

behalf, on Thursday, the 12th day of May, 1887, it was resolved,—

- “ That the Local Government Board be requested to issue an Order under their Seal of Office directing that the Act passed on the 5th August, 1850 (13 and 14 Vict., c. 57), entitled ‘An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry and other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the Appointment of Vestry Clerks,’ shall be applied to and put in force within this Parish as regards that portion of the Act which relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk.”
- “ That the duties to be assigned to such Vestry Clerk be those defined in section 7 of the above-mentioned Act, with the exception of the duties comprised in the clause thereof which relates to making out the Poor Rate, the clause relating to issuing the necessary process for recovering of arrears of such rates, and the clause relating to making out the list of persons liable to serve on juries.”
- “ That the salary to be paid such Vestry Clerk be 50*l.* per annum.
- “ That the security to be given by such Vestry Clerk be 100*l.*”

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said parish have made application in writing to us, the Local Government Board, pursuant to the above Resolution:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to us by the Statutes in that behalf, we hereby declare and order as follows:—

**ARTICLE I.**—So much of the Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled “An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the Appointment of Vestry Clerks,” as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk, shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said parish of Sunbury, and the provisions contained in Articles II., III., and IV., of this Order shall apply to the Vestry Clerk for the time being appointed for that Parish.

**ARTICLE II.**—The duties to be performed by the Vestry Clerk shall be those mentioned in Section 7 of the said Act, except those referred to in the hereinbefore recited Resolution.

**ARTICLE III.**—The Vestry Clerk shall give to the Guardians of the Poor of the said Staines Union a bond, in a penal sum of not less than one hundred pounds, in the names of himself and one sufficient surety, not being an officer of that Union, conditioned for the due and faithful performance of the duties of the office; and shall give immediate notice to the said Guardians of the death or bankruptcy of such surety, or of his having compounded with his creditors or liquidated his affairs by arrangement, and shall, when required by the said Guardians, produce a certificate, signed by two householders, that his surety is alive and is believed by them to be solvent, and shall supply a fresh surety in the place of any such surety who may die or become bankrupt, or who may have compounded with his creditors or liquidated his affairs as aforesaid.

Provided that the Guardians may accept as a security the guarantee of any Company or Association, which shall undertake to guarantee the good conduct of such officer, and shall give their guarantee in a security, the form whereof shall have been approved by the Poor Law Board or the Local Government Board under their Seal.

**ARTICLE IV.**—The Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said Parish shall pay to the Vestry Clerk a salary at the rate of fifty pounds per annum, or such other remuneration for the per-

formance of the duties of that office as we may, with the consent of such person, from time to time direct.

**ARTICLE V.**—Such remuneration, in the case of an annual salary, shall be considered as accruing from day to day, and be apportionable in respect of time accordingly, in pursuance of the provisions of “The Apportionment Act, 1870,” and shall be paid quarterly on the usual quarter days in each year, namely, Midsummer Day, Michaelmas Day, Christmas Day, and Lady Day.

**ARTICLE VI.**—A copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said Parish.
