May, 1887, that the alteration has been effected.

The signal is a powerful siren, worked by machinery, which, during thick or foggy weather, will give one blast every minute, beginning with a high note, and ending with a low note, each note being of three seconds' duration.

The fog horn hitherto in use, has been discontinued.
