PROCLAMATION

Requiring all Seamen and Mariners to render themselves to Their Majesties Service.

Whereas divers Seamen and Mariners have lately left their usual and ordinary Places of Abode, and have removed themselves into some private and obscure Places, endeavouring thereby to avoid or scape from Their Majesties Service: Their Majesties therefore, by the Advice of their Privy Council, have upon the present extraordinary Cause, thought fit to Publish this Their Royal Proclamation, whereby strictly Charge and Command all Seamen and Mariners remaining in any County of England or Wales, to be Listed in Their Majesties Service, That they forthwith themselves into the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Their Majesties Navy in London, or to the Commissioners of the Navy at Chatham, or to the Commissioners of the Navy at Portsmouth, or to Joseph Fownes Store-keeper and Receiver for the Navy at Harwich, or to John Addis Receiver and Muster-master for the Navy at Plymouth, or the Bay-masters of Great Yarmouth, or to the Mayor of Hull, or the Mayor of Newcastle, or to Robert Henley at Britol, or Atkinson at Highlake and Liverpool, in order to their being received into Pay, and sent on Board such of Their Majesties Ships as shall be found most expedient for Their Majesties Service; And if any of them shall hereafter be found out or discovered to have neglected to obey this Their Majesties Royal Command, they shall be proceeded against with all Severity. And Their Majesties do hereby Require all Justices, Bayliffs, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, Constables and other Officers to whom it doth or may appertain, That they cause diligent Search to be made within all and every of their Precincts, for the said Seamen and Mariners, and to seize and Secure the Persons of such of them as shall be there found; And also all loose and unknown Persons whatsoever, who may justly be suspected to be Seamen or Watermen, and to cause them to be sent to the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Their Majesties Navy in London, or to such other of the Persons and Places aforesaid, to which they may most conveniently be sent, in order to their being Employed in Their Majesties Service; and that they send up to Their Majesties Privy Council, a List of the Names of all such Seamen and Mariners as they shall procure for the Service aforesaid, together with the Names of the respective Persons to whom, and the Places to which they shall send them. And the said Principal Officers and Commissioners, and other Persons aforesaid, shall give Receipts in Writing for the several Seamen and Mariners delivered to them in pursuance hereof. And Their Majesties do hereby strictly Charge and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever, do presume to Conceal, or to further or favour the Escape of any Seamen or Mariners as aforesaid, upon Pain that all and singular Persons offending herein, be forthwith Committed to Prison by the next Justice of the Peace, or other Magistrate, and with all Severity Prosecuted, as Persons conspiring against Their Majesties and the Safety of the Kingdom. And Their Majesties are hereby pleased to make known, That Money is already lodged in the Hands of the Persons above named, for Repaying the Conduct Money, and other Charges incident to this Service.

Barbadoes, April 23. We have an account by a Jamaica Sloop, that touched at Curassow and Nevis, that 4 English Sloops from Jamaica, with 240 Men, and 3 Vessels, from Curassow well manned, have fallen on the French Settlement called

called *Santa Cruz*, and have taken and destroyed it, and got good Store of Plunder, and are detigning up to *Nervis*, to joyn with the Forces of the English Leeward Islands, to pursue the blow they have given the French.

Turin, June 24. The Forces of the *Milmeze* are incamp near this City, under the Command of the *Maistre de Camp* General, *Count de Louvigny*; the *Duke of Savoy* went on *Monday* last to view them, and was received with a treble discharge of all their great and small shot; and the next day his Highness took a review of his own Forces. There are 1500 Protestants marching hither in a Body, and we are assured, That 3000 more have passed the Lake of *Geneva*. Our Duke has given out divers Commissions for raising both Horse and Foot. On *Wednesday* last we had advice, That 800 French Horse, and 400 Foot, had burnt *Rivoli*; upon which a Detachment of Horse and Foot was sent thither, but the Enemy having notice of their march retired immediately, having had only time to set Fire to some few Houses. *Montieur Cassinat* continues with his Forces near *Pignerol*, and has sent out divers parties to find out a Ford over the River *Po*, several of which have been cut off by our Troops. The *Baron Pallavicino*, with the Regiment under his Command, and a Party of *Vaudois* have burnt *Bietz*, and some other places in *Dauphine* that would not pay Contributions; to which others have submitted.

Frankfort, July 9. The Elector of *Saxony* arrived the 3d instant at *Halbron*, whither his Forces are now marching. The Imperial Army continues incamp near *Bruchsal*; and the French about *Spire*. We hear from *Mentz*, That 60 Hussars having passed the *Rhin at Gerishheim*, met a French Party, which they defeated, killing 35, and taking a Cornet, with 10 other Prisoners.

Brussels, July 12. The Heeren *Heynsius, Van Dickvelt*, and *Schuyrnans*, arrived the 9th instant in the Dutch Camp near this City, and having taken a review of the Forces, were present with our Governor General, and *Prince Waldeck*, at a Council of War, at which the General Officers, as well of the Spanish, as Dutch Forces likewise assisted. Four Dutch Regiments that were quartered in *Flanders* have joyned the Army, and several other Regiments are on their march from the Dutch Frontier places to do the like, and at the same time those Regiments that suffered the most in the late Battle are going into Garrison. Our Governor General will part from hence in two or three days for *Flanders*, where he is to Act a part with the Forces under his Command, as was at first concerted; and in the mean time the Troops of *Hanover* 12000 strong, lye encamped near *Gavre*. We have advice, That the *Marschal d'Humeres* decamped the 10th instant from *Hartbeck*, and marched to *Avelgem*, the greatest part of the Garrison of *Courtray* having joined him in his march. A French Party endeavouring some days since to pass the Canal between *Offend* and *Bruges*, with a design to make a Ravage in the North part of *Flanders*, was repulsed by some of our Troops, 20 of them being killed, and several taken Prisoners.

Hague, July 14. The Elector of *Brandenburg* who arrived the 7th instant at *Wesel* is gone from thence to his Army, which marches towards the *Meuse*. We have an account from *Switzerland*, That in pursuance of the Resolution taken at the General Dyer at *Baden*, the Canton of *Berne* had sent positive Orders to their Subjects in Garrison at *Gasfal*, to repair home, or at least not to serve in the defence of that place, it being one of those which *France* had acquired since the year 1663. The Duke of *Luxemburg* was according to our last advice, still encamp along the *Sambre*, his head quarter being at *Fasimmes*.

From His Majesty's Camp near Swords, within 9 Miles of Dublin, July 4. The King having forced the Passages of the River *Boine*, and given the Enemy an entire defeat on the 1st instant, (of which you have already had a particular Relation) His Majesty encamp here to rest His Army, after the great Fatigue they had undergone.

The numbers of the killed and wounded on both sides are not yet known. But our loss is inconsiderable considering the Consequences of this Victory, and the disadvantage we had in passing the River through two narrow ways, where our Men could scarce make a front, the Enemy standing upon a Hill, in formed Battalions and Squadrons to receive our Men as they came out of the Water; but nothing could withstand the Courage of our Troops, headed by the King himself, who being accompanied by the Prince of *Denmark*, passed the River so soon as the first Battalions had taken footing on this side, and was in the hottest of the Action, giving the necessary Orders.

Our Campagne could not be more prosperous than it has been; the greatest loss we have had, is that of the Duke of *Sachsenberg*, who being pressed upon by a Party of the Enemies Guard du Corps, (not having then about him above 50 or 40 Horse,) was by one of them shot in the Neck, with which wound, having likewise received 3 Cuts over the Head, he fell from his Horse. Captain *Furber* who was next to him, and had likewise received a wound in the Arm, got from his

Horse to help the Duke, but he died immediately, without speaking a Word.

The late King *James* came back to *Dublin* about Ten Night, on *Tuesday*, being followed by the broken remains of his Army, which were not above 5 or 6000 Men, and the Morning he went away with the Duke of *Berwick*, the Duke of *Tyrconnel*, and the Marquis of *Powis*, (as some think towards *Waterford*, though others say, and that more probably, towards *Limericke*, whither most of his scattered Forces are gone,) declaring that he would never trust himself at the Head of an Irish Army. The *Count de Lauzun* was not left with him above 3500 of the French Forces, the best being killed. So soon as the late King was gone, a considerable Papists fled from *Dublin*; and the Protestants were Released, who possessed themselves of the Militia (which were easily yielded to them, and with the Assistance of the Bishops of *Meath* and *Limericke*, formed a Council to take care of things, and sent Letters to the King to give an account of what had passed, and humbly to pray His Majesty to honour that City with His Presence.

The day after the Fight His Majesty sent *Montieur Meloniere* Brigadier General, with five Regiments, to *Drogheda*, where there is a great Magazine of Stores. Governor received the first Summons with great content, but the King sending him word, That if he forced he bring Cannon against the place he would give them no quarter, the Governor and the Garrison (which consisted of 12 Regiments, and some odd Companies) yielded to mercy without their Arms, and to leave all the Stores of Ammunition and Provisions, and the Deserters behind them, accordingly surrendered the place yesterday.

Last Night His Majesty sent the Duke of *Ormond*, *Montieur Overkerke*, with 9 Troops of Horse to secure quiet of *Dublin*. To morrow His Majesty intends to go to see them himself, and to encamp His Army within two Miles of that City; from whence they will immediately march to the Enemy, according as His Majesty hears what condition they are in; though they are so broken and dispersed, they can appear no more in any considerable Body.

In the mean time, His Majesty has Commanded that Reditions be given to all the poor People that will live quiet and is very angry when he hears of any Severities committed against them.

Just now we are told, That the *Dames* and *Imiskilling* have taken the Plate and Money of the Earl of *Tyrconnel*, the *Count de Lauzun*, with some Jewels, to the value of 10000 l. Sterling, besides the Jewels.
