From the General Officer Commanding in Egypt to the Secretary of State for War.

Sir., Cairo, May 24, 1887.
WITH reference to my telegrams of 29th and 30th April, I have now the honour to forward the report from the Officer Commanding the Frontier Field Force of the events therein alluded to. I have, &c.,

From the Officer Commanding Field Force to the Sirdar, Egyptian Army.

Sire,

Halfa, May 1, 1887.

I HAD the honour to report, by telegram, a night march and attack on a small force of dervishes at Sarras (34½ miles) by a column from the Halfa garrison. In accordance with military usage, I beg to add the following illustration of the services of the Officers, to whose exertions the successful issue of the operations is so largely due.

A column composed as follows:-

Advanced Guard under— El Kaimakam Rundle Bey, Brevet-Major, R.A., Commanding Mounted Corps F.F., and A.A.G., F.F.

2nd Cavalry Squadron, Commander Bimbashi Sillem, 100.

2nd Camel Corps, Commander Bimbashi Dunning, 40.

Irregulars, Commander Bimbashi Rycroft, 60.
Main Body and Rear Guard.

IXth Infantry Battalion — El Kaimakam Borrow, E.A., Soudanese Bey, D.S.O., reserve ammunition column, 461.

1st Camel Battery, Bimbashi Bakir Effendi, one division, two guns.

Note. - (Gun escort and rear guard, one company of IXth Battalion).

Marched by night on Sarras with as great secrecy and rapidity as possible, orders being given to guard egress from native hamlets en route, a picket, moving up the west bank, being charged with the same duty. The advanced guard of the 1st Column, under Rundle Bey, was to debouch at three miles from Sarras old station, from the gorge through which the dismantled

railway runs, and leaving this point at 4.15 A.M. to get touch of enemy, doing all in its power to detain him until arrival of guns and Infantry of this column; in case of his retreat, to follow him up and infinite all passible less.

up, and inflict all possible loss.

The 2nd Column, under El Kaimakam G. E. Lloyd Bey, D.S.O. (Brevet Major, South Yorkshire Regiment), consisting of 1st Battalion, Egyptian Army, under Kaimakam Coles Bey (Captain, the Buffs), and Supply and Transport Column was to move at night by rail and route march to Abka, the railhead (12 miles), with three days' reserve rations for 1,000 men and 270 animals, and to be ready to advance as early as possible on 28th, if so ordered, with two days' reserve supplies, ammunition, and ambulance. These instruction were well carried out. I attach Bundle Bey's Report; his energy, ability, and soldierlike qualities are well known to you, Sir. The dash and decision of his advance on Sarras, and tenure of the station and fortified heights, and post to the east and north of it under short range rifle fire, gave time to the Infantry and guns to arrive, and, combined with his subsequent handling of his guns and Cavalry, furnished that co-operation of arms indispensable to the success achieved. I cordially endorse his remark as to Bimbashi Rycroft (Lieutenant, Highland Light Infantry), and Bimbashi Dunning (Lieutenant, Royal Fusiliers).

At 6 A.M. Borrow Bey, D.S.O. (Captain, North Lancashire Regiment), with 340 of all ranks of IXth Soudanese Battalion, rest rear guard, Reserve Ammunition Column, Line of Communications, relieved the advanced guard at fortified post 100 yards in rear of Sarras Station, the latter held by Mounted Corps.

At 7 A.M. he formed for attack, and advanced against the enemy's position, a rocky ridge 450 yards' distant, marked by standards. On a rugged height to its right front was a stone block house, held by riflemen, completely taking the advance in flank at 200 yards; its fire was kept down by Irregulars and Camel Corps (occasional volleys). The guns were breaching it.

A few shrapnel were fired at the main position, too steep, however, in reverse to be exposed to direct fire.

One company in extended order, accompanied by Sergeant Healy, advanced along the river to turn the left of the position, which rested on the scarped bank of the Nile, running 40 feet below it.

At this moment the block house fell, and

Rycroft's skirmishers moved rapidly forward from it along the ridge, supported by some of the

Camel Corps.

Borrow advanced with half battalion in column. As the first attacking line reached the flank of the position, the dervishes rose from behind the rocks, and under their three mounted leaders swept down on it, forcing it back on the support; Borrow moved to the right and reinforced with Mitford (one company), and then himself (one company). Foot by foot the front line and first support fell back before the well known wild rush, then stood, and as they felt the impetus of reinforcement, immediately began slowly to advance.

At this point lie over 70 dervish fanatics (Jaalin, &c., &c.) almost touching one another.

The second dervish line made no attempt to support, and on perceiving they were turned by the Cavalry, dispersed, and swam the river.

The advance continued, and Rycroft's men came leaping down the rocks, forming with Dunning and a few Camel Corps, on the left of

the first line.

.The reserve of the fighting line fixed bayonets and moved up close to it. Rundle pushing forward the two guns in line with their left; neither were required. By 7.45 the position was in our hands.

Borrow Bey, assisted by Bimbashi Mitford (Lieutenant, the Buffs) and Sergeant Healy (Cameron Highlanders), behaved with great coolness and pluck, the latter being severely wounded. I append Borrow Bey's remarks as to good behaviour of native Officers, two of whom were wounded in hand-to-hand fighting.

The dervishes detached a right flanking party, reported at 6 A.M. as 50 strong; the Cavalry in their turning movement drove these in with heavy

2nd Line Column.

The Halfa force has no pretensions to mobility. The available transport to the south being 12 miles of railway to Abka, in indifferent repair, with a small staff capable of moving 400 to 500 men at a time.

A transport column for supplies, ambulance, and ammunition was admirably organized by Lloyd Bey, D.S.O., who served with distinction on the Line of Communication in the Nile Expedition, 1884-5. It was formed from camels of a division of the 4-gun battery, and from the animals attached to corps for transport of water and stores within the lines. Lloyd Bey reached Sarras with ambulance, and the supplies ordered late on the 28th with escort of 1st Battalion under Coles Bey; but for counter-orders received a few miles from Sarras he would have brought up the 1st Battalion and two days' supplies for 750 men and 250 animals. I attach his report.

Surgeon W. Lewis, A.M.S. (Bimbashi, E.A., P.M.O.), was present during engagement at Sarras, and worked among the wounded as British Military Medical Officers do work. Although the wounded had in almost all cases numerous spear and sword wounds only one death has occurred.

·El Kaimakam Kempster Bev (Captain, Leinster Regiment) readily accepted the post of Senior Staff Officer to the column, and if it is ever my good fortune to command more extended operations, I wish for no cooler, more ready, or exact Bimbashi Palmer (Lieutenant, Staff Officer. Somerseishire Light Infantry) served as Junior Staff Officer, and accompanied the guns and rear-guard during a trying and difficult night march. I am indebted to him for valuable and voluntary assistance throughout the operation.

Mulaezim Sam Mahomed Effendi Sidki acted as galloper, and showed a coolness very creditable to so young an officer. El Bimbashi Cunningham (Lieutenant, Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry) commanded at Halfa during operation, vide Lloyd Bey's Report.

From the Officer Commanding Field Force to the Sirdar, Egyptian Army, and to the

General Officer Commanding, Egypt.
Sarras, 28th April, 10 A.M.—Received news
noon yesterday, a few hundred dervishes, under Nur El Kunzi, had occupied Sarras with outpost, Gemai. Marched from Halfa with column about Rundle, with Mounted Corps and Rycroft's Irregulars, occupied Sarras by daybreak, and held it under fire from enemy at 400 yards till supported an hour later by Borrow with 300 of 9th. Dervishes occupied very strong position. Carried by Borrow most gallantly in hand-to-hand fight. Dervishes fought stubbornly, and, charging, checked first line of attack. Position carried by 7.45 A.M. Irregulars also storming stone block house, which Artillery breached at 340 yards. Dervishes left over 150 dead, including Nur El Kunzi, 10 standards, arms, camp, ammunition, and correspondence. Mounted Corps also killed 40 in pursuit. Our casualties, about 40, including two officers and Healy: details later.

From the Officer Commanding Field Force to the Sirdar, Egyptian Army, and to the General Officer Commanding, Egypt.

Abka, 11.30 p.m., 29th.—After engagement, net native agent Ambigole. While block sent native agent Ambigole. While block house on hill was being breached before front attack, cavalry got completely in rear of Native reports state first line of about 200 dervish fanatics was almost annihilated, only four escaping on east bank, and Nur El Kunzi's two slaves, posted in rear with two camels and money. On west bank 14 escaped, our small flanking party on that bank killing a few and capturing vessel and cargo of five Greek traders, seized by dervishes, 27th. Greeks were liberated, one slightly wounded and one drowned. Reports add dervish second line consisted of about 7 300 Dongolese under Sheikh Tahir, and Sheikhs of Ambikol, Akasheh, and Sukkot, &c. When turned by Cavalry, this line dispersed, swimming Nile just below Sarras Castle, as we observed, at 7.20 A.M. A few were brought in later and released. Emir Kunzi and the two other leaders were killed. Greeks state dervishes, west bank, received accurate news from Halfa of move, but only as engagement began. The Mounted Corps, guns, and Reserve Ammunition Column marched 35 miles, carrying 100 rounds, two days' rations, and two days' forage; the Infantry, 12 miles rail and 22 miles night route march, carrying 100 rounds and two days' rations. Five of 9th Battalion were found Nile with dervish corpses. One killed, and missing 21; wounded as stated before. Wounded doing well; only one death. They leave Abka to-morrow early.

convoy with ambulance and two days' rations for 750 men and 250 animals. Subsequently, on learning information, telegraphed to you last night, counter ordered two-thirds of supply column and a battalion, except escort for supply and ambulance column. This column reached Sarras late on 28th. There are not enough real dervishes to follow up, and the impressed Dongolese discard their dervish clothes and fly, crossing and recrossing river. Flying Column with some water transport could be organized to go to Akasheh and Firket, but I doubt if it is worth while unless the riverain population is to be punished.

THE Board of Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Vienna, enclosing a copy of an official announcement of the Austro-Hungarian Government, embodying the alterations which have recently been made in the Austrian Customs Tariff, and which came into operation on the 1st instant. The enclosure in the Despatch may be seen on application to the Commercial Department of the B and of Trade, together with a translation so far as regards the principal alterations affecting British trade.

A complete translation of the document will appear in the July number of the Board of Trade Journal.

The following are among the principal changes which have been made, viz.:—

The tariff classification of cotton yarns has been revised and the duties increased; the rates of duty upon cotton tissues have been increased; a new and extended classification for woollen yarns has been substituted for that which was previously in force, with new and increased rates of duty; and the rates of duty upon certain iron goods and machinery have been increased.

THE CUNTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) TRANSFER OF PARTS OF DISTRICTS ACT, 1884.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council approved on the 7th day of June, 1887, of an Agreement made between the County Board being the Local Authority of the county of Aberdeen of the one part, and the Provost, Bailies, and remanent members of the Town Council being the Local Authority of the burgh of Kintore of the other part, whereby the jurisdiction, for the purposes of The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, of the whole of the district of the burgh of Kintore was, as from and after the 14th day of May, 1887, transferred to the district of the county of Aberdeen. Agricultural Department, Privy Council Office, 7th June, 1887.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Wairant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his

signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

Definitions.

1. In this Warrant:-

(1.) The expression "Parcel" means a Postal Packet which is posted as a Parcel in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same.

(2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of

Man.

Places between which Parcels may be Transmitted 2. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation, Parcels may, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and the Congo Free State by way of Belgium.

Rates of Postage.

3. On all Parcels transmitted by post under this Warrant from the United Kingdom to the Congo Free State, there shall be charged and paid the following rates of postage, that is to say:—

On every Parcel not exceeding three pounds in

weight three shillings.

On every Parcel exceeding three pounds and not exceeding seven pounds in weight, three shillings and sixpence.

On every Parcel exceeding seven pounds and not exceeding eleven pounds in weight four

shillings.

Maximum Dimensions and Weight.

4. Except by the special permission of the Postmaster-General no Parcel, the dimensions of which shall exceed in any direction two feet, or which shall exceed in weight eleven pounds, shall be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant.

Prepayment.

5. The postage chargeable according to the respective rates hereinbefore mentioned shall, in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant), be prepaid at the time of posting, and such prepayment shall, in the United Kingdom, be effected by means of adhesive postage stamps, or at such Post Offices, within such hours, and under and subject to such regulations as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time prescribe, in money.

Times of Posting.

6. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post, may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed

by the Postmaster-General.

Mode of Posting.

7. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall, in the United Kingdom, be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

Posting at Post Offices.

8. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say :-

(1.) It shall be the duty of the person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at

the counter in such office.

(2.) Such Parcel must bear the name and address of the sender, and the exact direction of the addressee, and must be packed in a manner adequate for the length of the journey, and for the protection of the con-tents. The Parcel must also be so packed as to prevent any tampering with its contents without leaving an obvious trace of its violation, and must be sealed by means of sealing wax, lead, or otherwise with some impress or mark of the sender. Such Parcel must also be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form, and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.

(3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof shall be prepaid in manner hereinbefore mentioned, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the Post without the before-mentioned requirements being complied with; and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without such requirements being complied with, such Parcel shall be detained and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof, or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner

authorized by this Warrant.

Collection of Parcels.

9. The Postmaster-General may, if he think fit, from time to time authorize such of his officers as he may direct to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

Irregular Posting of Parcels.

10. Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom which, from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office Letter Box, or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or if the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage, and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as the case may be).

Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.

11. With regard to-

(a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within such reasonable times as the Postmaster-General may from time to time prescribe; and

(b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or

cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or for any other sufficient reason;

The following provisions shall apply, that is to

(1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary, be there opened and examined.

(2.) Notice shall be given to the sender through the Post Office of the Congo Free State that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender's agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or, at the request of the sender, will be returned to him by post upon payment of such charges as are herein-

after mentioned.

(3.) The notice shall state that in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel, during a period to be specified in such notice, from some person who, in the Postmaster-General's judgment, is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.

(4.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and

contents of Parcels.

(5.) Where in the case of a Parcel which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, the sender corrects the address of the Parcel, the Parcel shall be forwarded to the corrected address, subject to the following conditions :-

(a.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is within the same free delivery as the original address, and the Parcel is not, at the time of such correction, lying at a Returned Letter Office, no new charge shall be made with respect to the delivery of the Parcel.

(b.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is not within the same free delivery as the original address, or the Parcel at the time of such correction is lying at a Returned Letter Office, the sender shall pay a new and distinct rate of postage equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such

Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

(6.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for redirection or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels): Act, 1882."

(7.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable.

(8.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.

(9.) Where no application is made for a Parcel. within the period specified in any such notice? as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to...

the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct or authorize.

(10.) It at any time while a Parcel remains in the possession of the Postmaster-General, it becomes offensive or injurious to any Officer of the Post Office or other person, or to other Parcels, it may forthwith be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize, notwithstanding that the provisions of this Warrant as to the return of such Parcel have not been or have only partially been complied with.

Charge for Re-direction.

. 12. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom, to any country or place with which a Parcel Post to or from the United Kingdom or the Congo Free State is established, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of such re-direction a new and distinct rate of postage according to the rates for the time being payable in respect of the transmission of a like Parcel from the United Kingdom to the country or place to which it may be re-directed, and such postage, if not paid at the time of such re-direction, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to the addressee.

13. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and (if not previously paid) paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

Remission of Re-direction Rates.

14. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom, which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be redirected by an Officer of the Post Office, and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

Prohibitions.

15. There shall not be posted or conveyed or

delivered by post any Parcel—
(1.) Consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article whether similar to the above or not; or

(2.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.

- (3.) Containing or bearing any letter or communication in the nature of a letter, or any article or thing not authorized by the customs or other laws of the Congo Free State.
- (4.) Consisting of or containing-
 - (a.) Any explosive substance. (b.) Any dangerous substance.

(c.) Any filth.

Nc. 25710.

- (d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance.
- (e.) Any sharp instrument not properly protected.
- (i.) Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General, any living crea-
- (g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Parcels in course of conveyance, or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed, or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such Parcel.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

16. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel consisting of or containing two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons at different addresses, and any such Parcel if posted or tendered for conveyance by post may be detained and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

Non-compliance with Regulations.

17. In any case not in this Warrant expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the Regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Provision for Safety of Parcels.

18. In any case where any officer of the Post Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

19. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office in the United Kingdom of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

Postmaster-General not liable for Loss or Damage. 20. Nothing contained in or done under or in

pursuance of this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect of or in consequence of any loss or damage of any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

Customs Regulations.

21. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be

posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except | subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

Remission of Postage.

22. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

Commencement of Warrant.

23. This Warrant shall come into operation on the twenty-first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows :-

Definitions.

1. In this Warrant :-

(1.) The expression "Parcel" means a Postal Packet, which is posted as a Parcel, in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the

(2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of

Places between which Parcels may be transmitted.

2. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation Parcels may, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and the Bahamas, and, by way of the United Kingdom, and the several routes specified in the schedule hereto, between the Bahamas and the several countries mentioned in such schedule.

Rates of Postage between United Kingdom and the Bahamas.

3. On all Parcels posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the Bahamas, or posted in the Bahamas, addressed to the United Kingdom, and transmitted by post under this Warrant there shall be charged and paid the following rates of postage (that is to say):-

On every Parcel not exceeding one pound in

weight, eight pence.

On every Parcel exceeding one pound and not exceeding eleven pounds in weight, for the first pound eight pence, and for every additional pound or fraction of a pound in weight eight pence.

Moximum Dimensions and Weight of such Parcels. 4. No Parcel posted in the United Kingdom addressed to the Bahamas, or posted in the Bahamas addressed to the United Kingdom, the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches, or in length and girth measured together six feet (such girth being measured round the thickest part of such Parcel), or which shall exceed in weight eleven pounds, shall be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this

Rates of Postage from the Bahamas to places in Schedule vià United Kingdom.

5. On all Parcels transmitted by post under this Warrant from the Bahamas to any country mentioned in the schedule hereto by way of the United Kingdom, there shall be charged and paid according to the route of transmission and weight of such Parcels respectively, the several rates of postage specified in such schedule.

Maximum Dimensions and Weight of Parcels between places vid the United Kingdom.

6. No Parcel posted in or addressed to any country mentioned in the schedule hereto, the dimensions of which shall exceed in any direction two feet, or which in the case of Parcels posted in or addressed to Austria-Hungary, Denmark, Heligoland, Switzerland, Germany, Italy, or Sweden shall exceed six pounds in weight, or in the case of Parcels posted in or addressed to Belgium, the Netherlands, Luxemburg, or Norway shall exceed eleven pounds in weight, shall be conveyed or tendered for conveyance under this Warrant.

Prepayment.

7. The postage chargeable according to the respective rates hereinbefore mentioned shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant) be prepaid at the time of posting, and such prepayment shall in the United Kingdom beeffected by means of adhesive postage stamps.

Times of Posting.
8. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland, on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed by the Postmaster-General.

Mode of Posting.

9. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall in the United Kingdom be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels

Posting at Post Offices.

10. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say:—

(1.) It shall be the duty of a person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at

the counter in such office. (2.) Such Parcel must be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.

(3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned shall be prepaid as hereinbefore provided, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the post without being accompanied by or having affixed thereto such declaration as aforesaid, and until such Parcel has been so measured and weighed, and the postage chargeable thereon shall have been properly paid; and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without being accompanied by or having affixed thereto such declaration and without being so measured and weighed and the postage chargeable thereon properly paid as aforesaid, such Parcel shall, be detained and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.

Collection of Parcels.

· 11. The Postmaster-General may, if he think fit, from time to time authorize such officers as he may direct to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

Irregular Posting of Parcels.

12. Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom to the Bahamas, which from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence appears to have been intended for transmission as a parcel, but which has not béen tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office Letter-box or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or be dealt with as follows, that is to say:

(1.) If the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, the same may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as

the case may be).

. (2.) If the said Packet is not fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of Postage the same may be forwarded to its destination as a Parcel charged with the sum of one penny in addition to all other postage payable upon such Packet as a Parcel. Provided that the postage prepaid upon any such Packet shall be allowed in part payment of any postage or other sum charged under this · clause.

Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.

13. With regard to

(a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port of the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within such reasonable times as the Postmaster-General may from time to time prescribe; and

(b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or

for any other sufficient reason;

The following provisions shall apply, that is to

(1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-

General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary,

be there opened and examined.

(2.) Where the name and address of the sender can be ascertained from the Parcel or the Declaration accompanying the same, notice shall be given by Post to the sender through the Post Office of the Bahamas that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender or his agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or at the request of the sender will be forwarded to a corrected address or returned to him by Post in either case upon the conditions hereinafter mentioned.

- (3.) Where the name and address of the sender cannot be ascertained from the Parcel, notice shall be publicly given (by affixing the same at such place or places, or in such other manner as the Postmaster-General may direct), and notice shall also be given to the Post Office of the Bahamas that the Parcel will in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, and upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned, be given up upon the personal application of the sender or his agent, or be returned to the sender by Post.
- (4.) In any case the notice shall state that in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the parcel, during a period to be specified in such notice from some person who, in the Postmaster-General's judgment, is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such as the Postmaster-General may manner
- (5.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.

F (6.) Where in the case of a Parcel which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, the sender corrects the address of the Parcel, the Parcel shall be forwarded to the corrected address, subject to the following

(a.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is within the same free delivery as the original address and the Parcel is not at the time of such correction lying at a Returned Letter Office no new charge shall be made with respect to the delivery of the Parcel.

- (b.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is not within the same free delivery as the original address or the Parcel at the time of such correction is lying at a Retured Letter Office there shall be paid a new and distinct rate of postage equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.
- (7.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned. by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for redirection or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in, section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Ac, 1882."

(8.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be

returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and in such case the said rate of postage and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable if not prepaid by the sender shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to him,

(9.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.

- (10.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.
- (11.) If at any time while a Parcel remains in the possession of the Postmaster-General it becomes offensive or injurious to any officer of the Post Office, or other person, or to other Parcels, it may forthwith be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize, notwithstanding that the provisions of this Warrant as to the return of such Parcel, have not been or have only partially been complied with.

Re-direction of Parcels.

- 14. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom, to any country or place with which a Parcel Post to or from the United Kingdom or the Bahamas is established, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of such re-direction a new and distinct rate of postage according to the rates for the time being payable in respect of the transmission of a like Parcel from the United Kingdom to the country or place to which it may be re-directed, and such postage, if not paid at the time of such re-direction, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to the addressee.
- 15. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction; and (if not previously paid) paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland parcel.

Remission of Re-direction Rates.

16. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be re-directed by an Officer of the Post Office and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

Prohibitions.

17. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel:—

 Consisting of or containing any indecent or obseeme print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article whether similar to the above or not, or

- (2.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.
 - (3.) Consisting of or containing:-
 - (a.) Any explosive substance.
 - (b.) Any dangerous substance.

(c.) Any filth.

(d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance.

(e.) Any sharp instrument not properly protected.

(f.) Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General, any living creature.

(g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Parcels in course of conveyance or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such Parcel.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

- 18.—(1.) There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel consisting of or containing two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons at different addresses.
- (2.) If any such Parcel be posted or tendered for conveyance by post the contents thereof, so far as the same consist of Parcels may be forwarded to the addressees of such Parcels charged with new and distinct rates of postage according to the rates fixed by this warrant, and so far as the same consist of other Postal Packets may be treated and charged as unpaid Postal Packets, or such Parcel may be otherwise dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

Non-compliance with Regulations.

19. In any case not in this Warrant expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Provision for Safety of Parcels.

20. In any case where any efficer of the Post Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

21. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office in the United Kingdom of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

Postmaster-General not liable for Loss or Damage.

22. Nothing contained in or done under or in pursuance of this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect or in consequence of any loss or damage of any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

Customs Regulations.

23. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

Remission of Postage.

24. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

25. Except where in this Warrant is otherwise

expressly provided all Parcels transmitted under this Warrant between the Bahamas and the countries mentioned in the Schedule hereto shall be posted, forwarded, conveyed, and delivered under and subject to the provisions of this Warrant, and to the provisions of the Warrants respectively relating to the Parcel Post between the United Kingdom and the several countries mentioned in the Schedule hereto, so far as such provisions are applicable.

Commencement of Warrant.

26. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

Rates of Postage from Places in Schedule to Tangier.

5. On all Parcels transmitted by post under this Warrant from the several places mentioned in the Schedule hereto to Tangier, there shall be charged and paid, according to the weight of such Parcels respectively, the several rates of postage specified in such Schedule.

Prepayment.

6. The postage chargeable under this Warrant on Parcels posted in the United Kingdom, shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant), be prepaid at the time of posting, and such prepayment shall be effected by means of adhesive postage stamps.

Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom to Tangier, which from any words or marks thereon or other external evidence appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office Letter-box, or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or be dealt with as follows, that is to say:—

(1.) If the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage, and otherwise conforms to the Regulations, as to the Letter or Book Post, the same may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as

the case may be).

(2.) If the said Packet is not fully prepaidwith the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage, the same may be forwarded to its destination as a Parcel, charged with the sum of one penny in addition to all other postage payable upon such Packet as a Parcel. Provided that the postage prepaid upon any such Packet shall be allowed in part payment of any postage or other sum charged under this clause.

Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.

(5.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.

(6.) Where in the case of a Parcel which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, the sender corrects the address of the Parcel, the Parcel shall be forwarded to the corrected address, subject to the follow-

ing conditions:

(a.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is within the same free delivery as the original address, and the Parcel is not at the time of such correction lying at a Returned Letter Office no new charge shall be made with respect to the delivery of the Parcel.

Parcel is not within the same free delivery as the original address, or the Parcel at the time of such correction is lying at a Returned Letter Office, there shall be paid a new and distinct rate of postage equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

(7.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for redirection or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels)

Act, 1882."

(8.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and in such case the said rate of postage and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable, if not prepaid by the sender, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to him.

(9.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.

- (10.) (2.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.

(3.) Consisting of or containing-

(a.) Any explosive substance.

(b.) Any dangerous substance.

(c.) Any filth.
(d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance.

(e.) Any sharp instrument not properly

protected.

(f.) Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General, any living creature.

(g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Parcels in course of conveyance or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such Parcel.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

- 17.-(1.) There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel consisting of or containing two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons at different addresses.
- (2.) If any such Parcel be posted or tendered for conveyance by post the contents thereof, so far as the same consist of Parcels may be forwarded to the addressees of such Parcels charged with new and distinct rates of postage according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and so far as the same consist of other Postal Packets may be treated and charged as unpaid Postal Packets, or such Parcel may be otherwise dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize
